

ONE CHRISTMAS DINNER

An interesting sidelight on the possibilitie of the business of running a prison is supplied by the story of the Christmas dinner enjoyed by Warden Kavanaugh and Mrs. Kavanaugh as guests of the inmates of the Nebraska penitentiary.

Mr. and Mrs. Kayanaugh were perhaps not exactly guests but they were present at the invitation of the men of whom the War-den has charge. And they attended and sat at the long table among the eight hundred convicts and broke bread in common cause it was a kindly and a human thing to do.

Prison discipline and prison reform, the Prison discipline and prison reform, the two go hand in hand, have been much in the spot light of recent years. Within a twelvementh or little more vicious outbreaks among prisoners have been recorded at Canyon City, Colorado, and Walla Walla, Washington, and probably as a result discipline has been tightened, rules made more stringent and privileges curtailed. It generally works that way. But it appears to take something more than discipline to maintain order in a prison. There are outbreaks in the prisons of Europe where armed guards patrol the walls day and night and the punishment cell and worse are in almost daily use. There prison regula-tions are so severe as to mark for all time the unfortunate victims of the system. But little thought is given to moral rehabilita-tion of the inmates, rather punishment alone supplies the keynote. And somehow or other it does not seem to work very well.

The State Prison of Nebraska is rarely heard of because its record for years has been conspicuously lacking in those sensa-tional features of prison operation which make news. The reason begins to become

The observer of public events who tries to look at things impersonally and impartially has a harder time than usual these days especially in the field of economics. 
