### Injured Passengers, Fliers Rescued By Band Of Woodsmen

#### Four Half-Frozen Men, Without Food for Two Days, Snatched From Wilderness

(By The Associated Press)  
MORRISVILLE, N. Y., Dec. 31.—Four despairing men, catapulted from the skies last Friday when their plane crashed in a night storm, were snatched from approaching death in a mountain wilderness today.

Half-frozen in the 30-degree below zero weather, without food for two days, and suffering from injuries received in the crash, the crew and passengers of the American Airlines plane were brought back to civilization by woodsmen who fought nature at its worst to save them.

The fliers had barely been hospitalized at Utica before the state police announced they were looking for a party of four troopers and an officer who entered the forest with a guide at Orny at 11:20 o'clock last night to search for the plane. A short time later, however, the troopers arrived safely at Newburgh and were taken to their homes.

Eight natives of this rough country in northern New York's Adirondack park were taken to the Hoffmanville camp yesterday after a flight of searching planes had located the crash site on the side of Wilder mountain.

Ploughing through with snow on snow-covered slopes, the troopers found the plane about 10 p.m. We saw four figures huddled around a fire," said Lester Powell, chief of Hoffmanville, who rescued the survivors later credited with saving their lives.

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### STATE TO DISPLAY HAUPTMANN'S CAR IN KIDNAPING TRIAL

#### Prosecution Officials Prepare to Use Green Sedan as Important Part of Evidence Against German

CLEVELAND, N. J., Dec. 31.—Determined to leave nothing undeveloped in their case against Richard Hauptmann, New Jersey prosecution officials, it was learned authoritatively today, plan to show the jury that will decide the German carpenter's fate that the hidden under the Lindbergh kidnapping would not testify to the defendant's automobile.

Because the green sedan owned by Hauptmann could not be brought into the small court room, the state proposes to drive the machine up to the door of the Hudson county courthouse and there demonstrate to the jury in the open air that it was large enough to carry the baby.

The state also intends to use the car in the Lindbergh case in the one seen by residents of Sugarland mountain near the Lindbergh estate on the day and evening of the kidnapping.

Hauptmann will go on trial Wednesday on an indictment charging him with the murder of the infant child of Charles and Anna Lindbergh on the morning of April 5, 1934.

In the development of its case against the accused defendant, the state will call as witnesses to testify they saw a car of the description of Hauptmann's on the road leading to the Lindbergh estate at Hopewell and in Featherbed Lane, a rough little road through this woods, a quarter mile from the Lindbergh estate.

Hauptmann was arrested in London, England, on the charge of kidnapping the Lindbergh child, who while living home, on the road leading to the Lindbergh estate, in the afternoon of March 1, 1934, the date of the kidnapping. 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QUAKE ROCKS WIDE AREA IN ARIZONA CALIFORNIA MEXICO

At Least Three Persons Injured and Many Adobe Houses Destroyed; Severe Shock Felt at San Diego

(By The Associated Press.) CALIFORNIA, Calif., Dec. 31.—An intense, undulating earthquake shook a wide area in southern California, Arizona and northwest Mexico today, injuring at least three persons and demolishing many adobe houses south of Mexi...

The quake was described by seismologists as being at least twice as strong as the one in March, 1933, at Long Beach, Calif., in which 200,000 property damage was caused. At San Diego the shock was described as the most severe felt there in many years as the down building swayed their occupants rushed hurriedly to the streets. The shock, which followed yesterday's tremor, began at 10:40 a. m. (Pacific Coast time) and apparently centered in the headwaters of the Gulf of Lower California, a hundred miles south of here.

Phonetic Feels "Wave" In American cities of the valley, the damage appeared to have been slight. One grocery store proprietor at a highway intersection thirty miles from here said he felt the shocks from shelves and there were reports of plaster cracks and some broken windows in various Imperial valley communities.

Chandeliers swayed at many points near Los Angeles, and plaster cracked in a close region of San Diego and Imperial valley. The shock followed one yesterday morning, apparently in the same epicenter, but of half the intensity. Yesterday's shock damaged the waterworks of the Imperial Irrigation Company in Lower California to such an extent that the water supply for domestic purposes for the city was broken and there will be required to repair it. Mexico, however, has a week's supply of water in its reservoirs.

The intensity of yesterday's shock in Lower California was reported here today by two prominent California citizens. Justice of the Peace W. H. Lorenz and Ed Covington, who had gone into the Imperial valley of Mexico region to inspect the situation.

They were forty miles south of the notorious Mexican border, where they saw in the vicinity of Black Butte an extinct volcano. The force of the shock threw them to the ground. Hot water reverberated under their feet by three veterans of the valley, appeared, as well as large cracks in the ground.

Decades of the cracks it required six hours for them to travel a six mile stretch of dirt road in the Lower California desert. The nearest point known to the epicenter where there may be a small community of fishermen is La Bamba, Lower California, which there is no telephone or telegraph communication. This is located at the mouth of the Colorado river.

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OUTLAWS' WIDOWS ASSIST PROSECUTION

Government Speaks To Prove Conspiracy in Union Station Slaughter

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 31.—The widow of convict Frank Nash and the man accused of killing him assisted themselves with the federal government in its effort to prove a conspiracy led to the union station massacre in this town here June 17, 1934.

Mrs. Vivian Mathis, alias Mrs. Verne C. Adlmer, and Mrs. Frank Nash known also as Mrs. Frances Miller, who began the day as two of eight persons accused by the government of conspiring to rescue Nash, quickly joined the federal camp. Mrs. Mathis pleaded guilty to one of three charges and will testify for the prosecution. Mrs. Nash, a defendant without consent, also will testify for the government.

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PLAN TO INCREASE ICC POWERS GAINS

Proposal Calls for Larger Commission With Added Industrial Scope

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—An enlargement of the Interstate Commerce Commission would make it a virtual ruler over land, sea and air transportation insofar as rates and allied matters are concerned was disclosed today as a measure recommended to President Roosevelt.

Strong support for such a plan was given inside Secretary Robert's committee which was set up to work out a general transportation policy. Under the plan advanced, the new authority—commerce commission—would have a membership representative of the different interests involved in the transportation industry.

Definitely under the recommendations as envisaged by proponents of the plan, would be railroads, airlines and the merchant marine—possibly also a steamship line and truck transportation and pipelines might be put into the jurisdiction of the commission.

### IDAHO NRA CHIEF SEES PERMANENCE FOR WAGE CODES

'Businessmen Are Reluctant to Go Back to Old System of Economic Competition Says Walter T. Lockwood'

BOISE, Dec. 31 (AP)—After four months as the national recovery administration wage director, Walter T. Lockwood of Boise, this afternoon predicted "four-and-a-half wage provisions of NRA codes and industry will be made permanent by an act of the next congress."

"Businessmen of Idaho are reluctant to go back to the old system of uncontrolled and unregulated competition of pre-NRA days," he declared, "and the NRA has been successful in such a measure on the opinions expressed by business men over Idaho, as upon information from Washington."

The hour and wage provisions of NRA codes and industry will be made permanent by an act of the next congress, and trade practice provisions may possibly be removed from the category of law and turned over to business and industry for "voluntary" or "voluntary" agreement," commented the former secretary to United States Senator James P. Pope of Idaho.

BURLEY, Dec. 31—Frozen stiff in a rocking chair, the body of R. B. Chappel, 84, was found in his little cabin across the street from the Oen Rieck Lumber company yard here about noon today. Beside the master crouched the faithful dog, who has been his only company for years.

The discovery was made by Dr. F. H. Cutler, who stopped in on his rounds to see how the old fellow was getting along. "Older 84," E. Johnson, stated tonight death probably occurred Saturday. NEW YEAR NEEDS

Happy New Year! An old and pleasant phrase, spoken mostly in a conventional greeting, it may not mean much, but good will. It might be interesting to sit down with pencil and paper and figure out what it would take to make 1935 a happy year.

Different individuals, of course, have different needs and hopes on which their happiness depends. Each one can list those for himself. Some desired blessings are likely to appear on every list, however. Up near the top is health. Prosperity has always been a good New Year wish. Today it shares its place with employment and security.

Individual happiness needs group happiness—national and world-wide—to insure its safety. The first two items on the world's list, are economic recovery and peace. If 1935 could bring the peoples of the earth not merely the absence of war, but definite assurance that their feet were set on the road to permanent peace and co-operation, it would be just about the happiest year in the history of the race.

AUTO LICENSES

Idaho is one of the few remaining states which do not tax automobiles as personal property and demand license fees amounting to four or five times as much as those charged in surrounding states.

This is the point at the bottom of the suggestion by the Idaho Automobile Association that auto owners refuse to buy new licenses until after adjournment of the legislative session. The management of the association points out that if auto license fees are revised downward by the legislature those who have already paid are exceedingly unlikely to be given a rebate.

There is no question but what Idaho is in a class by herself when it comes to the matter of high automobile license fees. A great majority of all states charge a fee of from three to five dollars, with the car subjected in addition to a personal property tax. Probably the adoption of such a system in Idaho would mean a sharp decline in auto tax revenue which it would be necessary to make up in some other way.

There is this point in favor of a retention of the present system: So much money has to be raised anyhow and if the revenue from the sale of auto licenses is to be cut the deficit will have to be tacked on somewhere else and it will probably be that way for a long time to come.

PLANNING AHEAD

Government plans are looking ahead a few twenty or twenty-five years and suggesting a budget of more than one hundred billions during that period for the new organization and expansion of our economic life, may seem presumptuous, but they're mere pikers compared with some of our foreign competitors.

Premier Mussolini recently submitted to the Italian people a plan for reorganization of the national life extending well into the next century and while he didn't venture to estimate the cost, it might exceed ours, in a country with not more than one-tenth of our wealth.

Then there is Chancellor Hitler who was

leading Germany and the world a few months ago, that his Nazism was going to last for one thousand years, and who tries to plan on that basis. In comparison, our builders of new worlds show commendable restraint.

A CASE OF NERVES

The directors of the United States Chamber of Commerce and the officials of the American Federation of Labor seem to be suffering from a case of nerves over communist activities. William Green, testifying before a congressional committee, contends that these will soon develop to a dangerous point unless they are checked.

The right of the government to protect itself against "subversive" activities—these are the terms used by its violent overthrow cannot be questioned. Experience has shown, however, that this right must be exercised carefully. A government that begins by suppressing "subversive" activities tends constantly to extend the meaning of the phrase until it includes all inconvenient criticism.

NRA OFFICIALS HAVE FEUD

One hundred and twenty-five million Americans are exhorted to be subservient to the registration of NRA, so that this country may forthwith recover from the woes of business and industrial stagnation. Not to do so is branded as a lack of patriotism.

Despite this mandate from those dominant in Washington, and the quiet general compliance with the program throughout the country, there appears to be less inclination among those who have been active in the administration to accelerate recovery.

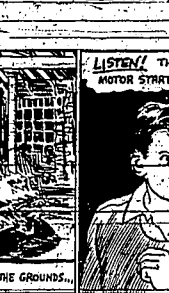

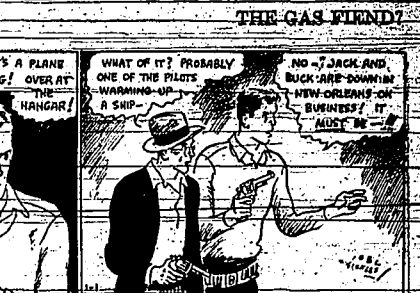

It will take a great team to beat Stanford, said Thornhill. "If my boys can make the breaks and first adjustments of their own about win. We are physically and mentally ready for this game."

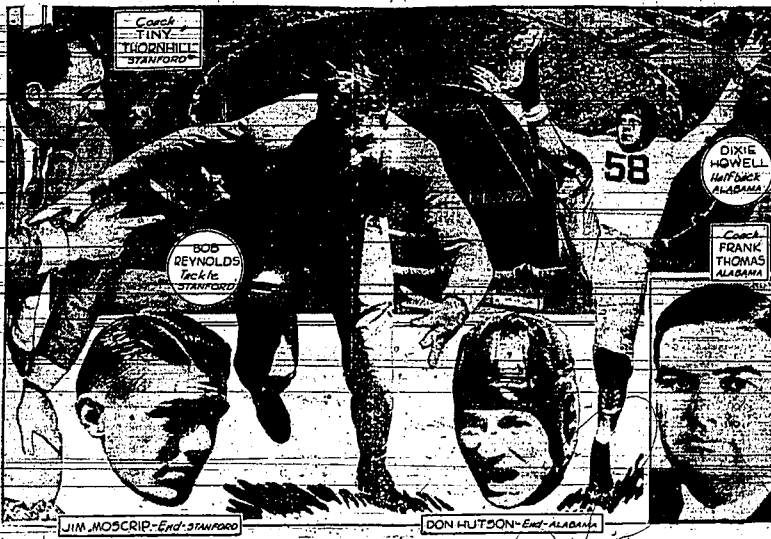
Alabama lined up on the field at 10:30 a. m. and the game was expected to develop a contest of line smacking against forward passing.

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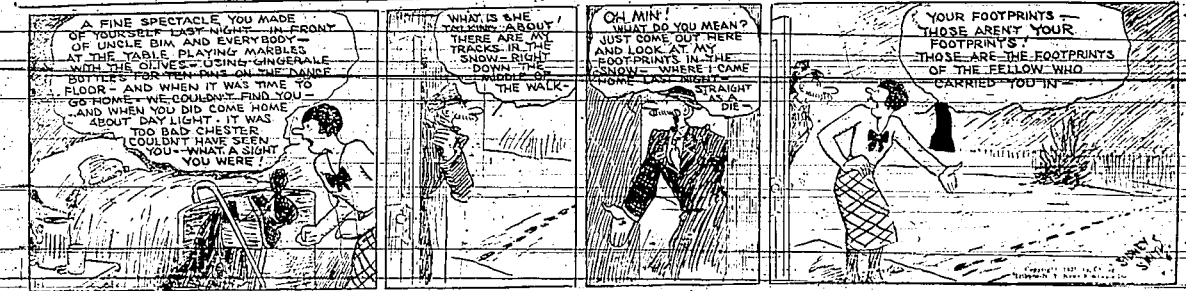

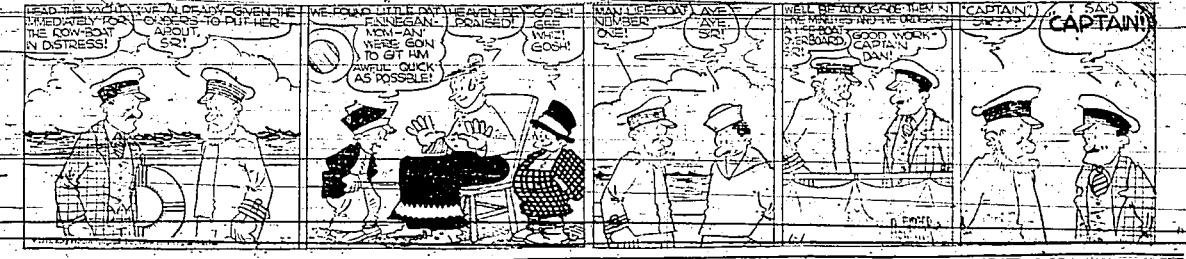
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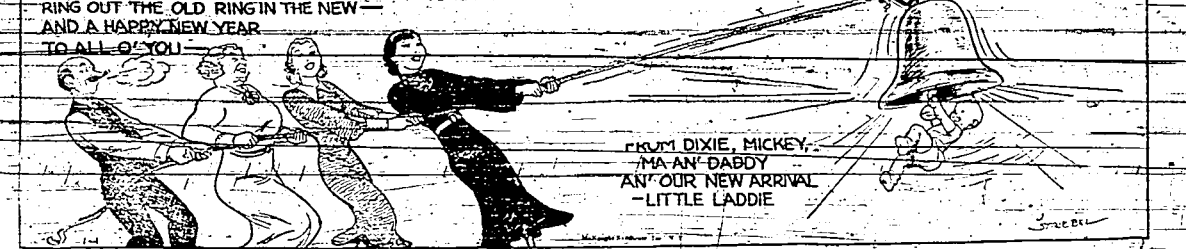
