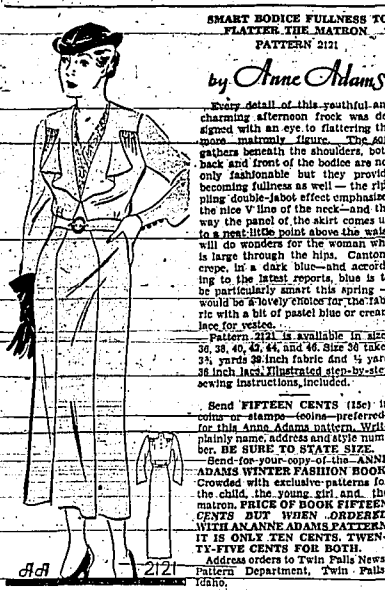

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PIONEER CITIZEN DIES AT OAKLAND

A. N. Sprague, Twin Falls' First-Druggist-Succumb



A. N. SPRAGUE, pioneer Twin Falls business man and one time sheriff, for whom funeral services will be held today in San Francisco.

Funeral services will be held in San Francisco today for A. N. Sprague, 66, Twin Falls first druggist and one-time Twin Falls county sheriff, who died early Tuesday in Oakland, California, where he had made his home and been engaged in business more than 25 years. The body is to be cremated.

A later, Mrs. Oona Ayres of Twin Falls, who with the widow survives him, will attend the funeral services. Mrs. Ayres was summoned to Oakland last week by word of his serious illness which followed his wife's death followed illness of about three months duration, attributed to "leptemia."

Except for the two-year period of his service as sheriff in 1910-1912, Mr. Sprague was engaged in business as a druggist through the entire period of his residence in Twin Falls.

Early Day Builder In the early day development of the Twin Falls community Mr. Sprague took an active and substantial part. He was one of the men when the people of the new community gathered for recreation and amusement. In a place of character feathered head-dresses and war-paint, and set up a wigwam in the center of the "Indian territory" was "Dell" Sprague, who was chosen to be "Chief Ojibwa."

Member of Twin Falls elite today, Mr. Sprague served in 1911 as his second exalted ruler. He was a member also of the Knights of Pythias lodge.

Born in Morrill, Kansas, Mr. Sprague came to Idaho from Minnethaha, Kansas, where he had been engaged in business, and came to Twin Falls after residing for some time in Pocatello.

Associated in his first drug store in Twin Falls with Jesse Butler, Mr. Sprague subsequently entered into partnership with A. C. Deane and Burley, having been at one time his business associate.

Mr. Sprague visited here the last time about two years ago.

2. Never read in glare or in your own shadow. Have all lamp globes shaded. For portables, a shade which is light in color, wide in spread, and open at the top.

3. Make an inspection of your lighting fixtures and bring them up to date. This means eye comfort now—eyeight protection later.

4. See if you have sufficient floor and table lamp for proper illumination, and if they are properly placed.

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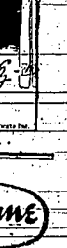
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**"EASYMONEY" SALE
