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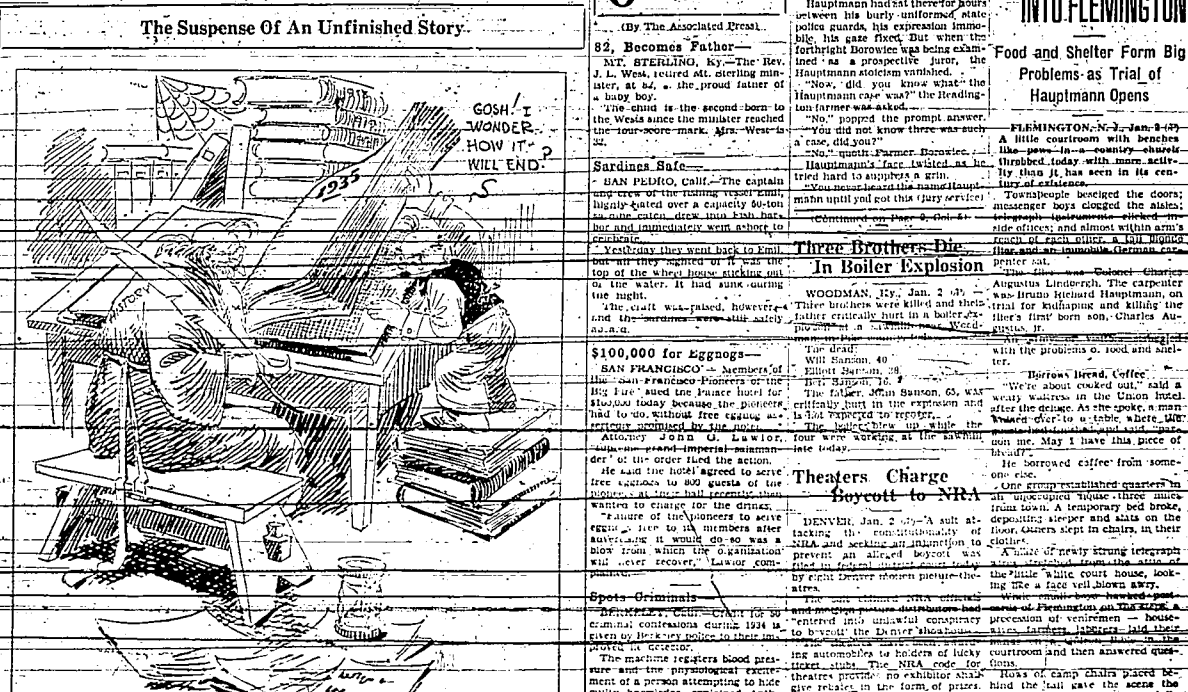

### OFFICIALS' OATHS COME AT INTERVALS

#### State Officers and Legislature Precede County Inductions

Forty-four state and one hundred forty-four legislative state and county officials will take oaths of office today. The ceremony will be held in the legislative building today in conducting a general impression that oaths were administered today.

The eight executive and five judicial elective state officers take their oaths next, Monday, individually. The 100 members of the legislature take theirs collectively the same day.

There will be only two changes in the elective official family. Campbell of Milligan becomes minor inspector, succeeding W. H. Simons of Wallace, and James P. Albright of Coeur d'Alene succeeds Justice N. D. Wernette on the supreme court bench.

County elective officials of which there are 138 in each county take their oaths January 14.

Whether just elected, or re-elected, all elective officials must take the oath.

In addition to the 644 elective officials, there are 13 judges of judicial districts, who file their oaths with the secretary of state.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—Sweeping aside sectionalism arguments, outnumbered Southern Democrats today captured control of the seventy-first Congress opening session.

The move toward "gag rule," which Democrats voted 225 to 60 to increase from 145 to 210 the number of members of a petition to force a bill out of committee and onto the floor.

# NEW CHAPTER IN TROTSKY'S STORY

Nogales, Arizona, Scene of Latest Activities of Colorful Figure

An interesting story concerning R. N. Trotsky, asserted deportable alien with nearly a dozen criminal records, appears in the Journal of the American Medical Association of December 22.

Trotsky will be remembered as having spent the summer of 1923 here and having been convicted of a violation of the medical practice act on August 21 of that year. He was sentenced to 12 months imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$100.

Further revelations of the criminal record of "Red" Trotsky in the transcript of the United States department of justice under the number of 18770. His career includes the selling of stolen property, attempting to pass worthless checks, murder, illegal practice of medicine, and performing illegal operations. His aliases include R. N. Trotsky, Bob Lukan, Bob Anthony, Romano Puzos, and Ray Anthony.

Year and Day at Leavenworth

Trotsky, etc. is a Russian, said to have entered the Russian government in 1920 and fled to the United States without a passport, dodging the federal officers in the meantime. He claimed to be a member of the Bolshevik party and was graduated from a well known university in Russia and to have practiced medicine in Leavenworth, Kansas. This last indicated that he had some degree of honor for he spent a year and a day in Leavenworth for a violation of the Dray act (Transporting stolen automobiles across state lines).

The latest arrest was made in Nogales, Arizona, last September 17, on charges of practicing medicine without a license. Following the trial, and while he was out on bail, Trotsky appears to have staged a somewhat theatrical episode for the purpose of gaining sympathy. On November 16, he appeared at the home of a man who lived about two miles south of Nogales and asked for aid, saying that he had been shot in the arm. His story, according to the newspaper reports, was that he had been taken for a ride by a pair of strangers. The newspaper reported that the doctor's picture was shown at the trial, indicating that the man had been fired at close range. Trotsky also stated that he did not know the exact spot where the shooting occurred.

Pictureque Figure

When he was in Twin Falls, Trotsky was a well-known figure on the streets. He was usually alleged in riding clubs with his two dogs. He drove a large, fast and equipped two horses when he held his license for polo. At one time he attempted to organize a polo team here and his picture was used as an advertisement for the first game, which was never played.

The Journal of the American Medical Association says: "Undoubtedly the secret of this criminal's ability to get away from his pursuers is his ability to avoid attention by avoiding to attract it. In the fact that he is good-looking, makes a good appearance, has brains, and above all, colossal assurance and impudence."

Judge W. A. Babcock, in announcing sentence on him here, said: "I am sorry it is impossible under the law dealing with this crime to remove the defendant from society because of his past record as a menace to society. Reports from the United States department of justice show that he has been convicted and served time at least twice for other and more serious crimes."

## COMMODITY SHIPMENTS HIGHER THAN FOR 1937

Reporting that 4672 cars of commodities had been shipped from Twin Falls during the year 1937. Frank E. Truitt, Union Traffic agent, announced last night that eliminating sugar beet and sugar shipments, commodity shipments here had overshadowed the 1933 mark.

Livestock shipment during 1937 was 444 carloads as compared with 243 in 1933 and onions in 1934 totaled 198 cars as compared with the preceding year. Potato shipments last year totaled 1839 cars while but 737 were shipped during 1933 and 633 carloads of beans were shipped from here in 1934 as compared with 643 in 1933.

A total of 1529 carloads of merchandise was shipped and miscellaneous shipments amounted to 470 cars.

The only items falling below the 1933 level were grain and apples. The 1934 grain shipments amounted to 276 cars as compared with 319 the previous year and the 1934 apple shipments was 322 cars as compared with 188 in 1933.

The principal reasons for a good shipment of coal and other materials for the sugar factory, incoming freight was less this year.

## ARGUMENTS HEARD ON WATER DELIVERY

North Side Settlers and Canal Company Submit Cases

District Judge W. A. Babcock had under advisement last night his decision in an injunction suit brought by a number of settlers to require the North Side Canal company to deliver a continuous flow of water through the irrigation system during the winter season.

Attorneys' arguments were completed yesterday following presentation of evidence in the case last Monday.

The settlers seek an injunction against the canal company's order of early last November discontinuing water delivery to accumulate surplus storage supply that would be necessary in event of another short-water season.

Feders Real Estate

Evidence indicated that many farmers under the North Side canal system are provided with wells or other sources of water supply, but that sheep feeders would suffer losses by reason of non-delivery of water. There was testimony that some sheepmen are buying water in drums and hauling it at considerable expense to their flocks and eight miles away.

Argument for the settlers was presented yesterday by Fred J. Stephan, former attorney general, for the canal company by R. P. Parry of Twin Falls.
