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STEEL PRODUCTION INDICATES UPWARD TREND IN INDUSTRY

Federal Reserve Board's Report Finds Better Than Usual Level of Activity; Retail Buying Increases

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 25—A better-than-usual level of industrial activity was reported today by the federal reserve board in a Christmas-day survey of business conditions.

Steel, a leading indicator, especially was singled out as having a bigger output than customary in the early winter months.

"Preliminary figures for the first half of December show a more than seasonal increase in Christmas trade."

Factory employment, however, suffered a seasonal drop and was reported to be no better than a year ago.

Steel output increases "In the steel industry," it said, "output continued to increase during November and the first three weeks of December, contrary to the usual seasonal tendency."

Activity at meat-packing establishments showed less than the usual seasonal increase. Production of the leading pigmeat was about the same level as in October.

Analysing factory employment, the report said that in the automobile, shoe and canning industries, but larger than usual at retail stores and amusements.

Both trains were en route from Detroit to Toronto filled with holiday passengers. All the victims were believed to have been on the two rear coaches of the first section and early reports of the Christmas tragedy indicated that most, if not all of them, were Canadians.

CONTROVERSY OVER MADAME LUPESCU STIRS RUMANIANS

Dr. Julius Maniu Severely Criticized for Refusal to Negotiate Demand for Woman's Removal

(Copyright, 1934, By The Associated Press) VIENNA, Dec. 25—The bold attacks of Dr. Julius Maniu, who lost the prime ministership because of his assistance upon the banishment of the red-haired madame Lupescu, were reported today to be causing a new sensation in Rumania, where the activities of the king's proletarian lady are enveloped in mystery.

"The king," Maniu, "must banish Madame Lupescu."

Advices from the nearest states that Madame Lupescu exerts a greater influence over the king than did Mircea Pampouour over King Louis XV of France.

Life In Danger According to reports to the foreign legations in Vienna, Madame Lupescu is in such imminent danger of assassination by army agents, anti-social persons and others that she lives an almost subterranean life, rarely appearing in public.

Confidential diplomatic advices from Rumanian sources say that all the appointments to the higher positions in the government in Rumania are made by a so-called court chamberlain, of which Madame Lupescu is said to be the head.

The result is, these reports add, that the king's friend has become the most powerful political personality in Rumania, outside the king himself.

It is also reported that all big contracts with the government must pass through her hands as chief of the Comarila.

It is revealed further by these reports that the late Ion Duca, prime minister who was assassinated recently at Sibiu, owed his appointment to Madame Lupescu.

At the trial of the murderers of Duca it was testified by those involved that they killed the late prime minister because he was the Italian and three children survive.

FRANCIS BURNHAM'S PLANE BOARDS TO NEW SPEED MARK

(By The Associated Press) ISTRES, France, Dec. 25—America's hold on the world speed record for land planes over a closed course, was shattered today by the celebrated French pilot Raymond Delmotte with an average of 314 miles an hour.

The 40-year-old record-smasher shot his trim French Caudron Renault monoplane over the closed course for one lap at 293 miles an hour.

It was only after a year and more of dejected attempts that he managed to crack the mark of 306 miles an hour set by the late James Wedell in 1923.

Failure started him in the face in his first trial at noon, when he sustained only 293 miles an hour. An all-night rain had threatened to force postponement.

Later in the afternoon he decided to have one more try. The weather had cleared. Gaining speed with each lap he finally reached and held the record which gained him his long sought goal.

His average speed was clocked at 324.45 kilometers an hour, which is equivalent to 202 kilometers. Delmotte's top speed for a single circuit was 314 kilometers.

The world record for airplanes was set recently by Lieutenant Angello of Italy in a 440.75 miles an hour.

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PWA BATTLES FOR MUNICIPAL PLANTS

Over \$47,000,000 Already Allotted for Power Projects

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25 (AP)—The public works administration today checked over allotments of \$47,000,000 already made for the construction of municipal plants.

An active agency in the administration's campaign for lower electricity rates, the PWA disclosed today that \$47,000,000 has been allotted to federal power works.

Henry T. Hunt, general counsel, outlined the program in a report which power companies had been asked to submit for their determination to build their own power plants.

In two cases the cities and PWA won victories, and the plans have been completed, he said.

Improves Will Practice One power company has refused to donate the power companies' bills. Arguments are being taken in the other.

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UPRISING AGAINST KING ZOG DENIED

Albanians Accuse Greeks of Trying to Spoil Anniversary Event

TIRANA, Albania, Dec. 25 (AP)—According to Greek newspapers trying to stir King Zog's tenth anniversary celebration, the Albanian government denied yesterday reports of an uprising in the country.

Complete calm prevailed throughout the land, said an official statement from the foreign office.

Reports that an uprising had started in the Dibra region and that 2000 persons were marching upon the capital, printed in the Albanian newspaper Kathimeria, were flatly denied.

An official statement received in Athens later from Tirana also denied there was a revolution, and the Albanian legation in London and Rome released official telegrams denying the "alarming and tenacious reports."

A spokesman in London said "it is an old story. Greek newspapers which have no love for Albania, are always stirring up something of the sort."

The Athens newspaper, quoting friends among the Greeks in Albania, reported the alleged revolution was led by former army officers and the direction of the king's aide-de-camp. Martial law was said to have been declared with partial mobilization of the nation's military forces ordered.

Monday was the tenth anniversary of King Zog's leadership of Albania, and a national celebration was in progress. An ambitious program of development has marked Zog's reign, which emphasized development of national resources.

Having entered this service the day Dr. Crozer Cleveland was elected president for the first time they were thereafter employed in the Indian service at Lemhi, Idaho. After leaving the Indian service they moved to Blackfoot in 1888 where they have since made their home. Since she suffered a stroke of paralysis a year ago she has made her home here with her daughter since April.

Besides her husband she is survived by her daughter, Edith Doud King, Burley; a son, Charles Horace Doud, Blackfoot; a brother, Edward Day Carleton, Glendale, California; and five grandchildren, Fernon King, Dorothy King, Bertha Jeanne King and Carleton Doud, all of Burley, and Ardith King, San Francisco.

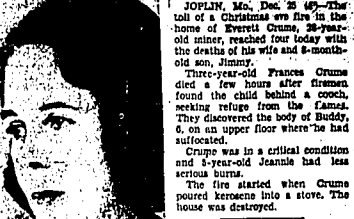

CHRISTMAS TREES

The Forest Service says 10,000,000 evergreens are used for Christmas trees in this country every year. It is possible that more have been used this season, if the increased buying in retail stores extended to the trees that go with the festival.

A further interesting fact is revealed by the foresters. They say that any of the cone-bearers may be used for this purpose, but that certain ones are more popular than others. Different sections of the country favor their favorites. In the East the balsam fir is the chief Christmas tree.

In the West the spruce is popular. In California, it is the silver-pine or silver fir. In the Northwest the Douglas fir comes first. Hemlocks, pines and cedars have their admirers.

In the East the fashion of spraying Christmas trees with silver or, white paint and using no ornaments but blue lights has sprung up, and the long-needle pine has come to the front for decorative effect.

It is pleasant to learn that there is no need for anxiety about injury to the forests. The annual cutting of Christmas trees, according to the Forest Service, is now done so carefully that it really helps in thinning the crop so that other trees may grow rapidly.

MORE FEDERAL FINANCING

A new financial move which may have big results is the government's effort to revive building and loan associations. Many are still closed and restricted, and those financially sound are doing very little business.

The program proposes co-operation of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, the Home Owners' Loan Corporation and the Home Loan Bank system. The RFC has already offered to lend many millions to important building and loan associations now closed.

This procedure may not be welcomed by those who fear the expansion of federal authority over finance. It will hardly be imposed on any unwilling group or locality. It may prove, however, to be the only practical way of reviving this vital branch of our financial system before it is too late.

HONOR ON THE DOLE

The story of Harry Hopkins' stolen pants is amusing and instructive. Hopkins, federal relief administrator, visited one of the relief stations for transients in Washington. Not long before, a labyrinth of underground tunnels, relics of Civil War days, had been discovered under this house. Hopkins thought he'd like to explore them.

The tunnels were narrow and dirty. Hopkins didn't want to ruin his trousers, so he changed into a pair of rather grimy overalls. The explorations completed, he hurried upstairs. To his dismay the pants were gone. A search failed to produce them, and Hopkins had to go on to an important conference in the overalls.

The head man at the transient station promptly called the 40 residents into a conference of their own. Two days before, they had adopted a code of honor, promising that there would be "LESS stealing" in their house than in any other relief house in Washington.

The plan worked. The pants were duly returned. The honor of the relief station was restored. There probably will be less stealing there than heretofore. The boys have learned a lesson. And so, we suppose, has Administrator Hopkins.

WANTS TO TALK SLOT MACHINES

Over in Idaho the attorney-general of that state has aroused much controversy, and a small amount of criticism of himself, by daring to propose that slot machines be legalized and licensed. It is a type of gambling, in his opinion, that cannot be stopped, and which therefore should be recognized and made to yield revenue.

When an attorney-general is of the opinion that such an abuse of the public confidence and the state laws cannot be stopped, what shall one conclude as to his administration? Any attorney-general whose ordinary day does not furnish forth half a dozen news items is a very fortunate official.

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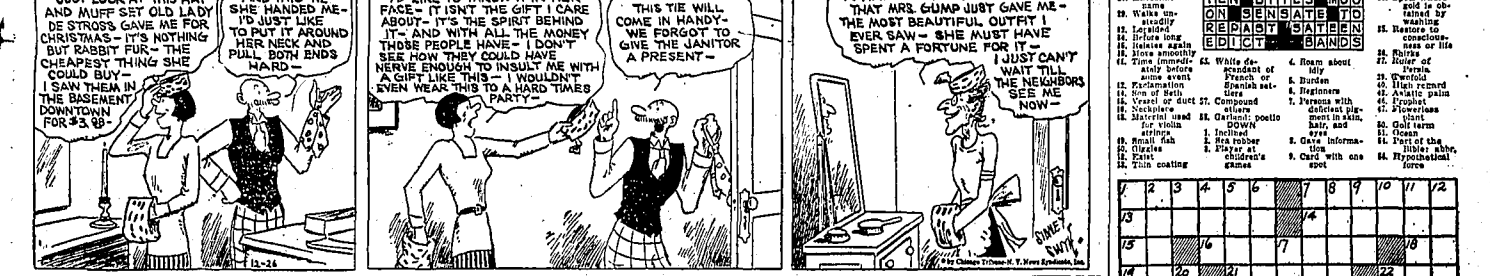
