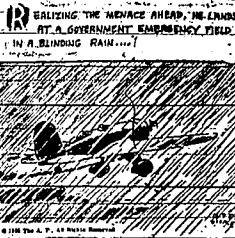

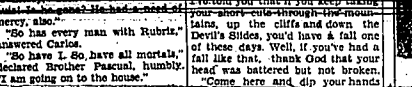

BILL FOR LIQUOR LICENSE REVAMPED

Governor's Commission to Introduce Overhauled Measure

BOISE, Jan. 12 (AP)—William S. Cady of Pocatello, chairman of the governor's advisory commission on liquor control, announced today that the commission's reworked liquor control bill will be introduced in the legislature Monday.

The commission's bill calls for licensing of saloons and package goods stores of legitimate character for consumption of premises or in restaurants. A state director would be in charge.

TAX INCORPORATION PROVISIONS BROAD

Relief Measure Covers Delinquencies Estimated at \$18,000,000

BOISE, Jan. 17 (AP)—Described by state legislators as the "most important measure" to come before the session of the Idaho lawmaking body, house bill No. 2 the incorporation measure on tax delinquencies reaching in its provisions, it covers delinquencies estimated at \$18,000,000.

It must pass under suspension of the rules as an emergency measure and if a threatened measure is considered by Speaker Voss (D-Ada) falls Monday, and it is signed it will become law immediately. Legislation now in effect will expire on midnight January 20.

Here are principal provisions of the bill passed today:

1. If taxes are delinquent for any of all the years from 1923 to 1933 inclusive the mortgagor will cancel annual 1 per cent charged when taxes first become delinquent.

2. A first payment on delinquency may be made before the fourth Monday of next June.

3. The unpaid balance bears interest at the rate of one-half of one per cent per month.

4. Each six months after the first payment has been made another payment of 10 per cent of the total, with interest to date, will be due.

5. The entire amount owed, plus the interest up to the end of any month can be made in one time payment.

6. If taxes are not paid in the mortgagor period may be paid without interest any time before the fourth Monday of next June.

7. If two to four semi-annual consecutive installments are made in which the property is located will make a delinquency entry, and the property in question will go to tax deed at the end of the usual three-year period, unless redeemed.

8. If property has been taken by tax deed for delinquency prior to 1928 it can be redeemed any time up to July 1, 1935, by payment of all current taxes, penalties and interest.

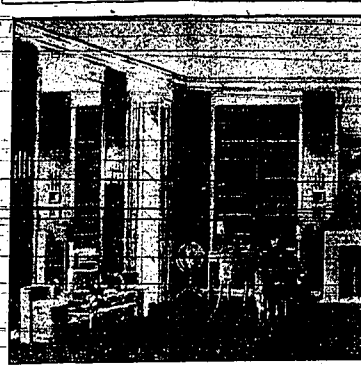

AS FARM AID IN CHILE

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)—Chile soon will have insect armies fighting her farmers' battles against other insects.

Following the lead of agriculturalists in the United States and Canada, the Chilean government is installing an "insect army" at Santiago, Chile, and other cities of the country's plant life.

It is planned to produce 100,000,000 of the insects to be used in the more destructive insect enemies of the country's plant life.

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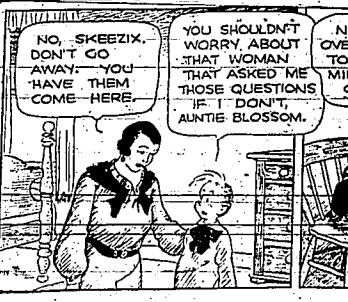

NEW YEAR BEGINS AT COURT HOUSE

Re-Elected Officials Take Oath for New Term; Death Causes Vacancy

Out of 12 Twin Falls county officials elected at last November's election, only 10 are to take the oath of office at the beginning of a new two-year term in the court house tomorrow.

Death last December of Dr. Frank A. Dwight of Pomeroy, caused a vacancy that is yet to be filled by appointment by the county commissioners, and one of the newly elected officials was sworn in a week early when Edward Babcock, prosecuting attorney, was inducted into office on Monday of last week to succeed C. W. Wilham who resigned to accept a federal appointment.

In the appointment of a new county commissioner, commissioners are expected to choose from a number of applicants. The list includes two morticians, Stanley A. Phillips of the Twin Falls mortuary who was a candidate for Democratic precinct committee, and L. J. Johnson of the Evans and Johnson funeral home.

James L. Smith was elected county clerk in 1929 when the late Dr. H. M. Lee was elected coroner, a physician has served as county coroner of this county. During the commissioners' appointment of all vacancies, any justice of the peace in the county may serve as coroner, commissioners have no clerk.

Appointed two years ago as clerk of the district court and ex-officio county auditor and recorder, Frank J. Smith was elected to that office last November, and will be sworn in tomorrow for a four-year term. Other county officers were elected for two-year terms.

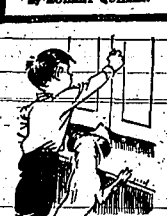

"I Pray You, Lapidary," by Hala Jean Hammond, Caxton Publishers, Caldwell, is poetry by the author of the soul, the thirteenth of the prayer of the heart, and the longing of the flesh in the sublimated form of "I Pray You," then this volume of 98 sonnets is poetry in its finest form—Hala Jean Hammond, Mississippi-born, at present employed in the Indian Agency, Tahlequah, Oklahoma, with an intensity that reminds one of John St. Vincent's "Milly," voices thus the soul's despair.

"There is no word but tells its own story. Epistle 95A, without its sun. And in my soul renews itself."

"This thing that will not die, renews itself."

"From the Mild Battlements," by Dom Field, Caxton Publishers, Caldwell—Rare beauty is sustained in this religious verse of Dom Field. They sing with the assurance of a family-founded faith, joyous barren penitence, and will be a joy to the devout especially. The spiritual vision of Dom Field is tenderly expressed "with an ecstasy that engenders ecstasy." The author, native of Brooklyn, New York, is head of the order of Augustinians at Portmouth Abbey college, and holds the degree of master of arts from the Catholic university. He is an associate editor of the North Carolina Poetry Review.

TRIALS TO REVIEW CRIMINAL ACTIONS

Calendar for Term Includes Two Cases Remanded by Supreme Court

The criminal calendar for the new term of the district court opening in Twin Falls tomorrow, Judge Adam B. Barclay of Jerome presiding, includes two cases that have been tried here previously and that have been remanded by the state supreme court for new trials.

Three of the five supreme court justices took exception to the trial court's definition of the word "malice" at the trial here in December, 1933, of Lewis Hunter, 50, on a murder charge in connection with the death of H. C. Leitch, Twin Falls resident, on November 5, 1933, and the case was sent back for a new trial. Hunter was found guilty of second degree murder and sentenced to serve a 10-to-25-year term in the state prison. Since his return from the state prison for the trial the bond to which he was admitted before the first trial had been reduced from \$500 to \$300. He had not furnished the reduced bond last evening.

Edith Alkin, brother of 19-year-old Edith Alkin whose death was allegedly caused by an automobile collision for which Calico was held to blame, is in California, and is not expected to return for some time. The prosecutor said Calico was sentenced to serve a 1-to-10-year term in the state prison, but sentence was stayed during proceedings on his appeal.
