Frequent minor clashes between Nazi and anti-Nazi factions in the Saar basin as Sunday's momentous plebiscite approaches are manifestations of the mounting political tension there.

Indications point to the Saar's return to Germany. Neutral observers forecast an overwhelming vote in favor of allegiance to the Teuton banner.

Whatever the outcome of the vote the decision will be history-making. The city of Saarbrücken basks in the rays of a world spotlight that may never be focused there again.

The Saar has been a disturbing factor in European politics ever since the termination of the World War when its destiny was placed in the hands of the League.

Regardless of which way the Saar residents turn, there seems little likelihood that anything really serious will result although the danger of international complications should never be overlooked.

THRIFT IN SWEDEN

The thrifty, apparently, are in for a tough time wherever they live. Some Americans feel that the cost of Mr. Roosevelt's experiments is going to fall mainly on the shoulders of the thrifty American.

Sweden is a member of the Boloney Sterling bloc, of which Great Britain is the leader. But far from being robbed of their "thrifty" because of a boloney monetary policy, the thrifty Swedes have been able to do better than any other nation and for the comfort of the government. Business is booming, but the only unemployment in Sweden is the unemployment of capital.

Private savings accounts are frowned upon now by private banks, and the interest on such accounts has fallen to two per cent or less. The Central Bank rescound rate has been cut down. Trust and insurance companies are having to buy common stocks because there is so much money around that the supply of securities has become glutted.

Unemployment of capital is so extreme that when the government recently sought a modest loan it was oversubscribed five times in twenty minutes. The announcement, on the part of the government, that because of its policy of balancing the budget it is so well heeled that it proposes to call its 1934 bonds, thus throwing another batch of capital out of work.

In this respect, at least, the thrifty of America are better off than those of Sweden. For though their taxes may go up, just later, they will not be asked to administer a carter through any more of its experiments, they will have plenty of opportunities to buy government bonds, low though the yield may be.

A MAN OF ACTION

Advisers from Washington are to the effect that the most general criticism of Mr. Roosevelt's message is that it was "vague." Even some of those democratic senators and representatives who were readiest with public declarations that it was a great state paper, destined to loom large in history, revealed dissatisfaction in private. Principles were outlined; but not the specific proposals.

They were more so than the present message. 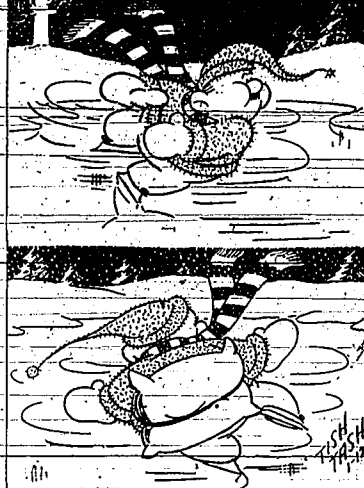

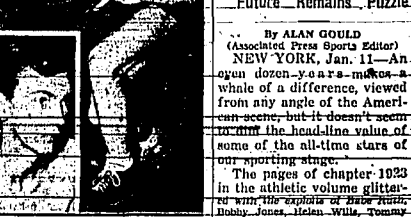

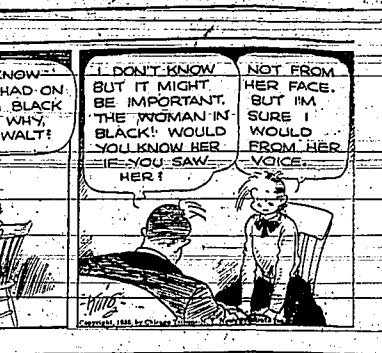
