



# MUNITIONS MAKER SOUNDS CHALLENGE TO SENATE'S QUIZ

## Impulsions Get Story That Dupont Explosives Went to Manchuria Despite Embargo; Dislaimer Entered

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—The story of an indirect shipment of Dupont explosives to Manchuria, despite embargo restrictions, a cargo that literally "changed its appearance at sea," was inserted today into the records of the senate munitions investigation.

Denying all knowledge of the destination of the shipment, Dupont officials accused the committee of building up a case against their industry by hearsay and "second-hand gossip." Tense Dupont directly challenged the committee led by Carl H. Hoover for questioning on a previous development of the industry.

The committee, which yesterday received testimony that Hoover, assistant secretary of the committee of commerce, was chairman of a committee of gun makers for a meeting with delegates to the 1928 Geneva arms conference, had previously had an inclination to ignore the challenge, although they might say, "Hoover, might say, 'Hoover tells'."

### Hoover Tells Circumstances

The former chief executive meanwhile issued a statement at Palo Alto asserting that the meeting of the committee was called at the request of the secretary of state, then Frank B. Kellogg, and consisted of "giving a hearing to the manufacturers' views as to the methods of discriminating between sporting arms on the one hand and military arms on the other."

# 66 EXECUTIONS IN RUSSIA REPORTED

Death Sentences Result of Investigation Into Assassination

LONDON, Dec. 5 (AP)—British news dispatches from Moscow today said 66 persons had been executed after being convicted of counter-revolutionary activities by supreme military courts.

The court at Leningrad sentenced 37 to die, the dispatches said, while 29 were condemned in the court at Moscow.

The sentences and executions grew out of the investigation into the assassination of Sergei Kirov, member of the Communist party's political bureau, at Leningrad, Saturday.

Both the Moscow and Leningrad courts sat on December 1, it was announced.

The charge against those executed was preparing and organizing acts of terrorism against Soviet officials.

The court at Leningrad found most of those accused entered Russia either through Latvia, Finland, or Poland, it was stated.

Originally there were 36 men under charges at Leningrad. Two of them were held for further examination and the rest executed.

Thirty-two faced the same charges at Moscow and three were held there for further examination.

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### REFUND PAYMENTS SHOW VARIATIONS

#### Beet Growers Soon to Receive Hundreds of Thousands of Dollars

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—Sugar beet farmers of the West soon will receive hundreds of thousands of dollars under supplemental AAA refund contracts. Payment will be made as soon as the contracts are signed and returned to the farm administration.

Senator O'Mahoney (D-Wyo) said the refund payment to sugar beet producers for the 1933-34 crop will amount to approximately \$118,000 in Wyoming, \$726,000 in Colorado, \$234,000 in Nebraska, \$347,000 in Utah and \$120,000 in Idaho.

Refund payments vary from a few cents to nearly 50 cents per ton of beets to farmers who have received factory districts under sugar contracts which are of a participating nature based on the sale of sugar.

O'Mahoney explained the variation in the amount of the refund payment between factory districts is due to the difference in the quantity of sugar as of June 8, 1934, except in the case of a very few factories where the contract of the processor was such as to guarantee the producer more than his participation in the refund payment in which case no refund payments are to be made.

Refund payments per ton of beets in Utah and Salt Lake counties in Utah under the Utah-Idaho Sugar company will be \$20.

Payments per ton in Idaho follow: Upper Snake River valley, \$4.00; Burley-Paul, \$2.85; Twin Falls, \$3.90 and Franklin county, \$3.00.

O'Mahoney said the refund payments take care of reductions which the farmer would have suffered through imposition of the 50-cent tax on the 1933-34 holdover without provisions of the sugar control act.

### SALE OF PRISON FARM SUGGESTED

Idaho Warden Says Cost Out of Proportion to Good Accomplished

BOISE, Dec. 5 (AP)—Sale of the 200-acre Eagle Island prison farm to the administration of Governor Burdette for \$10,000 to provide an outside market for the produce of the farm, was recommended today by Warden Ira J. Taylor in his annual report to the state prison board.

"The cost of maintenance is out of proportion to the good that is accomplished," Taylor said in his report on the farm.

The land was bought in 1929 under the administration of Governor Burdette for \$10,000 to provide an outside market for the produce of the farm, which is now being diverted with growing of the fruit factory. This latter was made necessary by federal laws restricting movement of prison produce in interstate commerce.

"The warden urged an appropriation to provide some kind of industry to be carried on within the prison walls, adding that the present absence of our inmate body presents a major problem."

He reported an average population of 215 during the past two years, a figure comparing with a peak of 426 prisoners during the preceding biennium.

### AAA To Resume Purchase Of Cattle

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—The agricultural adjustment administration disclosed tonight resumption of cattle purchases in drought areas was being started with around 1,000,000 head costing approximately \$17,000,000 to be bought for movement to regions with feed.

Partial lease already has been set up at Kottus City, the AAA announced, and state extension officials and county agents where feed supplies are sufficient are notifying farmers of the plan.

Amounts spent so far included: Idaho \$24,600; Oregon \$17,673; Utah, \$121.

### Government Payroll Advance Continues

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—The federal government's payroll for employees in the executive branches passed \$100,000,000 in October.

A report issued by the civil service commission showed 680,181 employees, 2,222 in the field and 538,659 in the capital. Their pay totaled \$101,888,373.

In September employees numbered 677,171 and the payroll was \$98,694,611.

Since the first of the year, the civil service commission's figures showed, the government had added 80,000 employees, about 70,000 of them in the field.

The October total is still 22,000 below the year peak but higher than at any time since then.

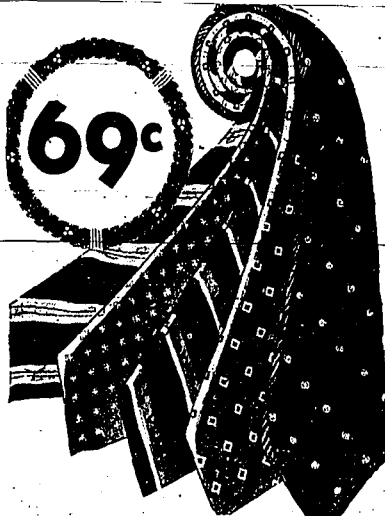

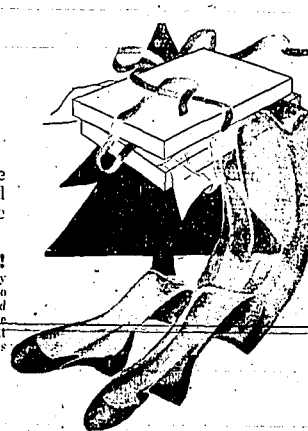

### ROOSEVELT OKERS AGREEMENT CONTROL

#### President Uses Figures to Show Cheap Cotton Does Not Boost Exports

**WARREN SPRINGS, Dec. 5 (AP)**—President Roosevelt has again endorsed the Bankhead cotton control act as the salvation of the South as announced before an exemption of farmers producing no more than two bales.

Mr. Roosevelt held a private conference with the farmer before the price of his product and the goods he buys.

Read the following statement in a talk to his supporters: "If the Bankhead act is continued in effect for another year it is my purpose to recommend that Congress amend the present act to exempt from the amount of two bales production to each farmer who has established a base of production of not more than two bales of cotton.

The president cited figures to show that the actual price for cotton in 1933 would have been about 13 cents while the actual price was 5 1/2 cents. Today he said that the actual price is about 15 cents while the actual price is about 12 1/2 cents. This he regards as quite an accomplishment.

**Strikes at Surplus**  
Mr. Roosevelt also asserted that when the price was as low as 5 1/2 cents exports were diminishing. In other words, cheap cotton does not mean increased exports and therefore the reduction of the huge surplus must be accomplished by acreage control.

He believes the existing 10,250,000 bale surplus can be cut to 4,750,000 by next August and to 3,750,000 in a couple of years the normal surplus of 4,000,000 bales will be reached.

He warned, however, there was no objective to bring about 20 or 25 cents cotton. Rather to reach that objective was to give parity for the farmers of the south and to see if that that it would be about more than any single thing in the life time of the people here today.

**Factor in Referendum**  
The vote this month in a referendum on the Bankhead cotton control act and the presidential view was regarded as destined to have an effect.

The exemption for two bale cotton farmers from the control act will affect about 600,000 acres and the amount of cotton is estimated at only 700,000 bales or a "drop in the bucket." "I am on friendly terms with the family," she said.

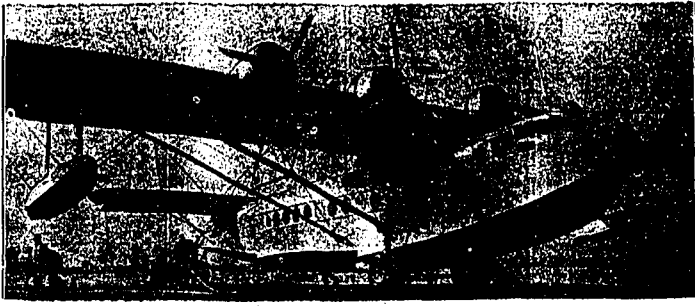

FERA Gets Authority to Resume Livestock Purchases

BOISE, Dec. 5 (AP)—Authority was granted today for the purchase of 18,000 head of cattle for processing in the state if plants are available to handle them.

The announcement came soon after purchase of 200 carloads of potatoes was started, with a prospect that 400 carloads additional may be bought.

The order for buying cattle was sent from the federal surplus relief corporation in Washington to resume a program interrupted two months ago.

Originally Idaho's quota was 60,000 head.

Governor Ross and P. C. Meredith, relief administrator, advised the surplus relief corporation in reply to a question, that the surplus relief corporation should purchase.

The surplus relief corporation plants. They coupled this with a suggestion that the processing be extended over a period of several months to permit orderly handling as well as to allow fattening of some of the stock on hay available in another part of the state from where the animals are being bought.

They also look to be buying drought relief cattle and at the same time have the state offer to feed them commencing in January.

"But the situation is that the cattle in the east part of the state and the surplus feed in the west, 200 miles distant, we suggested that about 2000 head be processed at once and the remainder 2000 be moved to Idaho where feed is available. This could be fattened until next February 1 and then processed. Surplus feed in western Idaho would then be eliminated and the government would lose nothing, while the surplus would be converted into beef for distribution among the needy."

Financing authorizing the purchase was expected to get under way promptly. Meredith said the potatoes would be bought from districts reporting a surplus.

"We are paying 40 cents a bushel for No. 2," Meredith said. "That compares with 30 cents a bushel before we got into the market." He said the AAA had indicated authority might be granted to buy an additional 1800 carloads of potatoes.

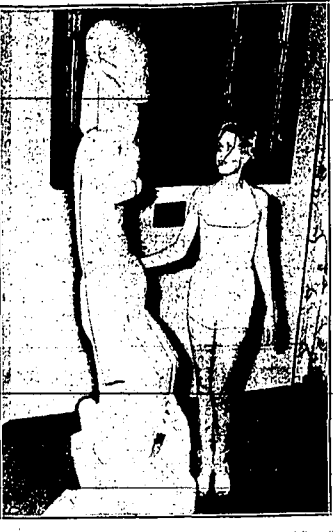

Toffenire took to the proverbial stump and auctioned off everything from soup to nuts as the opening sale at the Twin Falls County exposition headquarters brought fulfillment of the most optimistic expectations.

For the first time during the exposition the actual value of "easy-money" was demonstrated in a big way and the sale prices ranged from 1¢ to \$225. Three auctions were held during the day and the house was packed to capacity each time.

Augmented by the \$100,000 dropped out of the sky as two planes soared over south central Idaho towns last Friday, prices reached what is believed to have been a peak. However, even though a bridge jump did sell for \$225, a set of stoves for \$20, a motor box for \$250, an electric clock for \$175 and an automobile tire for \$180, many other bargains were sold to the initial bidder for \$1 of the scrip.

Small boys who gathered up quantities of scrip, as it was called, from the planes seemed to almost

have a corner on the morning auction and at times a single candy bar would go for as high as \$25. However, as the afternoon auctions got under way and most of the airplane currency had fallen back into the hands of the exposition, the situation was taken in hand by persons getting the cash with purchases from local merchants.

Bidding throughout the day was lively and the auction brought persons from Minidoka to Hagerman into Twin Falls for the affair. The auction, according to committee men in charge, far surpassed even the most optimistic expectations.

With the exception of the entrance of every person into the exposition building, the total receipts of the day were recorded in its initial opening Saturday was recorded at 22,265 last night. At this rate of attendance keeps going, statisticians show that 407,043 persons will have passed through the exposition portals by the close of the exposition. This, however, is according to the electric eye.

Continuing throughout the 12 weeks of the exposition, the auction in the future are predicted to be just as lively as was the opening. Sales will be held every day and every Wednesday during this period.

Chief of Wheat Section Defends Control Program

LEWISTON, Idaho, Dec. 5 (AP)—Arguments that under consumption is being made for American wheat this and that the country should limit wheat production and restrict the export market were branded as "bedtime stories" by George F. Farrell, chief of the wheat section of the AAA, in an address before a meeting of more than 1,000 central Idaho farmers here today.

"When times are tough we eat more wheat," Farrell said. "In good times the folks mix in a little more, a wheat, a salad and a dessert and only one slice of bread. The total possible annual consumption in the United States is 25,000,000 bushels annually. What is the use then of producing 325,000,000 bushels annually? All that we can gain is grief."

Farrell said that transportation costs and tariff imposts have taken all profit out of production when he said that it will take time to break down the tariff walls.

"The wheat program is going to be carried out in a most satisfactory manner," Farrell said when he stressed the surplus we have made an impression on the price of wheat. Harry L. 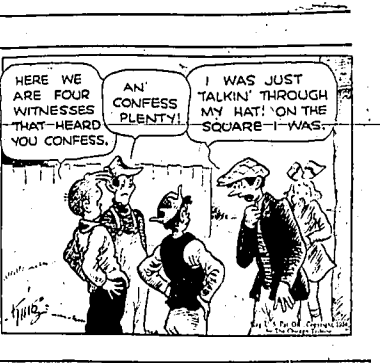

### CITY OFFICIALS TACKLE PROBLEMS

Relief Programs Bring New Burdens to Municipalities, Disclosed

Idaho Municipal Officers' association winding up two-day annual session here today, turned its attention to new problems that relief programs promise to bring to municipalities, and developed in discussion a number of suggestions for the resolutions committee's consideration.

"We know that the coming session of congress will add new burdens to municipalities and we must look to legislation either to broaden the scope of municipal activities and taxing power, or for state aid in meeting emergency expenditures," one speaker asserted.

This problem which overburdened others under consideration at first day session, was brought into the open by the first speaker, Duncan M.D. Johnson, Twin Falls mayor, who discussed compensation insurance in relation to the FERA.

Speakers on the program for today will be K. C. Barlow of Burley, state senator and mayor of Burley, who is to discuss municipal financing, and W. H. Manning, director of federal housing act architect and member of the state planning board.

Look to Legislature

The program provides for general discussion following the presentation of each project brought for consideration, and out of the suggestions advanced the association expects to work out its recommendations to the state legislature concerning the situation.

Reports of committees and election of new officers, then attention turned to the two sessions to a close.

The resolutions committee named Harry Burley as committee member, Fred P. Kimball of Orofino and George C. Huebner of Boise.

First-day speakers besides Twin Falls mayor were Walter Chrysler of Boise, who told of his experience with municipal waterworks and power distribution systems, and Paul Davis of Boise, representative of the FERA.

J. J. McCae, mayor of Boise and president of the association, responded to an address of welcome delivered at the opening session by D. J. Cavanagh of Twin Falls, state representative and member of the state planning board.

Huebner, secretary of the association, were speakers at a banquet session here at the Regency hotel, last evening, the former discussing municipal problems generally and the latter tracing the history of the municipal officers' organization since its inception in Boise nearly five years ago.
