NEVADANS DISCOVER CRUSHED BODIES OF AIR CRASH VICTIMS

Three Young Passengers and Pilot Killed When Plane Struck Cliff; 10 Men Carry Bodies to Ranch

(By The Associated Press) ELKO, Nev., Dec. 24.—Carrying their grim burden over 15 miles of rugged country buried deep in snow, ten young men today struggled towards the plane that crashed 60 miles north of here, with the mangled bodies of the four young victims of the most tragic airplane crash in Nevada's history.

Found early today in the splintered wreckage of their plane at the mouth of the black Owyhee canyon, the bodies were those of Floyd De la Cruz, 17-year-old pilot, Donald Blanton, 15; his sister, June, 16, and Ruth Womack, 13, all of Mountain City, Nev.

The ten men in the party, who found the plane after a search that started yesterday afternoon, hoped to reach the Johnson ranch before night fall. There they were to meet Sheriff J. C. Harris of Elko, who with Walter Cole, proceeding to the ranch by automobile.

Boodies Crashed.—Late reports in Elko said all the bodies had been crushed almost beyond recognition. The plane apparently crashed through a big pine tree late yesterday afternoon after its pilot became lost in a heavy fog and hit the snow.

He was flying the Blanton children home to Mountain City from the home of their mother at Elko, who died here Wednesday of pneumonia. The Womack girl, daughter of Claude Womack, Mountain City resident, accompanied them on the flight.

With three of their four children dead within a week, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Blanton were reported in a serious condition, prostrated with grief, at Mountain City today.

They returned there today in a plane piloted by Lieutenant Newcomb.

FIVE MEMBERS OF FAMILY MURDERED

Woman, Grief-Stricken After Death of Child, Stages Wholesale Killings

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 24 (AP)—At 81 St. Rivers' street, a woman who died in her cot and with a knife buried beside her, staged a wholesale killing of five members of her family.

By her death with his father and three brothers in an undertaking establishment only a short distance away, and his mother, unaware her complete family had been wiped out, she ended her life.

The end of this family of modest means occurred in their frame house last night, after the mother, who was in the early morning hours yesterday.

Only One Survives.—Of the family of eight, only Mrs. Dempsey survives and she has a bullet wound in her head. Father August Schoppe, pastor of St. Theresa's, a Catholic church, administered the last sacraments to the victims in the early morning hours Sunday after neighbors around him with word to "come quickly, father, something terrible has happened."

CONTRACTS ASSURE MIGHTY AIR FORCE

U. S. to Begin Acquisition of More Than 800 New Planes

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (AP)—The army air corps today prepared to begin the new year with an expansion program which the war department asserts will give the United States an aerial armada rivaling that of any other power.

Announcement by Harry H. Woodruff, assistant secretary of war, of the new year of a contract for 71 observation planes to the Douglas Aircraft Co., of Torrance, California, for \$1,653,594, leaves only one more award to complete the \$100,000,000 program for 1934.

With the end of the year contracts, the air corps today announced the acquisition of more than 800 additional planes to give the army air fleet of 2250 serviceable machines.





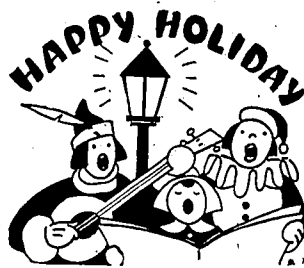
