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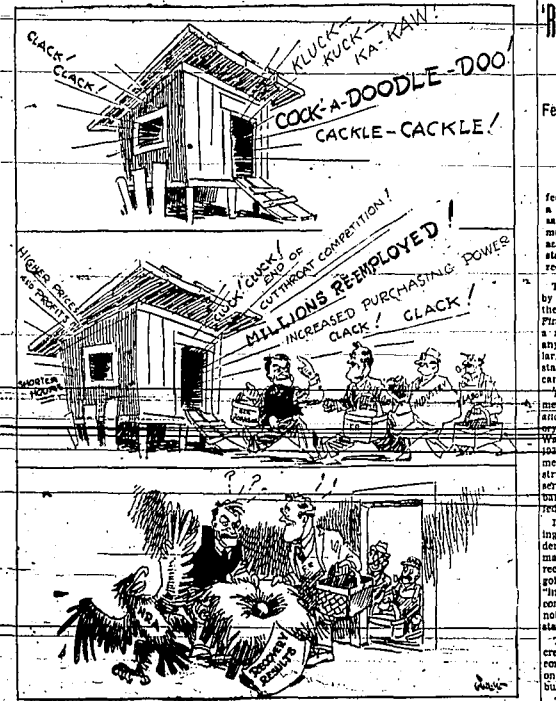
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SOCIALISTS FILE THREE-MAN SLATE

Candidates for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Congress in Race

BOISE, Sept. 27 (AP)—The Socialist party filed a ticket of three candidates for state and congressional offices with the secretary of state today to make four parties in the field, two in addition to the Republican and Democratic.

The Commonwealth party filed its ticket yesterday, and today augmented it with a statement of its general principles, listed as "equality, efficiency, economy and sobriety." The rhinoceros was offered as the party emblem.

On the Socialist ticket are Allen L. Adams of Caldwell, for governor; George F. Hubner of Buhl, for lieutenant governor; and D. P. Donahue of Pocatello for second congressional district. Filing fees of \$148.50 for the three were sent in one check from Socialist headquarters in Pocatello where Donahue is secretary.

The filing forms were incomplete and John P. Mix, assistant secretary of state, notified headquarters by telegraph and was advised by the official had left by automobile to bring the necessary papers. Mix said he would be on hand to file them on arrival.

Alms at 'Apple Carts'

With announcement of the filing, Donahue issued a brief statement in Pocatello saying his party "boasted" every cent paid for an unjust law which he branded as a tax upon the common man's privilege of standing for his country.

"We do have a chance to provide some apple carts in Idaho politics this election and we will upset them good and plenty in 1936," he asserted. He said there was a sweep of Socialist sentiment in the nation—his conclusion:

"Socialism is the perfectly natural solution of our economic problems. We cannot avoid Socialism in America within the next five to 10 years. Candidates on the Commonwealth Prohibition party are T. H. Darrow of Huston, a farmer, for governor; Harry Lewis of Payette, for lieutenant governor; C. W. Drew of Wilder for state auditor, and C. A. Olanoff, a merchant, a farmer, for secretary of state.

Support of prohibition was the major plank in the party's platform drawn up at the convention in Caldwell, August 14, the day of the primary election.

Liquor Salesman, Loser in Lawsuit

HANCOCKVILLE, N. C., Sept. 27 (AP)—The HESCO suit against the Pacific Forwarding company and its manager, Harry Reford, Vancouver brewer and distiller, was taken from a supreme court jury and dismissed by Justice C. A. McDonald.

Justice McDonald gave his decision after defense counsel had called for the dismissal, on the grounds that the suit was based on illegal acts in the United States.

Senator Brands Democratic Book Funeral Prayer

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—The "funeral prayer for the Democratic party" was the description applied today by Senator Hastings to a Democratic campaign booklet, issued by the party's national committee, the handbook for the guidance of Democratic candidates made the issue for the November elections.

Declaring the handbook a "house of inaccuracies," Hastings, co-chairman of the Republican senatorial-congressional committee, in a formal statement said:

"If the booklet is a demonstration of the reliability of the statements contained in it, then the Democratic party has degenerated into one of pure deception."

"The committee has the effrontery to declare that 'The Democratic party has degenerated into one of pure deception' by kept. The whole world knows that these promises have not been kept but that an entirely new and unbroken program, wholly outside the party's covenant to the people has been adopted."

Re-Organization of Power Firm Sought

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27 (AP)—The Portland Electric Power company today in a federal court filed a petition in bankruptcy under the new bankruptcy law.

The court ordered a hearing on October 22 on the petition. At the same time an order was issued by the court dissolving the receivership under which the company has been operating since last March. Franklin T. Griffith, president of the company, has been serving as receiver.

The bankruptcy proceeding is part of the reorganization plan announced last spring. A temporary order was granted by the federal court today for the receiver to turn over to the Portland Electric Power company, the properties of the company to that organization can be completed.

The bankruptcy suit, under which the company's petition was filed, alleges receivership a period of five years to reorganize, provided two-thirds of the stockholders agree. Attorneys led the court about 75 per cent of the stockholders are agreeable to the reorganization plan.

Under the new bankruptcy act interference of creditors will be eliminated during the bankruptcy period.

Giant Byrd Plane Removed From Ice

LEWIS AND CLARK, Antarctica (AP)—The giant plane, named the "Spirit of St. Louis," which carried Admiral Richard E. Byrd on his proposed long range flight, has been brought to the surface from the ice-strewn tundra where it has been for five difficult months.

The difficult task was accomplished during a full moon on Saturday, the first of which was the worst in many weeks. Not until midnight Saturday were the men able to pronounce the craft secured against a fresh storm threatening in the distance.

ENGLISH TO THE GRAVE NEW SLOGAN FOR LONDON

AAA SUGAR CHIEF TO MEET GROWERS

Farm Administration Representative Plans Tour Of Western Area

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—Western sugar beet growers will have an opportunity to tell their story directly to the chief of the farm adjustment administration sugar division, John R. Dalton.

Dalton agreed today to make a trip through Nebraska, Colorado, and on the west coast within two or three weeks. He expects by that time to have in the hands of the producers the new benefit payment contract. In addition to securing first hand information on the reaction of beet sugar farmers, Dalton plans to explain the benefit payment contract which has been worked out at a series of conferences between growers' representatives and AAA officials.

Charles M. Kearney, president of the National Beet Growers' association, said today while the exact form of terms of the contract have not been finally agreed upon, "we are hopeful for final approval shortly."

General Agreement
Growers conferred with Dalton and other officials Monday and Tuesday and reached general agreement on all except a few points. Kearney and J. D. Panzake, of Greeley, Colorado, secretary of the association, are remaining in Washington until a final settlement is reached.

"A happy compromise with benefit programs of other agricultural commodities," Kearney said, "confirms my belief we have secured for beet farmers a contract which will result in benefit payments being made in October and I am optimistic over the prospects of accomplishing the objects of the contract."

Kearney added now that a virtual agreement has been reached on the contract, he is urging officials to speed the rehabilitation and stabilization-of-the-industry-which-he-is-

Introducing the Candidates

D. Worth Clark, Democratic Nominee for Second District Congressman

"This is another of a series of preliminary meetings of Idaho candidates for the general election."

BOISE, Sept. 27 (AP)—I took D. Worth Clark six years from the time he first appeared in a prominent role as a Democrat to his nomination as the party's candidate for congress—and he is still a young man.

It was in 1928 that a young man fresh from law school came from his home in Pocatello to Grandview and placed in nomination the name of C. Ben Ross. "He is the man," said Clark in the nominating speech for Ross before the convention, "who made famous in Idaho that phrase of farm recovery—the cow, the pig and the hen."

Old timers recognized in him what appears almost a Clark tradition—a disposition to emphasize his point by use of his hands.

"Yes," said the editor of the local paper, placidly taking notes, "even with his hands."

Assigned to Boise

That nomination put Ross into an unsuccessful campaign but it made the name of "Worth Clark" known to a lot of old time Democrats—and many young ones, such as always attend conventions. After the speech he returned quietly to Pocatello to practice law with the late Joe Peterson.

With the election of Bert Miller of Idaho Falls as attorney general it was not long until the name of young Clark came to be mentioned as a prospect for assistant attorney general. That assignment he took, handling with the other assistants the heavy grip of work coming through the office.

During the past year a bit of a rift developed between Congressman Ross and the late Representative T. C. Coffin and almost at once the name of Clark came forward as a possible opponent of the fiery congressman, although Clark and Coffin were by no means foes.

and with the death of Representative Coffin in an automobile accident the name headed the list in many a forecast as to the outcome of the primary.

Young, barely past 30, Clark came from Harvard law school to Idaho. He is married and has two children. Golf does not attract him; he likes tennis better. And scarcely a more popular couple has come to Boise among the biennial political visitors.

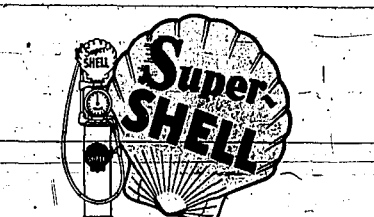

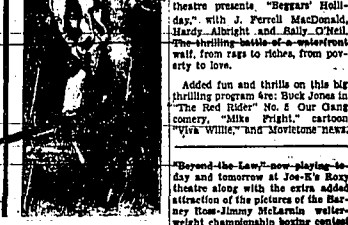

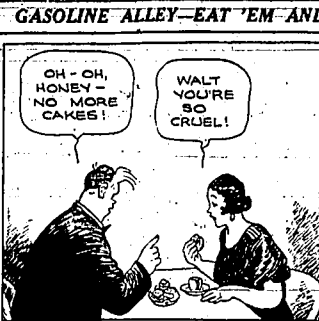
