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LIQUOR PROBLEM COUNCIL'S TOPIC

City, Expecting Added Burden, Asks Share In Revenues

Extensive discussion of Idaho's liquor control problem at a meeting of Twin Falls city council last evening began and ended with a unanimous recognition of the fact that we're not going to have much to say about the law that is adopted, but would prefer to have it started with the assistance of local counties and municipalities which will have to bear the entire expense of enforcing the maintenance of the liquor traffic should also share in liquor traffic revenues.

George H. Paulson, city attorney, reporting at the mayor's request on the work of Idaho Alcohol Control Board, which he is a member, said the committee had not yet worked out a proposal for distribution of liquor licenses or revenues to submit to the legislature.

COURT SETS TIME FOR RE-HEARINGS

Calico also was granted a new trial on appeal to the supreme court. Judge Barclay granted the prosecuting attorney's motion for postponement of the new trial on account of the absence of one of the state's witnesses.

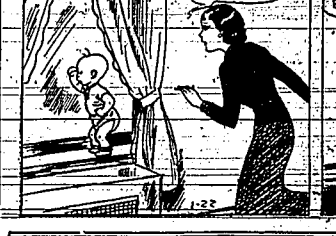

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Victorious in partially breaking down the projected "gag" rule procedure on the \$4,800,000,000 relief program, House Democratic insurgents tonight prepared to try to curb tomorrow the broad power granted President Roosevelt in legislation providing the fund.

Although doubt was expressed that the bomb was large enough to have wrecked the entire structure, Fred Trunk, a police ballistic expert, said it easily could have demolished all the offices on one floor, and possibly others.

Police Search Every Floor Immediately after the dynamite was found, squads of police searched the tower and began a minute search of every floor on the chance other explosives might be discovered.

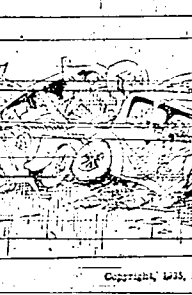
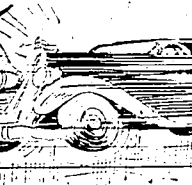
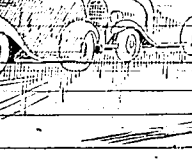

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LABOR SECRETARY DISCUSSES SOCIAL SECURITY PROGRAM

Frances Perkins Advocates Plan to Lawmakers as 'Reasonable Start Rather Than Too Big a Plunge'

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Self-assured and modestly unboastful black secretary Frances Perkins today testified that the administration's social security plan provided a "reasonable start" toward safeguarding against the "major hazards of life."

Explaining the program to the house ways and means committee, the first woman cabinet member said extensions might be made upon the structure called for by the bill as the need arose.

She has made a specialty of social security problems and spoke after another authority on the subject. Senator Wagner (D-N.Y.) reviewed the program measure for members of the senate finance committee.

Reasonable Start Favored.—"We realize that this does not provide the best possible plan," Perkins said, "but it seemed better to recommend a reasonable start rather than to take too big a plunge."

The secretary appeared after an administration expert had outlined a plan to set up a fund of probably two billions dollars in the hands of the treasury which would be available to pay unemployment benefits.

Edwin E. Witte, executive director of the national security council, said such use of the reserve fund built up by a pay raise tax was contemplated by the bill.

Secretary Perkins said health insurance was still a matter of study. "It is recommended that the age be fixed at 65 for old age pensions because we realize that it has become necessary to obtain a man who is more than 65 to do a job," she said.

Both Witte and Wagner said that if the unemployment insurance plan proposed had been in operation during the 1920's it would have greatly reduced the effects of the depression.

Three Pay Cuts Favored.—"I have favored a three per cent payroll tax upon employers' earnings, but the 1931 act until 1940, if business did not improve before that time, would either one or two per cent."

Wagner said a study of family earnings in the United States, just completed, showed that in 1929 6,000,000 families received less than \$2,000 a year, 10,000,000 families averaged less than 2,000 a year and that 20,000,000 families received less than \$2,500 a year.

"At the same time," he said, "the 36,000 families at the top of the economic ladder received \$100,000 a year, 11,632,000 families at the bottom."

These citations show how big the gap is in the United States, but the 7,000,000 Americans who are now over 65 years of age have been reduced to a state of helpless dependence.

Ickes, who is also in charge of the conservation of public lands, said that the present departmental arrangement for conservation is "a chaotic jumble."

He pointed out that the national parks, the bureau of Indian affairs, public lands, the bureau of mines and the geological survey were under the interior department.

COLUMBIA VALLEY AUTHORITY FAVORED

Central Washington Project Supported by President, McNary Announces

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (AP)—There was considerable excitement around Capitol Hill today over the delegation of Washington, Oregon and Idaho, following a statement by Senator McNary that President Roosevelt favored the establishment of a Columbia valley authority and the transfer of the Grand Coulee project to the Columbia river in central Washington.

While the president's attitude toward power development has been known to favor it, McNary's disclosure was the first specific indication that the administration looked with favor on immediate establishment of such an organization.

Plans already brought from Washington's Democratic senators Bone and Schwelblich that reclamation bureau engineers have drawn plans for the high dam, having met at Elmir, Washington, early this month for the purpose of considering such a plan.

Numerous conferences were held on the subject. First Director of Reclamation, James H. Doolittle, of Portland, Oregon, met with Senator Pope (Idaho), who had a bill pending for a TVA, after an hour of going over the bill. Pope and Dana dashed away to confer with McNary.

The following day Pope and Representative Knute Hill (Idaho), who also has a measure in congress for a TVA, met with McNary and Dana, Pope and McNary subject to a meeting and conference with McNary.

As a result of these conferences and a meeting scheduled for the delegations of Washington, Oregon and Idaho, followed by a visit to the White House, the president, the plans which have been agreed on, it is expected Pope and Hill will sponsor a measure, which in all probability will become known as the Pope-Hill TVA bill.

Senator McNary's conference with Pope that he would be willing to substitute the Pope measure for his own, after an agreement had been reached by the delegations from the Pacific Northwest.

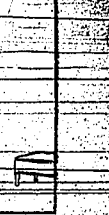
