## RIOTING STRIKERS USE GOLF BALLS TO BOMBARD JUTEMILL

### Slate Police Restore Order With Eight Arrests After Second Outbreak of Day in Massachusetts Town

(The Associated Press)  
LUDLOW, Mass., Nov. 8.—In the midst of a riot here today hundreds of golf balls were hurled at a lumbermill owned by the Luddlow Manufacturing Co.

Unable to attack the gate of the mill, the strikers turned to the windows and doors, throwing the golf balls at the glass.

Police officers were called to the scene and after a short time the rioting ceased.

Eight persons were arrested and taken to the Ludlow police station.

The police said that the rioting was the second outbreak of the day.

The first outbreak occurred at about 10 o'clock this morning.

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## Rickenbacker Sets New Flight Record

Wartime Ace Pilots Transport Plane Across

Father H. E. Heitman, who will serve the local church of St. Edward's Catholic church as successor to Monsignor R. S. Keyser, arrived in Twin Falls Wednesday, accompanied by his sister, Miss Ann Heitman. He will enter the former home of Monsignor Keyser.

Father Heitman comes to this section from Kellogg, Idaho, where he served for some ten years during which period he was prominently identified with the work of rebuilding and restoring the famed Cataldo Mission erected in the Couderc-Alena in 1875 and which is one of the oldest surviving landmarks of the early history of the church in Idaho. Prior to his residence in Kellogg he was stationed for five years at Caldwell.

Father Heitman will officiate at the Sunday service at St. Edward's church.

## CHAIN STORE TAX IN

COLUMBIAN CONSTITUTION, DENVER, Nov. 8 (AP)—The "chain store tax" written into the state constitution Thursday is a large one, provides for a graduated tax on "chain" merchandising establishments ranging from one cent a year for one store up to \$200 for organizations operating 24 or more stores. Under its provisions filiations will be subject to the tax as will all chain grocery and drug stores.

## RECOUNT TAKES FOUR VOTES FROM STEPHAN

A recount yesterday of votes cast in Twin Falls precinct No. 2 for governor took four votes from the previously reported total for Frank T. Stephan, Republican candidate, and gave Governor C. Ben Ross, re-elected for a third term, an unofficial margin of 38 votes in Twin Falls county.

County commissioners who yesterday insured completion of the official canvass, ordered the recount in the Twin Falls precinct when they discovered a discrepancy which they said they were unable to reconcile. The apparent discrepancy was said to involve approximately 100 votes. The recount was completed yesterday only with respect to votes for governor.

Margins rolled up in this county by all successful candidates except those for governor were so wide that they could not be affected by the recount.

Originally reported returns from Twin Falls precinct No. 2 gave Stephan 358; Ross 255.

## Ross Declines To Reveal Destination

BOISE, Nov. 8 (AP)—Governor Ross prepared to leave today for a 10 day vacation "where nobody can find me."

Putting aside cares of state, he sought to recuperate from his strenuous-but-successful campaign by "going hunting." He said he would not leave Idaho but declined to say what part of the state he would choose for a vacation spot.

"They don't let me alone when people know where I am," said the governor, commenting that last summer he sought quiet in a Stanley basin lodge only to find that "telephone calls and telegrams were there almost all the time."

Asked if he planned to hunt deer, an occupation that would have carried him almost certainly into northern Idaho, which is about the only open territory at present, he merely replied that he does not hunt deer.

He made arrangements to leave a mortgage moratorium jurisdiction ready to issue November 18, when the old one expires, and said he would have it issued before he returns or immediately afterward.

Frankly pleased with the outcome of the election, he said he had no complete reports of the majority of Democrats he would find in the coming legislature but expressed confidence it would be great.

## FAMILY WIPED OUT BY CRAZED KILLER

Man Slays Wife and Two  
Children in Fit of  
Jealous Anger

STONEHAM, Mass., Nov. 8 (AP)—An entire family of four was wiped out today when a father turned killer, police said, in a fit of jealous anger.

The dead were Joel E. Lidaquist, 27; his wife, Corinne, 26; and their two children, Syrene Ellen, 2, and a 12-day-old infant boy. The children had been stabbed to death, and the mother strangled, police said, by the father, who then leaped himself.

Mrs. Lidaquist had returned only two days ago from a Melrose hospital where the baby was born.

Police said the father had written notes of somber philosophy, in blood, and pinned them to a table with the stained knife that had been used to take the lives of his children.

The body of Lidaquist was found suspended from a makeshift noose attached to a lightning fixture. In the same room, on a bed, was the body of the two-year-old girl, wounds in her throat and heart. The dead infant was found in a basket in the dining room.

In an unfinished room in the at-

tic, used as a workshop, was found the body of the mother, a leather belt around her neck. On a table above her head was a note, scrawled in red across brown paper. Police refused to divulge its inscription. A postcard, also blood-stained, said:

"The life has been a great adventure. Just a dream. The death will be still another one. I killed the ones I love, but why let innocent children suffer the terrible suffering life is filled with?"

Police Chief J. Clarence Nelson said he was convinced Lidaquist was a temporarily insane when he committed the acts.

## Auto-Train Crashes Claim Two Lives

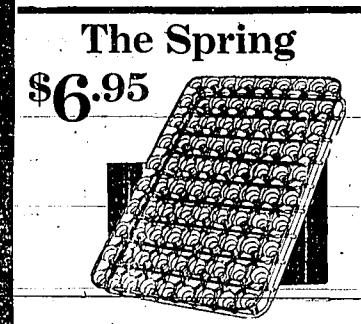

Marshall A. Mitchell, 46, of Bluffdale, died at Riverdale, Utah, a short time after his automobile stalled on the Denver and Rio Grande Western railway tracks in Bluffdale and was struck by a northbound freight train. His skull was fractured when he was struck as he attempted to leap to safety.

With battles of the turf slated for today and Monday, South-Central Idaho gridiron fans are awaiting a series of grudge affairs which will be capped by a clash at Oakley this afternoon between Coach M. C. Cranney's dynamic Hornets and the Gooding Senators, for the Class "A" Non-Big-Ten championship of South-Central Idaho.

Oakley is the done sheet favorite as the hour of the battle nears. Led by McMurray, a triple-threat Hornet who has let his star in several Big Ten battles this year, the Oakley have gone down to defeat only at the hands of three Big Ten teams, Twin Falls, Burley and Buhl. Gooding, on the other hand, has lost but two games this year—the one to the bound Class "B" outfit from Shoshone, and last week to Buhl by a 14-6 score.

Battling for the district Class "B" title, Hansen and Shoshone play at Twin Falls today. The Shoshone also play Monday when they meet Jerome on the Oakley county gridiron.

Oakley, in Class "A" competition piled up scores of 34 to 0 over Jerome, 35 to 0 over Kimberly, and 32 to 0 over Wendell. Gooding won 33 to 0 from Jerome, 20 to 0 from Kimberly, and 14 to 0 from Wendell. This looks good for the Hornets—on the other hand Buhl overtook Oakley 10 to 0 and Gooding 10 to 0.

The other Class "A" game on the agenda is Coach Jay Thompson's Kimberly Bulldogs at Wendell. Both are holding down the league cellar, but Wendell is given a slight edge.

Indiana Go to Caldwell  
The Big Ten will get its swing-line work with two games slated for today. Coach Floyd Powers' Bush Indians make the trip to Caldwell to play the title-bound Cougars and Blackfoot Invaders American Falls. Comparative scores show Caldwell and American Falls as the probable winners.

Monday the Armistice will be celebrated by four traditional Big Ten battles. Coach Bernard Martin's Piler Wildcats will invade Twin Falls. Coach Duane Kline's Boly Bulldogs will invade Burley. Coach Brown's Burley Bulldogs will play at Rupert and Idaho Falls meet Pocatello in the Gate City. Twin Falls, due to past showings this year is favored to curb the Piler threat, Boly and Nampa are slated for a tough fight with neither team given a decisive margin of victory by dopsters. Boly is favored over Rupert, and the Gate City Indians are given an edge over the Idaho Falls Invaders.

Although the South Side Class "B" schedule has been completed, games on the North side today pit Dietrich against Hagerman at Hagerman, Richfield against Glenn Ferry at Glenn Ferry, and Fairfield against King Hill at King Hill.

Hagerman is given a strong margin of victory over Dietrich, the Ferrymen are given a slight edge.

The president-nominee was graduated from Yale, where he won his letter-in-bachelor and was a member of the golf team. He was a captain of field artillery during the war.

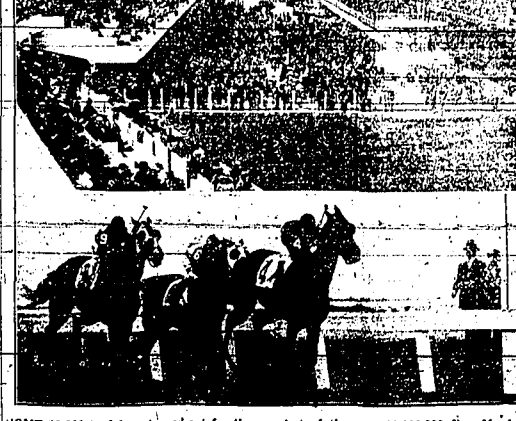

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Nov. 8 (AP)—The University of Illinois, where there aren't any drug stores and where they take the letter with a sweat, Bob Zuppke is repaying confidence in his ability as a coach, with the dividends this year.

His head bunting with more incredible schemes and tricks than ever before, the little Dutchman is hauling the Illini back to the football with the very force of his genius in his twenty-second season as commander of the Orange and Blue. His team of today, undefeated and untied, is one of his greatest coaching masterpieces.

During the 1932-33 season of 1932-33, when the Illini suffered some of their most frightful losses in history, not one word of sound was raised in criticism of the little Dutchman in direct contrast to other universities and colleges where a series of defeats prompted the wolves to howl for the scalp of the unfortunate coaches.
