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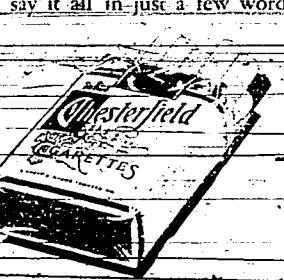

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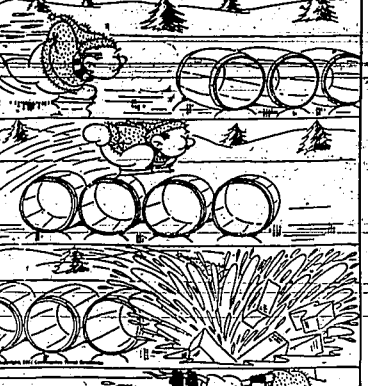

RICHBERG ACTIONS TERMED 'CAVEMAN'

Former Recovery Chief Re-views Controversy in Publication

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 8 (AP)—The John D. Rockefeller Foundation controversy crops up again with the publication of the former NIRA administrator's first article in the Saturday Evening Post which appeared today.

Discussing one of Richberg's actions as recovery "chieftain," Johnson said it "smacks of the modern caveman."

It was this series of articles which prompted Richberg to write in the Saturday Evening Post "cautioning" it against any of Johnson's statements that "might be taken out of context."

In his letter, Richberg decried "the publication of character assassination" and warned George Horace Lorimer, the editor, that the Post must assume full legal responsibility for "statements by General Johnson."

Richberg's indignation is just a symptom of the crisis of conscience in his pants.

Impossible Demand

Returning by implication to a recent address by Richberg, the general wrote in the first of his articles: "To demand that industry at once give employment to 10,000,000 men is a demand that it produce far more goods than it can sell, or increase its plant capacity when there is no market for the product."

"No responsible management can do this and surely no such thing can be done in the threat and uncertainty that beset the present economic horizon."

"To make this demand and couple it with a recovery plan is a demand that unless industry does so employ those millions the government will supply the demand. All this is a demand that the former-recovery administrator—who now is aiding Bernard M. Baruch in the activities of the president's committee to take the profits out of war—set forth two factors which he said would relegate "this depression to the limbo of forgotten things in three months' time."

These, he said, are:

1. A balanced budget.
2. Removal of the fear of inflation, the fear of "rash action."

THE TOWNSEND PLAN
Dear Sir:
Some time ago, a business man from Boise explained to me the object and purpose of the Old Age Benefits Pension plan, known as the Townsend Plan. And since this man is well-to-do, not a politician and not a party hack, I began to wonder why he would advocate such a crazy idea. Perhaps he realizes, like many observers, that we're in the last half of the ninth inning, so to speak, and the game still a tie.

—The "Townsend" Plan: some ten million old people and give them \$200 a month each, for life, seems so impossible, irrational and revolutionary as to produce even a try-out. Many would denounce the plan as fantastic and impracticable.

Dear Sir:—The "Townsend" Plan of the dollar? The NIRA and the AAA program, the 30 hour week, the moratorium enactment and many other "new" ideas, have been tried and foiled from different viewpoints. Yet all of them "benefit" with the cure.

—What makes one think it is that all of the efforts and all of the many millions of dollars spent so far to date, have failed? It is that they make any gains, we compute them by fractions.

—We have some ten million unemployed, with millions that are just holding their own against government help, to these millions of people on public works everywhere. On the other hand we find those that are employed restless and discontented. Some are crying for bread and some want more profit.

—We must quit kidding ourselves about prosperity, and about the high standard of living, that is being enjoyed by all. We must have a big drive against poverty and the depression, at the bottom, that's where most people are at. That's where the "Townsend" Plan is an alert. The great value of this plan lies in the one fact that the fund is revolving. All that is needed is to work, that it provides a constant circulation of the great fund. Unless the many millions that are unemployed in our banks and that being hoarded by people of wealth, so if the people were allowed to hide or hoard this money, it would be a worthless scheme.

—But many ask in dismay, where is the huge sum of money to come from. Who is going to pay? Two billion dollars a month! We must understand that that does not mean 24 billion dollars in a year. But two billion dollars as the initial fund, which must revolve twelve times in a year, hence this sum is spent for goods or things in 30 days. The idea is that if a billion or a million dollars are put to use, then a billion dollars worth of goods will be moved. And that is just what we want.

The plan calls for a 2 per cent sales tax in which all the people must pay. This may not be to our liking and it may even be burdensome, but we think that there are 100 million of our people that would spend their last dollar to save our beloved land from communism or Hitlerism.

Let us adopt this plan, and call it the American Plan.

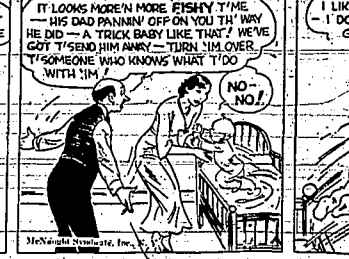

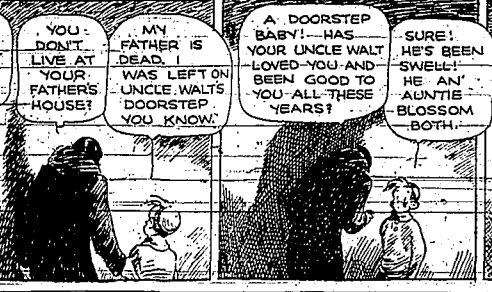

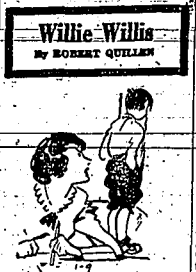
