Game Conferees May Urge Closed Season On Waterfowl Vandalism Gonzaga Basketeers In Rough And Tumble Game

Battle Looms Over Wild Duck Crisis as Sportsmen Convene

Delegates Split Into Two Opposing Camps Over Preservation of Dwindling Webfoot Population

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—Prominent sportsmen and conservationists met today in a closed waterfowl season for 1935 drew battle lines today as 600 delegates from all 48 states and every province in Canada checked in for the opening of the 21st American game conference lasting three days.

Since the drought of 1929, when breeding and refuge centers were dried out and a decrease in population of waterfowl, particularly diving ducks, became apparent, sportsmen have postponed recommending a closed season. Now, however, they face the necessity of taking such drastic action.

Today's preliminary sessions, also preliminary sessions of game management at the University of Wisconsin, conducted a research program, set off the fireworks by declaring that 1934 should have been a closed season.

Biological Survey

It is clear that many states and many clubs would not have been, it is expected and enforced as such, says Professor Leopold, who is in charge of the biological survey of the state's waterfowl. He expressed in terms of game policy, 1934 taught us that our administrative engine, being dependent on shooting revenues, stalls when the mix gets too thin. This, of course, is when we need it most.

Other opinions on the question, which will be taken up at an open forum tomorrow, were expressed in the morning session. The biologists, against a closed season are willing to compromise to the extent of cutting down the length of the season and reducing the bag limit.

Biological Chief to Speak

Tomorrow's waterfowl symposium will include talks by James H. Brown, biological survey chief in Canada; and J. N. (Ding) Darling, famed cartoonist and chief of the U. S. Biological Survey.

One of the highlights today was a talk by F. C. Lincoln of the U. S. Biological Survey, who revealed that North American waterfowl have such a strong attachment for their annual flyway routes that if a matured Atlantic flyway duck is taken to the Pacific coast it will migrate to the south via the far-western route but return to its breeding place in the east.

H. H. Fredriksen, electrical and plumbing inspector, remarked that he had once written a memorandum on liquor traffic control in a context conducted by the Hearst publications.

SUIT'S DISMISSAL AID TO TREASURY

A substantial advantage for Twin Falls county's exchequer was marked up yesterday when counsel for the Twin Falls Bank and Trust Company moved in the district court here for dismissal of its suit started in February, 1932, for refund of \$229,250 tax on bank stock for 1931 that was paid under protest.
