## STATES MAY SHARE RELIEF SAYS ROSS

Executive Expects Federal  
Request for Idaho  
Tax Levy

BOISE, Nov. 16.—(Press)—An announcement recently by the FERA that the states would have to absorb a greater share of the relief burden, Governor C. Ben Ross declared he believed a tax to raise such funds might be asked of the next legislature.

He did not discuss the nature of the tax, but went on to add that he was certain the next congress would not allow the FERA to exact an "excessive share" of relief support from the states.

Moreover, he declared that in event the states are required to supply part of the relief funds, "they must be given a greater voice in administration of relief."

He declared state participation would increase efficiency of the relief administration.

"Wherever human beings are involved," he continued, "there will be irregularities. By that I mean—various poor judgment and downright dishonesty. Friends will get jobs who don't really need them. This sort of thing, we can't eliminate it but it can be reduced to a minimum."

"One more important, the state will be able to raise a greater extent what the money will be spent for. In Idaho there are many projects which are just waste, nothing but waste. Grants which have been played up and received which did not require it."

Reserve Projects Started

"When the relief and food programs started in Idaho," he said, "the planners select 60 sites for small reservoirs which could be built and save water from going to waste. We have managed to get work started on four of them. But right near each one there are many projects which are just waste, nothing but waste. # Taditional Rivalry Marks College Football Warfare

## Bob Olin Takes Maxie Rosenbloom's Light Heavyweight Title

### Undeclared Eleven's Face Severe Tests In Eastern Battles

Princeton, Syracuse and Navy Engage in Major Contests; Idaho Vandals Meet California Bears

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16 (AP)—Intersectional warfare gives way to traditional rivalry tomorrow along most of the nation's far-flung battlefield of college football, with the main national interest focused upon the fight of three unbeaten, united eastern aggregations to keep their banners from being abruptly snatched down from the heights.

Generally speaking, in the South, Middle West and Far West, the chief championship contenders appear to have comparatively little to worry about. The family row in the East reaches a grand climax with the perfect records of Princeton, Syracuse and the Navy at the stake.

Yale has only a remote chance of upsetting the terrible Tigers in a renewal at Princeton of one of the nation's oldest football rivalries but Syracuse's fine team will be severely tested by California's brilliant attack, one of the most baffling in the East, while Navy's sturdy, resourceful crew will be lucky to escape a trouncing at the hands of the powerful Pittsburgh Panthers.

Tigers Vastly Superior

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### Clowning Champion Loses Fight Crown In Slow Encounter

Two Pugilists Stumble Way Through 15 Weary Rounds Without Inflicting Noticeable Damage

NEILL (Associated Press Staff Writer) MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, Nov. 16 (AP)—Bob Olin, gliding in the golden amateur-ranks, dethroned Maxie Rosenbloom, clowning champion of the light heavyweights for the past four years, in a 15-round match tonight before a crowd of 7,000. It was as poor a fight as a New York crowd ever saw.

For 15 weary rounds, Rosenbloom, once a past master of the hit and get away act, stumbled his way along, his speed, his stamina, everything that made him a champion, gone. Olin, New York golden gloves champion, wasn't much better. He could scarcely have been worse, and he didn't.

There were no knockdowns, scarcely anything at all, and the scoring was a tie, 15-15. The fight was a "draw" in the eyes of the judges.

One of Rosenbloom's alphas brought a dash of red from Olin's nose in the seventh, but otherwise no damage was done to anyone except the customers.

Olin lost the first round for fouling, hitting on the break, and he was downed by Rosenbloom in the fourth. In that round, Rosenbloom weighed 175, Olin 170.

Rosenbloom was on the defensive until the last two rounds. Then he stepped up with a flash of his old time form and had a slight edge at the finish. He unleashed a brief lightning attack that had the New York cheering and for a few brief moments the crowd actually stopped booing.
