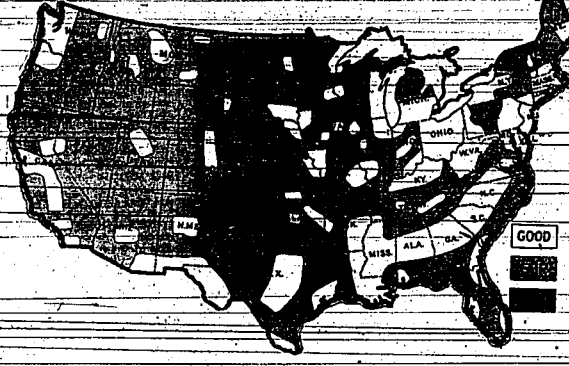

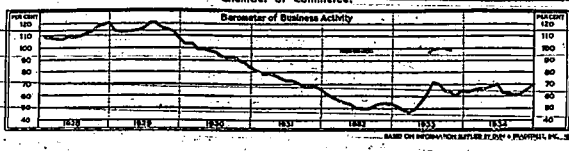

ECONOMISTS WORK ON SUGAR CONTROL

Tentative Rules Submitted To Congress

In Omaha

OMAHA, Neb., Jan. 26 (AP)—Three federal economists left here for Washington last night after working out the tentative of 27 sugar beet manufacturing companies in the United States regarding tentative rules governing the 1935 sugar season.

R. H. Colgren, chairman of the group representing the government, said no action was taken concerning the agricultural adjustment administration's "stabilization program" for the sugar beet industry.

The federal economists will report to John B. Dalton, chief of the AAA sugar section.

It is a program in which sugar supplies are to be adjusted to consumption and the agricultural adjustment of stabilizing the industry and increasing returns to the domestic producers, including those on our islands.

New acreage allowances. He indicated the processors accepted most of the provisions outlined to them, but desired to compete for acreage in other districts than their own.

Congress said a new recommendation on acreage allowances for various districts will be made to Secretary of Agriculture Wallace soon by the sugar section of the AAA.

The hearing here was attended by representatives of sugar beet manufacturers from Ohio to the Pacific coast. George W. Mills and B. H. Bendix were the other federal economists.

Assemblyman Morgan (R) of Santa Monica, was the author of the motion picture tax measure. He proposed that all motion pictures released in California, including those manufactured outside the state, be taxed 1 cent per foot of film. Copies as well as originals would be taxed.
