Fruitless Tri-Power Conversations Formally Adjourned at London When Tokyo Insists on Parity

(By The Associated Press) The world's major naval powers—Great Britain, the United States and Japan—Wednesday were facing the possibility of another such ship-building program as that which, 13 years ago, brought the Washington treaty of limitation into being.

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SISTO'S DRAMATIC BATTLE DESCRIBED

Captain Relates Struggle With Storm and Daring Rescue

ABOARD S. S. NEW YORK, en route to Cherbourg, France, Dec. 18—Sisters worn and weary seamen manhandled from the very edge of Davy Jones' locker were on route to Cherbourg today, aboard the steamer that rescued them from the sinking ship Sisto.

A lifeboat in charge of Second Officer Wilson braved high seas for two hours to save the 16 officers and crewmen of the alarm-battered Sisto. While the rescue was effected, the Aurania, one of the several vessels that answered the freighter's calls, poured oil on the water and the Europa, another, played searchlights over the wrecked scene.

Hundreds of severely dressed passengers aboard the Europa lined the rail, despite the whipping wind, to watch enthralled as Wilson and his men, partly aided by the Europa's great bulk, fought their way to the Sisto's side, picked up the men as they plunged one by one into the water and battled their way back to the New York.

Captain Describes Struggle
Captain Retzeus, of the ill-fated Norwegian freighter, graphically described his own battle with the storm for the Associated Press. Bound from Puget Sound, N. S., to Seattle, the little freighter met the "terrific hurricane" December 13-14 and lost all her lifeboats, he said.

The front part of the bridge was carried away and the doors of the saloon were smashed in, he related, "allowing seas to wash in and force the crew to leave the forecastle. There was great danger of the deck cargo covering the entrance, preventing the crew from returning to the main deck. The danger of being washed overboard."

"Sunday night the storm again increased in fury. The hurricane lashed all day Monday and Tuesday with huge breakers rolling over the ship." Monday evening, the captain said, the ship refused to obey the wheel, the rudder apparently having been broken, and the Sisto called for help. The New York, Aurania, President Harding, Duran and Gretchen, together with the S. S. Mobil, arrived, and all stood by for several hours.

"The New York, making the first contact with the Sisto, took off her crew in the morning. Captain Retzeus continued all day Tuesday night the danger increased, requiring the New York to start its salvage operations immediately, despite the tremendous seas."

"The New York's lifeboat crew, working valiantly, managed to reach the Sisto, although the Sisto's list momentarily threatened the craft with a crash. Despite these overwhelming difficulties, the Sisto's crew of 16 was hauled through the water by lines and pulled into the lifeboat."

Face Increased Danger
"Returning to the New York, the lifeboat crew, due to the increased weight of those they had rescued, faced an increased danger of smashing up, but through excellent seamanship they succeeded in the wonderful feat of taking us safely aboard the New York."

Radio Operator Stodd of the New York said the "west northwest storm" blowing the Sisto and the wrecked ships was of "force nine" (On the Beaufort scale, 47 to 54 miles an hour).

"After two hours of extraordinarily hard work and extremely high seas, the rescue was finished successfully," he said, "at 11 a. m. Today the whole crew of the wreck was on board safely and unhurt."

DROUGHT MONEY FOR SURVEY ON SALMON

In years when there is a shortage of salmon, the supply is not adequate to mature crops. Wood plans to place the land in two classes: one, containing 10,000 acres, would be assured of 3 1/2 acre feet annually; the other, composed of 100 acres, would have a water right of 1 1/2 acre feet in normal years.

It will be up to the district to decide on how the acreage reduction is to be effected, he said.

IERA - Survey Shows 17,082 Unemployed Persons on Lists for Aid

BOISE, Dec. 19 (AP)—On December 17, 17,082 unemployed men who have qualified for the work relief program of the Idaho emergency road construction project were registered by the IERA, Raymond Thompson, head of the IERA public relations department, announced today.

"A relief client, in applying for work relief, is allowed two classifications," Thompson explained. "He may be a carpenter by trade, and may be designated thus in his primary classification.

"But realizing there is little opportunity for work as a carpenter in the mountainous region, where available, the client will register as a laborer under the secondary classification, thus showing his primary occupation, thus showing his primary occupation, where available. This accounts for the high percentage of registrations as laborers.

"The general policy of the IERA is that all registered able bodied men and women must work for their relief on some highway project wherever possible," Thompson explained. "Of 167 men have been classified, he said, while it is generally understood that more than 167 farmers are now work relief in each of several counties.

"The reasons the men do not register primarily as farmers is due to two factors: First, there are no special projects under the IERA program where the client's ability as a farmer would be of particular benefit; second, the average farmer in the county of Idaho is really a part-time farmer, depending on outside work in the forests, in the sawmills and in the hay fields, to round out his required income. So they frequently register as stockmen, mechanics or mechanics.

IERA registrations on work relief also cover 35 cooks; 3 salaried; 41 miners; 2 mill workers; 39 truck drivers and 187 farmers. In the women's registrations are 40 practical nurses; 487 hotel and domestic; 746 stenographers; many registrations as clerical and stenographers.

COMMITTEE GIVES LIBRARY ESTIMATE

Cost of materials for a public library building, providing for 5000 square feet of floor space, would approximate \$13,129, Wilbur S. Organizations expressed themselves in favor of the building, and were reluctant to make any definite financial pledges at this time. John Kinney, president of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, stated that the matter would be discussed at the next meeting of the board of directors.

Speaking for the Kiwanis club, Wilbur S. Hill said that the organization was "very much interested but not in a position to promise anything financially."

Miss C. H. Krenner brought the message that Joseph T. P. E. O. Saterhood had discussed the matter, regarding the building of a library, in practical and was to support the library building movement.

The former foreign minister's withdrawal from the old cabinet precipitated a crisis which concluded with the resignation of the entire membership.

Yavitch won praise for the manner in which he presented before the League of Nations council the Yugoslav charges that Hungary was guilty of complicity in the assassination of King Alexander.

The league's report on the critical dispute was interpreted here as a Yugoslav triumph.

It is quite generally understood that Yavitch withdrew from the government because his colleagues in the cabinet, some of them political enemies, failed to share the general enthusiasm for his services.

Primo Paul, head of the regency, instructed Yavitch to organize a government of national concentration, giving as widespread representation as possible to the diverse elements which compose the Serbo-Croat-Slovene state.

Eugene R. Black, Leader in American Finance, Succumbs

ATLANTA, Dec. 29.—Eugene R. Black, head of the nation's Federal Reserve bank system during some of the country's most turbulent days of finance, and personal friend of President Roosevelt, died today at his home here.

President Roosevelt drafted Black early in 1933 as governor of the Federal Reserve bank for his post as governor of the Sixth Federal Reserve bank here.

Black led opposition of the Reserve system to surrendering its stock of bonds of gold, striking back with \$50,000,000 and although against this step by the president, there was no break in the personal friendship between the Atlantic banker and Mr. Roosevelt.

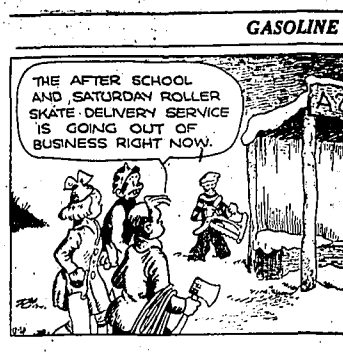

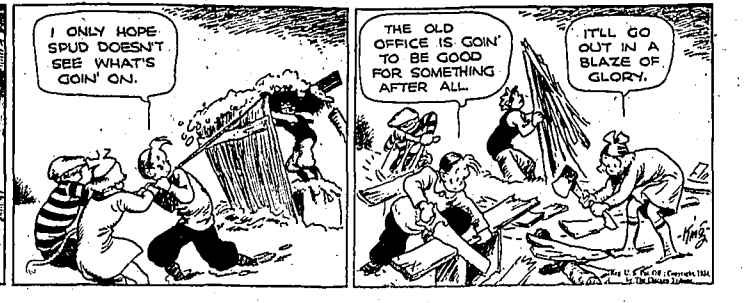

CROP CURTAILMENT BEET CONTRACT AIM

Growers Accepting Payment Not Obligated to Plant Subsequent Years

Growers signing sugar beet contracts under the Jones-Costigan act are not obligated to plant beets this or subsequent years, Harvey S. Hale, county agent, said yesterday, answering a question that has been asked frequently during the contract sign-up that has been under way at the county agent's office in Twin Falls the past several days. Approximately one-half of some 800 total of contracts in this county already have been signed, the county agent said. Five persons have been employed this week assisting growers in the sign-up. Under provisions of the contract, growers receive a permit to raise a limited sugar beet crop, but, unlike the wheat adjustment contract, the beet contract does not require growers to plant any part of their land to be eligible for the contract. It is necessary to sign the contract in order to participate in the distribution of the growers share of the proceeds tax collected by the federal government. On the basis of representative yields, growers who sign the contract will be paid for the 1934 crop, and on the basis of actual tonnage they will be paid at this time approximately 39 cents per ton on the 1933 crop. In the Twin Falls factory district there was produced in 1933, 20,240 tons of beets, according to factory records, and there was planted in this district last year 9004 acres of beets. The factory record of average production for four years, 1930-1933, is 10,288 tons per acre.
