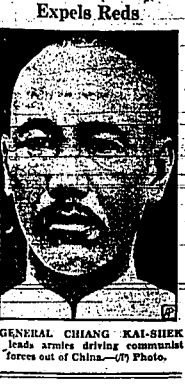

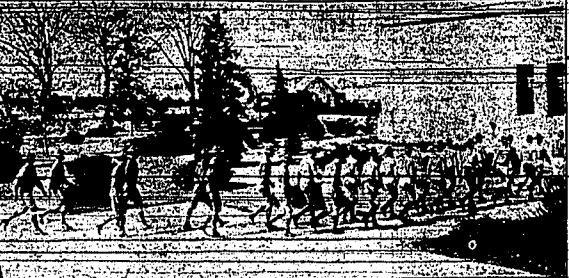

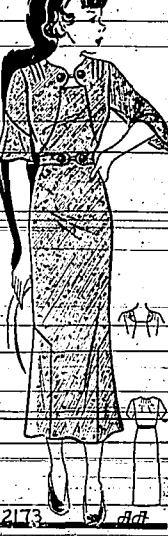
### Huey's Guardsmen Defeat 'Square Dealers'

FOR A FREE BRIDGE
There can be no question as to the manifold advantages to this section of the elimination of the tolls on the Twin Falls-Jerome bridge. By and large, more people would use the bridge and in the benefits of this additional traffic both Jerome and Twin Falls counties would share.

At the time the structure was erected payment for crossings presented the only means by which the bridge could be financed. Bonds were sold, interest to be paid and redemption effected with the money so earned. A franchise conferring upon the operating company the right to charge such tolls during a period of years was executed and delivered. Today the bondholders own the bridge, at least the bonds constitute a first lien on the property, and in the last analysis are the people who will have to be dealt with.

It is possible to finance such a purchase by all means left it be done provided the price agreed upon is within reason. Expense of maintenance and loss in tax revenue under public instead of corporate ownership should be far outweighed by the advantages which accrue from a free bridge instead of a toll bridge.

Dr. F. H. Vilevsky, the famous lexicographer, is quoted by the Los Angeles Times as estimating that the ordinary individual can make out with between 3,000 and 5,000 words for both speaking and writing. The highly trained professional person employs as many as 25,000 "strange" words, says Dr. Vilevsky, and Woodrow Wilson struck a new high in the field of papers and books by the use of 60,000 words.

### TAXPAYERS FAVOR STATE SALES TAX FOR NEEDED RELIEF

County-wide Organization Declares for First Class County, Weed Law Amendment, Revoke Re-elected

Twin Falls County Taxpayers' League members at an annual meeting here yesterday, vigorously championed emergency relief administration measures which they declared for a state sales tax to meet "necessary" relief expenses.

The league was named to draft the League's limited, declaration for state sales tax, and also a statement of reasons for proposed amendments to noxious weed control laws providing for charging assessments for weed eradication following public hearing. Both resolutions are to be addressed to the governor and members of the legislature.

The taxpayers' meeting also went on record in favor of changing Twin Falls county classification from second to first class.

H. Chris Reinke of Twin Falls, president, and J. Bondwyck of Buhl, secretary, were re-elected. Directors elected were D. J. Koenig, H. H. Hamilton, J. C. Johnson, W. Hardin, Kimbrey, J. F. Cordes, T. W. Dill, J. S. Nicholson, P. L. E. Young, E. B. H. Newton, G. W. Salmon, Marvin Miller, Castleton.

The meeting approved the report of the taxpayers hospital committee and the report of the Twin Falls county hospital business and conditions of the past year, and members of the committee and H. C. Johnson, hospital superintendent. The report stated that the hospital is providing additional private rooms at the hospital and stated such rooms could be provided without encroachment on the hospital.

During discussion of taxation for relief, D. J. Koenig suggested "we should have the right to see that the money is not wasted." He withdrew the suggestion, though another speaker commented that it dealt with a matter that should be given careful consideration and remarked that it might be made the subject matter for another resolution. Koenig had offered it as an amendment to the resolution dealing for state sales tax for necessary relief.

**Contracts Emergency Service**

During the world war, H. C. Reinke remarked, "men with their hands on the wheel" were drafted to work without pay and did their duty effectively in that emergency. He contrasted that service with the present emergency and remarked that "one thing he said, he could not understand was why an expert on relief should be paid a higher wage than a common laborer on relief. It doesn't cost one any more to live than the other," he said.

Declaring for a sales tax rather than a property tax to meet relief requirements, the majority opinion of Eiler said the way relief work has been done has become a scandal.

George F. Sprague of Twin Falls sponsored the resolution calling for a first class rating for Twin Falls county. There was a division in the vote on that proposition, though the vote on the relief sales tax and the late amendments was unanimous. N. V. Sharp of Piler moved for adoption of resolutions on both latter subjects.

The chairman announced appointment of a committee composed of Judge J. H. Baldwin, N. V. Sharp and Eiler to draft these resolutions.

### AAA Activities Leave Little Time for Other Projects

Production control, drought relief and rehabilitation programs are making such heavy demands upon Twin Falls county agents that little attention has been given to educational projects which have been tracked unless it is possible to provide an assistant "dummy agent," Harry S. Hale, county agent, said in his annual report for the year ending last November 30 which was filed with the legislature here last evening.

During the year, the report says, a large number of projects were wholly or partially discontinued. These projects such as various experiments and demonstrations in the improvement of varieties of crops, soil fertilizers, livestock feeding and many other projects, necessary for the diversified agriculture of this county were not given sufficient consideration during the past year that would justify the best interests of the agriculture of the county."

### Federal Government Activities in Assisting Agriculture are Very Important

Assisting agriculture are very important and should be given first consideration," the county agent said, pointing out in another part of the report that "Twin Falls county farmers have received some \$40,000 as direct benefit from the agricultural adjustment programs and have undoubtedly received more than this amount indirectly by the increase in the price of agricultural commodities due to the agricultural adjustment administration."

A large part of the production in Twin Falls county are well pleased with the agricultural adjustment program and are favorable towards continuing it," the report said.

Listing as next in importance to the agricultural adjustment program the livestock marketing association which includes lamb pools, rabbit hog pools and cattle shipments," the county agent says "other important projects which should be given the time possible include 4-H club work, soil correction, crop improvement, poultry improvement, and many other educational projects."
