BORAH AGAIN CALLS FOR REVAMPING OF REPUBLICAN PARTY

Idahoan Challenges N. Y. Committee's Advice; For Revolt of Young and Liberal G. O. P. Elements

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—A revolt by young and liberal Republican elements to force a "complete reorganization" of the party for the 1936 campaign was proposed today by Senator Borah.

The Idaho Republican demanded that he be called a "revolution" unless the conservatives now in control hold a meeting, at once, to cooperate in the plan.

In a statement concerning a proposal of Charles F. Brannan, national committee man from New York, that the party group against reorganization be dissolved in national convention, Borah in effect challenged Chairman Henry P. Fletcher and the Hillers group to "re-organize" the party.

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### READERS DISAGREE ON HOPKINS PLAN

#### Proposal Calls for Creation of \$8,000,000,000 Reli- ef Corporation

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (AP)—A plan to be placed before President Hoover by Harry A. Hopkins, the relief administrator, calling for the creation of an \$8,000,000,000 federal work relief corporation, was described authoritatively here as having precipitated a sharp division among presidential advisers and cabinet members.

A question as to which of two courses the federal government should take toward getting the unemployed off relief rolls and back on payrolls was disclosed to have caused the split of opinion. The suggestion drawn up by Hopkins calls for setting up a federal work relief corporation with a total appropriation of \$8,000,000,000 to \$9,000,000,000. The other, being suggested by the treasury secretary, would set to the relief work from further federal spending and endeavor to have private industry produce and employ as many as would be done still in the process of re-formation.

#### To Visit President

The Hopkins plan was to be placed before the president during the president's visit to the Idaho State Capitol at Warm Springs. Hopkins argues that business cannot yet take up the slack of unemployment relief until it is fully paid for by a work relief corporation provided with a simple fund.

The plan was described as contemplating an expansion of the unemployment home program, a housing program to produce more work for low wage earners, the establishment of self-help cooperatives to produce and employ as many as possible, rural rehabilitation and marginal-land reclamation.

#### French Deputies Give Smashing Vote of Confidence on Budget

PARIS, Dec. 1 (AP)—Premier Pierre Etienne Flandin gave an overwhelming vote of confidence in the chamber of deputies today to his budget, which will bring his 1,200,000,000 francs approximately \$460,000,000 for 1935. The vote, 437 to 106, was the largest since 1928.

#### Stock Market Stable

Another surge of the gain was cited in the stability of the stock market. For the week ended November 10, the market was quiet for a longer period than it has been since the beginning of 1932.

These government economists, although unwilling to be quoted, are known to have tentatively reached this same conclusion. An upward swing is ordinarily understood to mean a long term movement of business.

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### LABOR CASE GOES TO FEDERAL COURT

#### Enforcement of Board's Interpretation of NRA Clause Sought

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (AP)—The department of justice, instituting injunction proceedings in the House "majority rule" case, today gave the federal courts an opportunity to say what they think congress meant by the recovery act's labor clause.

The district attorney of western New York was instructed to ask the district court in Buffalo to enforce the labor relation board's interpretation as applied to the House engineering company of Buffalo.

In line with the request of the labor board the court was asked: (1) To direct the House company "to cause in good faith to reach an agreement" with the United Automobile workers as representative of all the company's employees. The United Automobile workers are affiliated with the American Federation of Labor.

(2) To enjoin the company from bargaining with any other group regarding wages and hours in its plant.

(3) To enjoin the company from "interfering with, restraining and coercing by any manner or means, its employees in their self-organization," and from interfering "in any way or manner with the organization of its employees known as the United Automobile workers."

(4) To answer the bill of complaint alleging the company had violated the recovery act.

**Factor in Labor's Drive**  
The House case is an offshoot factor in the American Federation of Labor's drive against so-called company or "inside" unions. The case arose after an election had been held in the plant last summer to determine whether the A. F. of L. unit of the House welfare and athletic association, an "inside" union, should represent the employes in collective bargaining.

The A. F. of L. unit won, 1166 to 674. The company then let it be known, however, that it would recognize the "inside" union as well as the United Automobile workers—a so-called "dual" arrangement. The issue of "majority rule" thus became involved.

Under yesterday's action, if the normal court procedure for this type of equity case is followed, the court would ask the defendant company to "show cause" why the injunction should not be granted.

In view of the company's publicly announced refusal to comply with the board's decision, labor observers here expect the company to carry the case to higher courts if the injunctions are granted. These same observers expect the government to appeal if it receives an adverse decision in Buffalo.

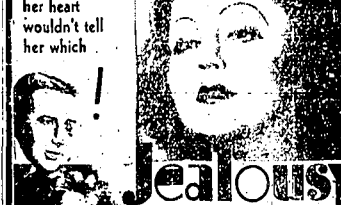

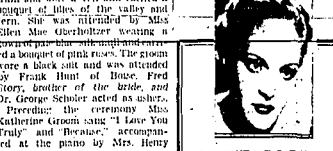

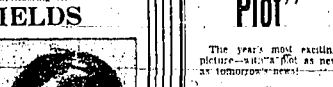

### ITALY QUESTIONS CURB ON JAPANESE

#### Government Spokesman Suggests Expansion in Orient Advisable

ROME, Dec. 1 (AP)—Japan's threatened expansion into African territories where Italy has extensive colonies, although information has been received from Paris that France had refused a similar Japanese proposal.

With the return of King Emmanuel aboard the royal yacht Savaria from the African coast, Italy's policy with regard to Japanese expansion had undergone a complete reversal, according to Alessandro Leona, under-secretary of colonies, stated in his position in a recent speech at St. James.

"In the Far East," he said, "the Italian position tends to be conservative in the face of the complexly and importance of European interests in that region of the world. For the first time in history, offers the example of people of 60,000,000 inhabitants and a considerable economy, industrially and in a military way."

Danger for Europe  
"The high rate, energy and spirit of sacrifice of the Japanese, the expansionist policy they seek for new markets, all these combine to make Japan a very great danger for Europe. Her policies and her actions are the surest danger which turns all Oriental policy."

The more one restricts the Japanese expansion in the East, the more she will try to expand in other sections and in other continents. She is already by Japanese activity in Abyssinia.

It was understood that despite this view the Italian government will not accept Japanese invitation, but that it itself the invitation caused the Japanese problem with increased interest.

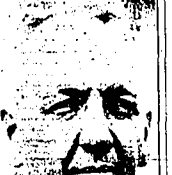

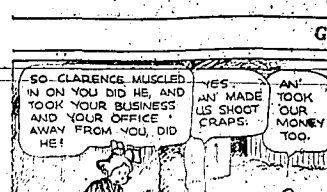

Throngs Course Through Empire Headquarters on Opening Day

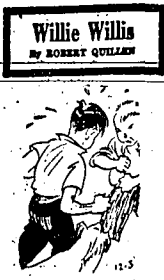
