

PEACE PROSPECTS

According to Viscount Cecil, distinguished British diplomat, future war can be everted only by intelligent and ceaseless efforts on the part of all countries. There mus be no compromise with Mars he warns. This statement rings with authority, coming as it does from one who has a broad knowledge of conflicting world currents most likely to war and who has devoted a large part of his life to the cause of peace.

In summarizing the situation Viscount Cecil clearly recognizes existing dangers and makes no attempt to minimize them. But he points with assurance to the amicable sottlement and adjustment of the delicate Jugoslavia controversy as triumphs for Fifteen or twenty years age either might have kindled another martial -holocaust. Nowadays statesmen prefer the befor soner course Mediation and concilia-

have replaced haste and poor judgment in the majority of chancellories.

It is quite generally believed that had Parls, Berlin, Vienna or London possessed an official peace advocate of high rank in nineteen hundred fourteen there would have been no war. Instead of the calm delibera tion of today the emphasis was then placed upon nationalism and intercourse between the different capitals was more formal and less friendly

Beingerency has thrust itself to the front repeatedly since nineteen hundred eightee But each time a soothing influence overcar a-hundred-eichteur Indignation was tempered the difficulty. with reason and common sense

-Three factors have helped to enforce-Euro pean accord during the past few years, per-haps with more potency than all others combined. These may be listed as the present economic status, uncertainty over the final alignment of the various powers in event of hostilities and the memory of the last war, which is still fresh in the minds of men old

Outwardly at least Europe appears more peace-conscious than in months can foretell the future with accuracy there seems to be no immediate cause for alarm over continental trends at present.


