## TWO FLIERS MEET DEATH IN CRASH ON PAYETTE FARM

Instructor and Student Drop 100 Feet When Airplane Engine Stalls Making Vertical Bank

(By The Associated Press) — PAYETTE, Idaho, Jan. 1 — A New Year's plane crash a mile north of here tonight had claimed the lives of two air-men, Delwin Sweet, 27, of Payette, and Cecil Graub, 35, who came here recently from Portland, Oregon.

The crash was witnessed by the crash from the Payette landing field said the plane engine stalled as the pilot was making a vertical bank and that the craft crashed from an altitude of about 100 feet.

The ship was equipped with a dual control and no one could say who was piloting it when it fell.

Sweet died a few minutes after the crash and Graub, who was taken to hospital, died later.

(By The Associated Press) — FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 1 — Bruno Richard Hauptmann has three new gray shirts for his trial for the Lindbergh kidnaping, but will appear in court in the same double-breasted gray suit he wore when brought to New Jersey last October.

Harry O. McCrea, the jail warden, said he had taken three of the new shirts, with the exception of the white, and had given the kidnap suspect the "blue shirt."

When in court his necktie will be white, and his belt and shoes will be black.

On the eve of his trial to be held in America and many foreign nations today, New Jersey authorities today announced that Bruno Richard Hauptmann, the man charged with the murder of Baby Lindbergh, is not a dramatic murder trial.

## Fire Claims Five Victims; Convicts Save 32 Persons

Two Aged Men Rush Back Into Flames At County Home

(By The Associated Press) — GAFFNEY, S. C., Jan. 1 — Flames which began at 11 o'clock Wednesday were powerless to fight burned five aged men to death, injured 15, and destroyed the \$10,000 Cherokee county home early today while convicts from a nearby prison camp made heroic efforts to save the 47 inmates.

## FIRE EXPLOSION WIPE OUT HOME

Six-Year-Old Boy, Badly Burned, Sole Survivor of Family of Five

EL PASO, Texas, Jan. 1 — Four members of a family of five were killed in a fire and explosion which wiped out a home here today.

Estanislado Macias, 39, and his wife, Isabela, 29, and their two children, Roberto, 5, and Eduardo, 2, died in the smoke-filled dwelling. Another son, Willie, 6, was burned seriously.

Henry Young, who was mortally wounded, said he was in bed when the fire started. He was taken to hospital, but died there.

The mother and two boys were found dead in bed. The father was found on the floor of the garage, which adjoined the house.

An adjacent home was believed to have started the fire and led to an explosion of gasoline.

Stage Set for Fifth Weekly Auction; Theme Song Adopted

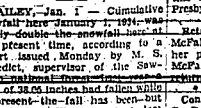
