LEGISLATORS MEET WITH C. OF C. MEN

Burley Group Makes No Recommendations After Discussion

BURLEY, Jan. 3.—Meeting Wednesday evening in the district court room Burley Chamber of Commerce, together with a resolution was adopted, and thrown open to the public, after much discussion on tax-revision and legislative adjustments without prejudice to members of the legislature.

A motion to recommend to the Cassia county delegation a plan embodying various modes for control of liquor sales offered by T. H. Harris was unanimously adopted on motion of Roscoe C. Rich as was a resolution offered by Attorney E. B. Doolan directing the enactment of laws whereby the state would pay indemnities for personal and property damages the result of drunkenness. No motion for resolution was offered with reference to liquor. It was felt that Representative Hyrum B. Lewis, DeLoe and Senator G. C. Barlow, Burley, should be left free to exercise their best judgment in dealing with these questions.

In Favor of Fair.

The assembly did go on record, however, as favoring the 10-cent tax on liquor, and the 10-cent tax on beer. Representative Hyrum B. Lewis, Doolan, and Senator G. C. Barlow, Burley, were present. Other members of the delegation were J. P. Hackney, P. P. Howard and C. W. Ross, to present resolutions for the legislative committee, asking for a 1935 budget appropriation and tax levy for such purposes.

Speakers included J. P. Hackney, Representative Hyrum B. Lewis, J. P. Nelson, project farmer; T. B. Doolan, Doolan, project farmer; H. H. Harris, Howard Simons and Irel Gudmundsen. Others took part in the three-all discussion.

"There is but one way to get liquor revenue consistent," stated Representative Lewis, "and that is for the legislator in caring for the criminal it makes," — "and it would take every penny," he asserted.

Flays Liquor Profit

Roscoe Rich advocated "taking the personal profit out of the liquor business as an effective means to temperance."

Howard Simons suggested "close supervision of the liquor business."

Irel Gudmundsen would have the boy and girl taught the value of the dollar in their own homes. While he prefers liquor handed openly rather than behind closed doors, he would prohibit it in saloons, hotels, houses, Mr. Gudmundsen was a member of the lower house when the Idaho legislature passed the state prohibition act, and he stated he thought then the liquor problem was solved for all time. "I have since found," he said, "that it is a system of hypocrisy."

SUGAR STOCK DEAL DEFENDED IN COURT

President of Great Western Testifies; Stockholder Charges Fraud

TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 3.—William D. Lippitt, president of the Great Western Sugar company, of Denver, a New Jersey corporation, today defended his participation in the Cacho La Poudre company, a holding company, which was formed for the purpose of creating a feeling that the Great Western was earning \$2,000,000 a year, which it was not doing.

"I was the major defense witness in a suit brought by Victor Greiff, of Belle Harbor, N. Y., a stockholder, to void transfer of the newly formed Cacho La Poudre company, a Delaware corporation, Greiff held that both contracts were the same and the transfer constituted a fraud upon stockholders of the sugar company."

Lippitt asserted that the Great Western company felt it had too much working capital, since the federal government had curtailed the production of sugar. drastic action, from Washington, he said, was feared against surplus capital.

"The company did not wish to declare a cash dividend because sugar beet growers might have demanded immediate payment of the same and operating expenses warranted, Lippitt declared.

Ann Harding Wins Custody of Child

RENO, Nev., Jan. 3.—In the case of District Judge Thomas F. Ryan, custody of the child of Ann Harding was granted to her today, when the legal right to have exclusive care, control and custody of her six year old daughter, Jane, was granted.

Her motion for exclusive custody, which was filed in the district court, was granted after a hearing which lasted less than an hour and a half.

"I am very pleased at the judge's decision," she said afterward.

Judge Moran's ruling modified Miss Harding's 1932 divorce decree, which gave custody of Jane to her father, Harry Bannister, for two months out of every year.

The only testimony taken today was given by the child.

Refusing to reveal details of the proceedings, Miss Harding's attorney, William W. Johnson, said her motion was granted because she felt that it would be for the child's best interests to remain with her mother.

Judge Moran granted Miss Harding's divorce from Bannister at a private trial May 7, 1932, after both parties agreed that the "single reason" for their separation was that Bannister, career as an actor was being "overshadowed" by Miss Harding's rise to fame.

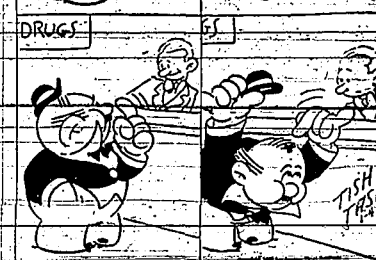

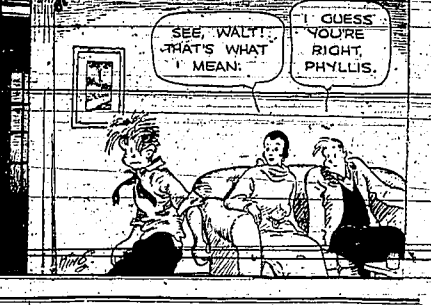

MOTOR LICENSE REVENUES RISE

Twin Falls County Collects on 722 Cars and 1047 Trucks

Twin Falls county's motor vehicle license collections during 1934 exceeded \$110,000, which is \$14,000 more than the preceding year's total of \$96,000, according to figures compiled at the county assessor's office.

Motor automobiles in the county numbered 1013 more last year than the year before, the total for 1934 being 7722 and for 1933, 6709.

Commercial trucks licensed from 1933 to 1934 totaled 1047, an increase of 170.

There were 20 licensed dealers as compared with 17 in 1933, and 25 chauffeurs as compared with 5 in 1933.

The number of licensed trailers increased from 787 to 1124.
