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THORNTON'S ACTION DELAYS FLIGHT OVER LIQUOR BILL

Gathering Opposition to Ross Commission's Measure to License Private Vendors Develops in Legislature

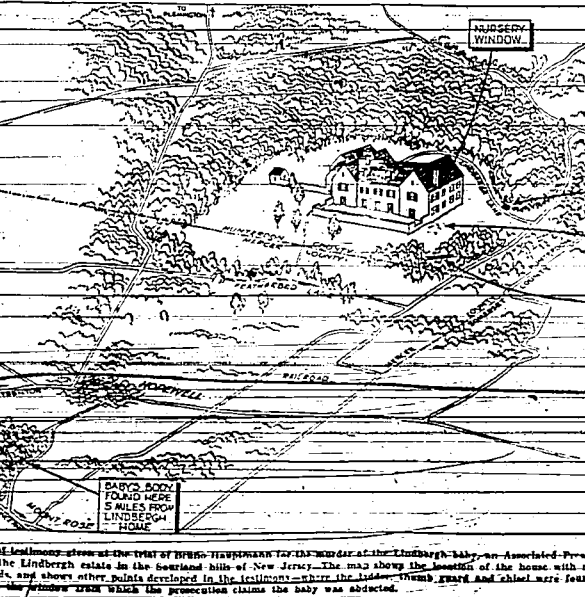

### Huey Long Offers Depression Remedy

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP)—Huey Long said last night that "we are more in the third year of the Roosevelt depression" and that "there is one sure way to avoid Huey Long for president"—the redistribution of wealth.

The Louisiana senator, at odds with the national administration over things political and economic made his declaration in an address broadcast over the Columbia network.

With a terse prelude saying that laws should be enacted to "compel the multi-millionaires and billionaires to share our wealth," Long swung into action with:

"We are now in the third year of the Roosevelt depression with conditions now admitted to be much worse than during the Hoover depression.

This was his only direct reference to the national administration.

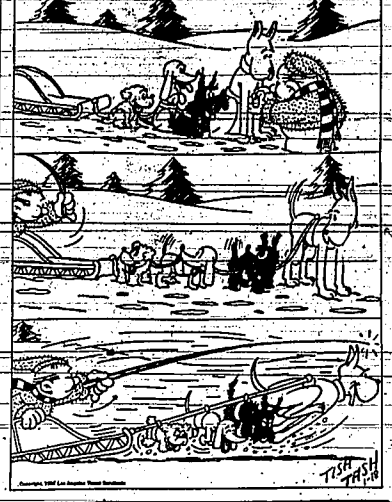

"Wanna buy a duck?" jests the radio, comic, and ten-million radio listeners, as he laughs heartily as he attempts to make the sale.

"I can make you a gift with no strings attached—of a nice live deer," asks the citizens of Halley, but in one snicker, she laughs about Halley's latest clever problem. "You mean I can't buy you a duck?" she asks, her eyes twinkling with a mischievous twinkle.

By way of explanation these folks of the upper country will tell you that for years Halley has been the way to the finest piece of game country in which any hunter ever missed a sure shot. The Nimrod came, did their hunting and departed. Everyone was satisfied, and during the shooting season Halley basked in the warm glow of the limelight.

#### Deer Comes to Town

But this winter the game has been opened in the other way. A young doe has come to town to live.

There is nothing startling about that, you'll say, for you have heard countless tales of deer and elk and bison ranging freely in the mountain towns during a hard winter.

This was the attitude of the good folk of Halley when the doe first galloped into town and made the corporate limits—her playground—children petted her, their elders were tolerant, the dog population snarled—probably with approval, and "that cute little doe" remained and grew fat in her new environment.

She grew fat—and sassy. But what to do about it? She had adopted the town and the law protects her. 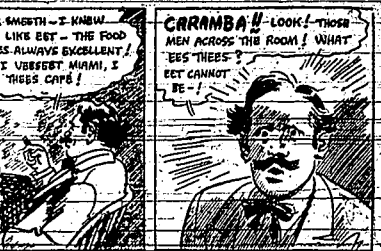

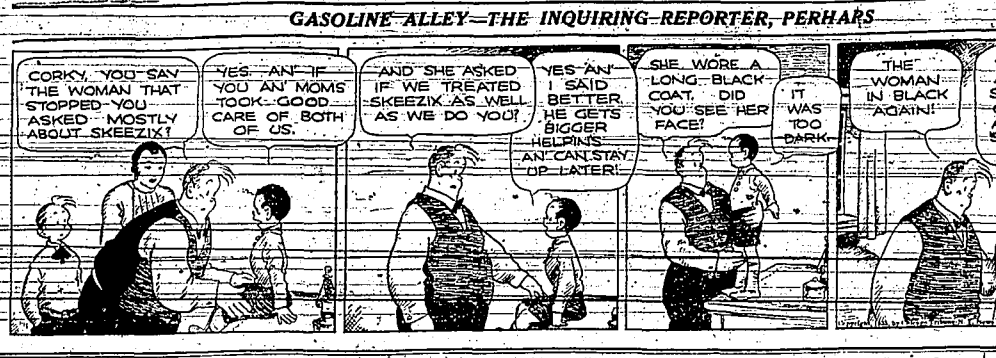

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**COURT RULES ON SALMON WATERS**

Canal-Company Legal Advisor-Sees-Complete Victory

A ten-phase regulation for distribution of Salmon river waters as between the Salmon River Canal company and the Utah Construction company was approved yesterday by Judge C. C. Gavanah of the federal district court at Boise in a decision on questions raised in a suit which the canal company filed last August.

A copy of the opinion was delivered yesterday to Frank L. Stephan of counsel for the canal company who said last evening, "It gives us about everything we asked for."

Applying for regulations under a federal court order entered in March, 1909, the canal company charged the Utah Construction company had wrongfully handled Salmon river water by means of checks and dams and other devices during the flood water season to the detriment of the canal company.

**Demands Measurement**  
The court's decision contains detailed instructions regarding the handling of Salmon river waters and on a principal question in dispute ruled:

Flood waters of Salmon river or its tributaries where it will return and flow into the river are in well defined water courses or natural courses should not be intercepted by defendant's irrigation system or artificially deflected from its natural course; unless such water be measured and the amount thereof charged against the defendant's allotment, and no such flood water, unmeasured should be intercepted by artificial means constructed or maintained for such purpose to lands higher than the flood water stage.

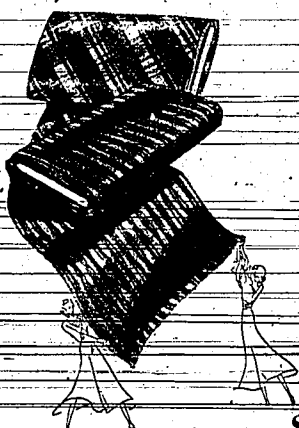

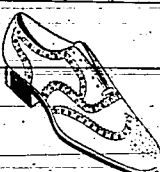
