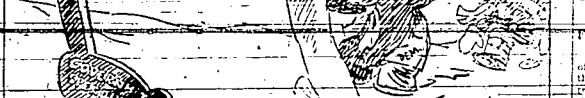

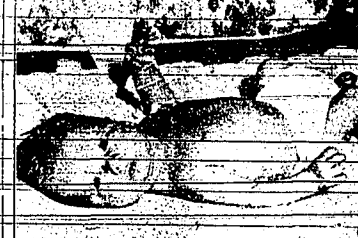

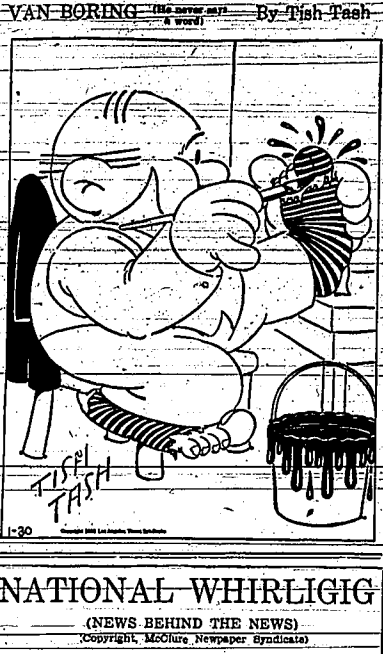
IN THE INTERESTS OF THE AGED. In the interests solely of a better understanding on the part of both those who uphold and those who condemn, the News in this edition reprints from the Townsend Weekly an unusually interesting article on the Townsend Plan from the pen of the well known author Kathleen Norris.

It has been frequently estimated that 50 per cent of an average family income of \$3000 goes to taxes. It is of the order of ten cents for every dollar of the tax which the citizen pays for the privilege of being able to pay for government.

THIS IS A PECULIAR AGE, with a vastly different social trend and a new set of economic forces and movements which even ten years ago would have made a dent in public thought.

As a contribution to public enlightenment the article referred to is of general interest. The plan itself may never reach a stage of active operation but out of it may come a system of old age pensions which will constitute a milestone in the progress of the nation.

LABOR LEGISLATION. With unemployment continuing to mar the industrial picture considerable attention has been drawn to the congressional proposal for a thirty hour working period each week. Perhaps no suggestion in recent years has caused more of a flurry in legislative halls or in the ranks of capital and labor. The abbreviated week schedule calls for no reduction in pay. The whole idea of course is to provide jobs for men and women who are now idle. If successful, the plan might ease the relief burden and enable a greater number of people to be self-supporting. It is really a division of the work program. Proponents of the scheme foresee an increase in the buying power of the masses, a gradual termination of industrial discontent and an elevation of public morale as inevitable results.



A New Yorker at Large. NEW YORK—Artie McGovern, a tall, burly boy who quit the ring by popular demand and started a gymnasium over a beer saloon at 48th street and 7th avenue, now takes care of the island's most famous waist-line.

When Artie started the gym in 1910, he had a vague notion that "exercise" was what he had for the "human frame that bears." But he wasn't sure. He knew only one course of training in those days. Bunker and boxer went through the same routine. They punched the bag, then punched each other, took a shower and went home. But Artie discovered that the banker sometimes wasn't able to get home, and if he did manage to get there, he never came back.

A course at the Cornell university near Ithaca, N. Y., changed his opinion about training, so that now he caters to more bankers than boxers in his new skyscraper gym at 42nd street and Vanderbilt avenue. No more faithful customer has Artie than Babe Ruth. Though the Babe has been away from town this winter, Artie's "first" has been missed since the fall of 1927 when he came to Artie in a state of collapse.

Two McGovern worked with him ten hours every day until the start of the winter season—that, that year, the best of his career. "On the strength of his success with Ruth, Artie's business boomed. He took over the job of deflating Paul Whitman, the great pug-chasing champion, who likes to tell of the daily fights between Ruth and Whitman, which were refereed by the late John Philip to East.

Others in the sport's world who are regular visitors to Artie's gym are Sidney Wood, Vinnie Richards, Jack Dempsey, Johnny Beall, Sam Langford, "Doc" Garden, Eastern Tiger Smith, never misses a day. He has put on seven pounds since the close of the 1934 campaign and he came in at least seven more before the 1935 Davis cup campaign gets under way.

"But Artie's 'big name' is in the field of finance, politics and art rather than in sports. Wilfred Funk, the publisher, Light Lines and Dean is the great pug-chasing champion. He is playing that much-publicized game of tennis.

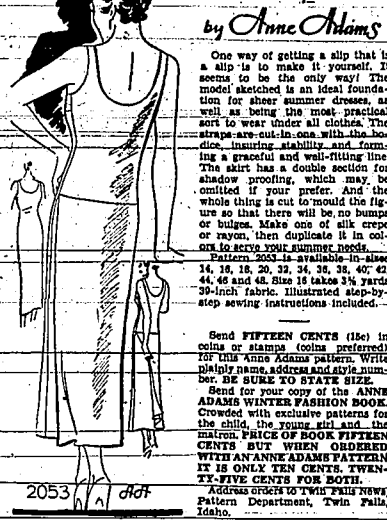

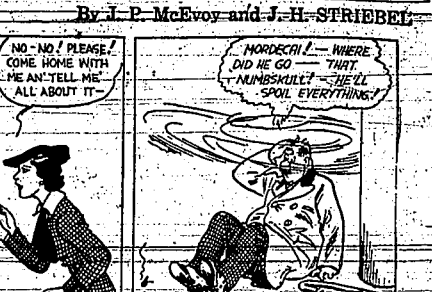
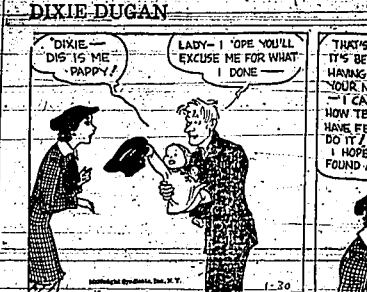
