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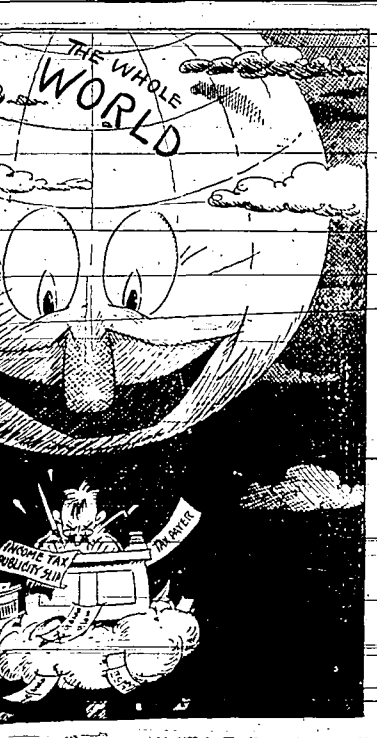

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24 (AP)—President S. M. Cehodas of the Western Fruit Jobbers association told that body's annual convention here yesterday the agricultural adjustment act had failed to produce the results hoped for.

He also urged the jobbers to organize to take a stand on regulation of motor-truck and water transportation. Speaking of the AAA Cehodas said: "This act in its practical enforcement has failed far short of producing the ideal results hoped for. It has led to the expending of enormous sums in what might be termed pure experimentation without satisfactory outcome. While it is contended that much of the outlay will be recovered to the treasury, it is a certainty that the most of it can only be recovered through taxation."

**COLD SNAP CRACKS  
BIG WATER LINE**

**Hurry-Up Order Brings New  
Pipe From Utah for  
Replacement**

A costly break in Twin Falls municipal waterworks system was caused by the recent cold snap when temperatures fell on two successive nights to fifty below zero, the low mark for the season and filled with ice the 10-inch-pipe from between that crosses Rock Creek canyon on a trestle along side the Shoshone street bridge. Every section of pipe in the 400-foot span was cracked and broken by the frost's action.

Rising temperatures disclosed the break last Wednesday. A burn-out order was dispatched to Salt Lake City, and express trucks yesterday brought the new pipe from Provo, Utah, furnished for replacement of the broken line.

J. M. Dimond, superintendent of streets and waterworks, said last evening that regular employees of his department will complete the new installation within the next three or four days.

**Question of Use**  
There seemed to be a question whether the by-pass of the waterworks system in operation continuously, or whether it is a supplemental supply line for use in case of another supply line that crosses Rock Creek canyon near the Jerome Cooperative creamery, the superintendent said.

He said that shut-off valves at the by-pass had not been closed this year, and that, so far as he knows, they never had been closed since the iron pipe installation was completed to replace wooden pipe on the by-pass three or four years ago.

The superintendent said he had not received last evening a bill for the new iron pipe that will be used in reconstruction of the by-pass. He had ordered 435 feet of the pipe, he said. Its cost is estimated at around \$150 a-foot.

The damaged pipe is suitable for use in culverts at street crossings, the superintendent said.

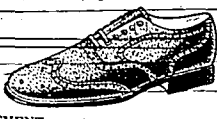
