

A recent magazine tells of remarkable results obtained with a "polygraph" and a "psycho-galvanometer." The former works like the instrument which a physician strap around the patient's arm when testing his blood pressure. It registers internal excite-ment when a question is asked that stirs gullty knowledge: The latter is based on the fact that when an offender is asked a crit question, he literally sweats. He holds a metal slab in the palm of his hand, and a guilty feeling, starting the sweat, increases the flow

over his heart, investigators say, cannot con trol his sweat glands. They report success in obtaining confessions in three-fourths of the cases where the polygraph was used, and a larger proportion with the galvanometer. A subject starts sweating, enough to register, over so simple a matter as mention of a card hat he has secretly looked at in a deck

With particularly tough criminals, criminologists have obtained remarkable results from the "truth serum." They administer the drug scopolamin, which leaves the memory but dulls the self-protective faculties so that subjects automatically tell the truth, sometimes better than they could when fully
