IDAHO'S GOVERNOR ASKS \$4,488,200

Ross Requests \$323,178 More Than Appropriated by 22nd Session

Most of the 7.76 per cent increase the governor explained, will go to pay the employes of the state, members of university faculty members who were added to take care of the state's increased cost of additional costs of fuel and supplies.
The governor's approval of \$4,488,200 is \$167 less than the general and institutional funds requested from general fund appropriations for the biennium.

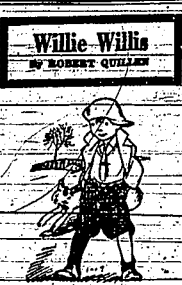
