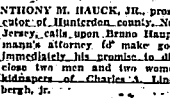

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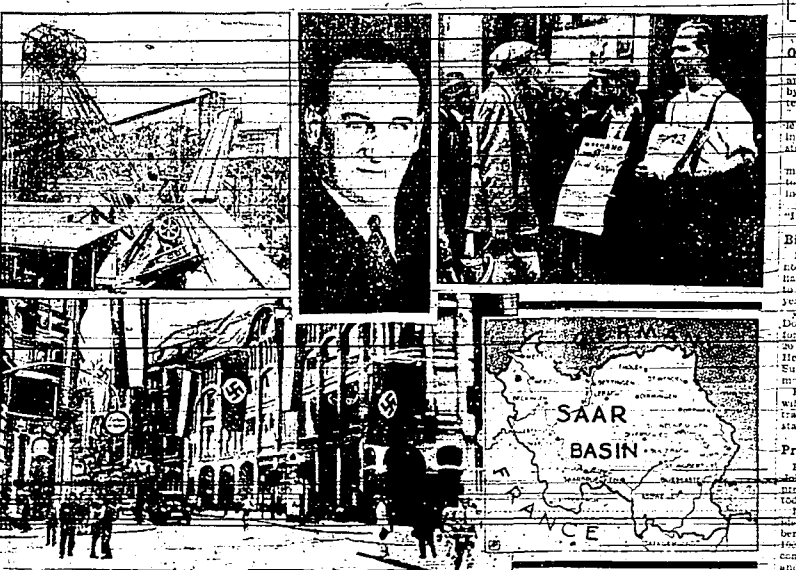

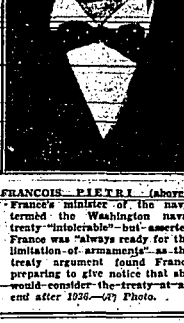

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THE CURSE OF MARIHUANA

The Federal Narcotic bureau's ceaseless drive to wipe out the menace of dope has broadened to include a drug called marihuana.

For a number of years Twin Falls county authorities have been wrestling with the problem and from time to time have confiscated varying amounts of the weed.

Indulgence in marihuana produces effects similar to those of other kinds of dope such as morphine, heroin and opium. Sensations are prolonged, sounds are magnified to an extent that light footfalls seem like distant cannon reverberations.

Lack of enforcement machinery in many states has seriously complicated the problem of eradicating this growing evil.

Obviously, no penalty is too severe for these contemptible wretches who have invaded the very strongholds of America's future.

Every citizen should lend active support to this crusade against marihuana.
