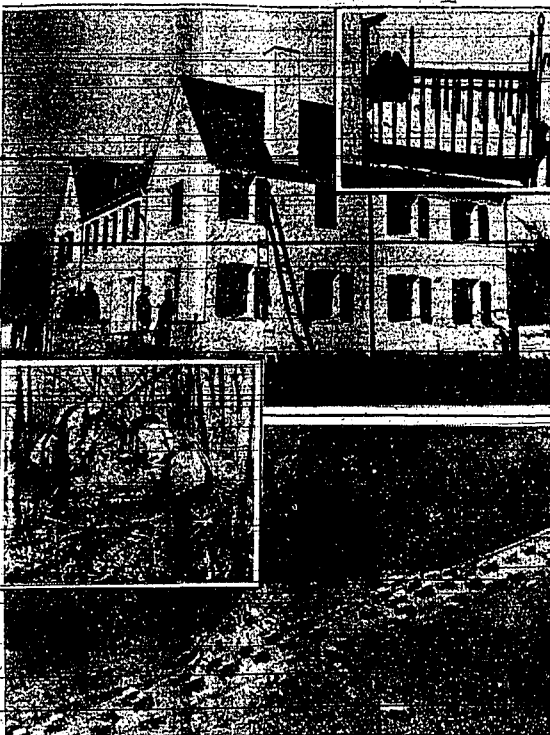
Program to Begin in April

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### GAME WARDEN LISTS IDAHO HUNTERS' BAG

#### Management Termed Most Important Phase of Future Program

BOISE, Jan. 4 (AP)—During 1933 and 1934, 20,522 deer, elk, goats and bear were reported killed in Idaho. Amos H. Robert, warden of the fish and game department, announced in a two-year period report released today.

In addition to the 20,522 animals reported killed, he estimated that an additional 4,135 were not reported. Of the total reports, 18,153 were deer, 2,143 elk, 207 goats and 50 bears.

Undoubtedly the most important phase of the future program for the Idaho fish and game department will be game management, he wrote.

"The problem of propagating and planting fish and game birds is being worked out in a most satisfactory manner from the viewpoint of the sportmen and the department, but while some progress has been made through amendments to laws at the last session of the legislature, to control big game on closed areas by special permits to hunt on a limited license plan, the present problem is still being worked out.

Banks at Federal Rule  
He expressed himself as "unfavorably impressed" by the action whereby the secretary of agriculture seeks to turn over game administration to the United States forest service, and recommended that the legislature go on record as favoring supervision of the game in Idaho by the department as representative of the sportmen.

Operation costs of the Lapwai farm were estimated at \$8,872 for 1933 and \$9,608 for 1934.

Fish distribution from the various hatcheries was reported as follows: 2,138,600 American Park, 1,011,000 Cascade, 450,000; Coeur d'Alene, 2,001,000; Evergreen, 604,500; Grangeville, 108,000; Hayden, 1,000,000; Henry's Lake, 580,000; Mackay, 431,000; Sandpoint, 147,000; Twin Falls, 254,700; Wilson Lake, Buhlton and Salmon, 1,010,000. Main hatcheries, brook native, steelhead, cutthroat and salmon trout were 2,000,000.

The total state fish hatchery distribution was 26,400,000; and a total of 100 fish in the hatcheries for distribution in 1935 was reported.

During 1933 receipts from the sale of licenses and permits "not reported" for the biennium ending December 15, 1934, was given as \$316,651.

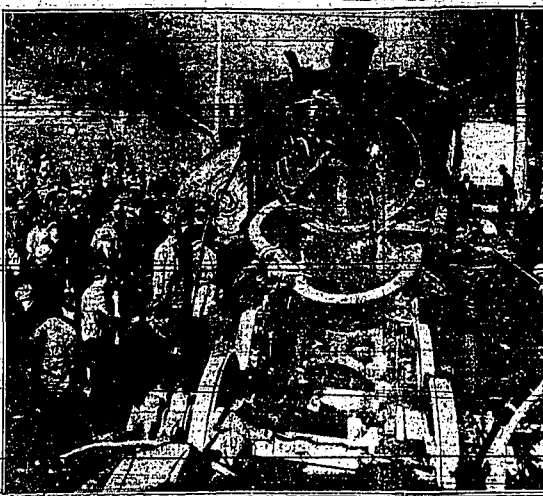
**LUMBER TRADE GAINS**

Shipments for the week amounted to 26,814,000 feet, and production was 14,720,000 feet. For the corresponding week a year ago orders totaled 23,881,000 feet, and production, 13,335,000 feet.

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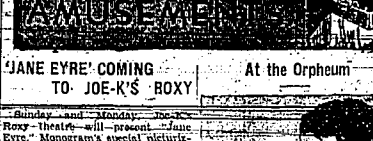

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SURPLUS LIVESTOCK PROJECTS CLOSING

HERA Director Lists Emergency Purchases of Cattle, Sheep

BOISE, Jan. 4.—W. W. Godfrey, Idaho emergency relief director of commodity distribution, announced today that the cattle and sheep surplus programs in this state have been virtually completed.

A total of 121,981 sheep were reported purchased in Idaho, he said. Of that number 69,533 were killed in the field and only 52,448 were processed, and 21,428 were bought in this state to be processed by outside packers for contribution to needy persons.

In Idaho 23,660 head of cattle have been purchased. Part of them are 430 head of cow-calf cattle which have been processed by Idaho packers, Godfrey said.

Twenty-six cows bought in the state were given to the rural rehabilitation cooperation. 379 were given to the Indian service for meat.

Godfrey said the hog purchasing program is virtually complete also but that complete reports have not yet been turned in.

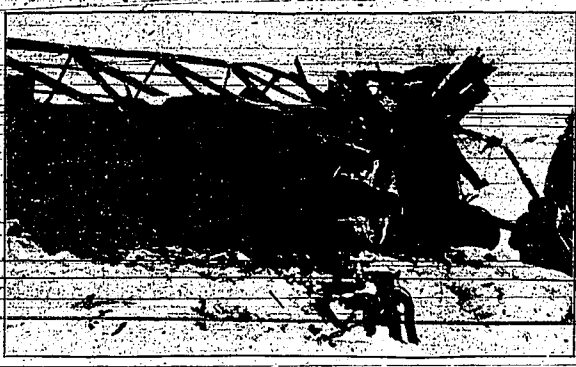

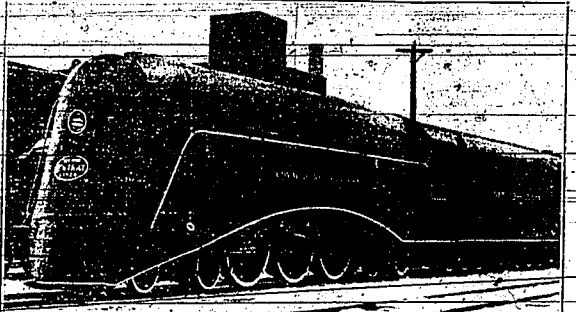

STAMPS In The News

Twenty-one stamps, issued by Mexico on behalf of the president-elect, are being marketed in a complete set for both public and mail use in addition to including a special delivery.

New and modernistic workmanship is displayed in the designs which range from active activities to historical scenes. The stamps are divided into 12 regular postage and eight airmails besides the special delivery.

Two new portraits of King Carol II are featured in the new issues for Rumania. The 50-cent stamp shows the king in everyday attire, while on the 60-cent he is in full military regalia.

Another denunciation of the "pepper mill" stamp from the San Francisco set is at hand. It is an extremely rare new issue from Hungary, Poland and the stamps are all identical except for the value, which consists of large numerals on a central background with rays spreading in all directions.

THE 1934 child welfare issue of Luxembourg shows Jean l'Aveugle, who became Count of Luxembourg in 1209 and who is known in European history as John the Blind, wearing full armor and riding a typical fiery steed. In the set are six stamps.

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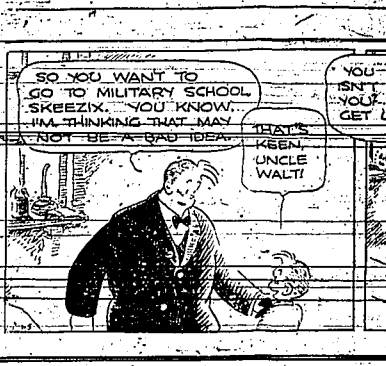
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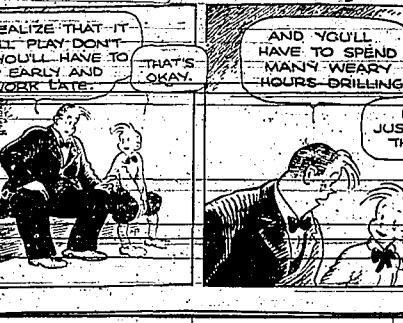

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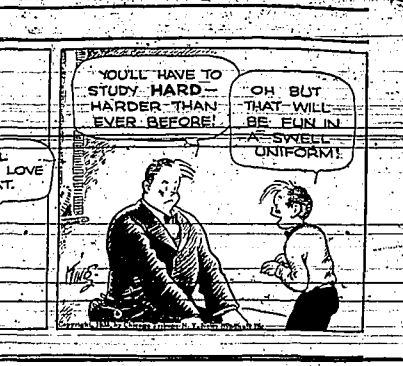

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### DECISION AGAINST CONTINUOUS FLOW

#### Judge W. A. Babcock Rules In Favor of North Side Canal

District Judge W. A. Babcock yesterday denied the petition of a number of North Side irrigation project settlers for an injunction to prevent the North Side canal company from discontinuing continuous delivery of water through the canal system during the winter season. Settlers claimed their contracts with the canal company call for continuous delivery of water and insisted that the canal company is liable for any loss of water during the winter.

The canal company early last month made effective an order discontinuing the winter flow as a means of accumulating surplus water to meet an anticipated short water season's requirement. The order provided for water deliveries at intervals to meet the winter's requirements.

Evidence was introduced at hearing last Monday that some truck drivers are buying water in amounts exceeding several cubic feet to feed lots.

Recalls Earlier Ruling  
Judge Babcock's decision yesterday, it was recalled, was in line with his ruling last fall when he granted the right of the Twin Falls Canal company to discontinue winter water delivery was called in question. On account of severe winter weather conditions at that time, the canal company did not persist in its purpose to cut water out of ditches west of Twin Falls, and the question was not carried to the supreme court.
