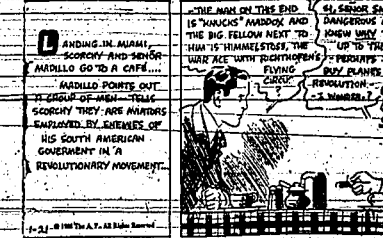

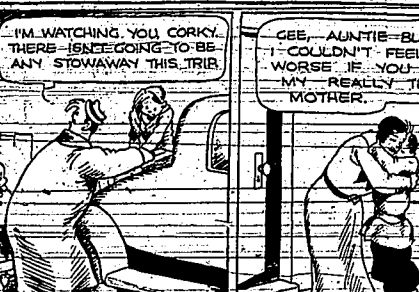

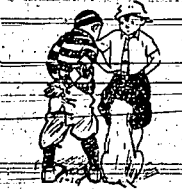
BEEF CONTRACTS BRING \$130,000

Growers Share Payments for 1933-1934 Crops and Plantings

Twin Falls county sugar beet growers will receive approximately \$130,000 additional payments for 1933 and 1934 crops and plantings some that never were harvested. It was announced at Twin Falls county agricultural office last evening. These payments representing a part of the growers' share of the sugar processing tax revenues, are to be made approximately to 800 growers in this county who have signed AAA contracts under the federal regulation of future beet production on their farms. An \$800-acre base acreage has been established for this county, the county agent said, indicating that total allotments for the coming season will probably amount to fall below 90 per cent of that figure. The base acreage, he said, is within 50 acres of the total 1933 crop which was the largest produced in this county.

The 1934-1935 payments include a flat \$1. a ton on the 76,410-ton estimated production of the acreage planted to be 1934 plus an initial payment of 20 cents a ton on the 141,000-ton production in 1935. The county agent said that the Twin Falls County Sugar Beet Production Control association is completing work on contracts which will probably amount to one-half the total number ready to forward to AAA offices at Washington within the next day or two. H. O. Lauterbach of Hansen, chairman, said last evening. Payments to growers under the contract will be made sometime after the contracts are finally approved.

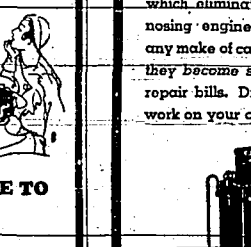
