MR. DOUGLAS SPEAKS

Lewis Douglas, director of the budget under President Rossevelt until a few months ago when he resigned, declares that the government cannot proceed much farther under the present financial programme without courting economic disaster. His actual words are somewhat stronger. The programme he says "is leading inevitably to a cóllapsed currency and a ghastly social and economic calamity."

According to Mr. Douglas the only way to bring about recovery is through a balanced budget and immediate stoppage of all public works expenditures and discontinuance of the Civilian Conservation Corps. With this step taken it would be possible to balance the budget by 1937. Continuation of the present government spending he says will bring about a collapse of the currency and result in economic and financial chaos.

The words of Mr. Douglas are worth con sidering. Selected as the man best qualified for the job of budget director and placed in a position to view at short range every move in the Federal financial policy and to check effects and results at every step of the way Mr. Douglas resigned when he found that osition had nothing to do with the direc tion of Federal spending and that a balanced budget was not, primarily, the thing sought

by the government.

It may be that Mr. Douglas is right in his contentions and yet there remains the old question as to what else could have been done circumstances. Nobody pretends to believe that the government can go on forever borrowing money to clothe, feed, house and supervise the health, recreation and social activities of eighteen million people and yet a general resumption of business with its attendant increase in wages and augmented purchasing power in all lines might render comparatively easy the work of balancing the budget.

In the meantime apparently nobody

worries very much about it. The average man seems to figure that the country is confronted by a condition for which he is not responsible and with the solution of which he has nothing to do. It is purely the business of the government and the government will attend to it.

So what?

TAX LOOPHOLES

The announced hope of the administration that it may avoid imposition of new tax levies obviously does not mean that higher revenues are not sought. It is hoped that business will improve steadily, raising tax col-

lections as it goes up. But that is not all.

The powerful House ways and means committee is already studying certain revenue proposals to put before the coming session of Congress. Several of its members have expressed determination to eliminate the flaws in existing tax laws which cheat th rlaws in existing fax laws which cheat the government. Loopholes are to be plugged and administrative provisions clarified, so that none who should rightfully pay taxes can escape by legal technicality or trickery. Such a movement will meet with whole-

hearted public support. Taxpayers would be more willing to have tax rates increased a little or to have new levies imposed if they knew that the laws would be applied uniformly and fairly.

WHEN INFLATION COMES
If or when inflation comes, it may be not a currency inflation but a business inflation one inspired not by fear, but by confidence Some of the experts are inclined now to this

view. A Babson man said recently that he thought it would come after the government budget was balanced.

If that is true, some will worry less shout present deferment of budget-balancing.
Others will greet it with a glad hand when--balancing. ever it arrives. For that sort of inflation would be good business all round, with rising employment, incomes, prices and profits and a good market again for real estate.

The essential thing for safety is to keep it from coming on too fast and going too far. There should be brakes for business inflation, just as there should be stimulants, within reason, for business deflation.




