



But should such a decision be reached it is conceivable that it would be based upon the question of the power of Congress to ate to the President the rights involved and Congress could make quick correction by, of itself, following the Presidential pro-

If Walter Lippmann is right—and he is gift for spotting new trends the we can do less worrying about Communism Fosciem and other modern forms of despotism into which the depression has plunged so many nations.

Many of us have been alarmed by the apparent success of dictatorships, both radical and reactionary, in meeting the new economic problems. Nations, to save their lives, were surrendering their liberty. Russia, Germany, Italy, Austria and other countries flaunted their systems in the faces of the few remaining-free countries. Could democ racy survive-even in France, Britain and America? Many Americans are still worrying about it.

- Yet the situation has been changing thinks Lippmann, and now the tide has definitely turned. Ideas alien to democracy have begun to recede. Despotism has failed to prove itself the bulwark of social order. 
