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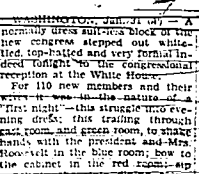
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LIQUOR BILL INTRODUCED

Evening, Twin Falls, One of Sponsors of Measure In House

BOISE, Jan. 31 (AP)—Interest in liquor legislation before the Idaho legislature was divided tonight between today and house bill 5, the state-owned liquor store measure that will come up for consideration tomorrow.

House bill 5 will be taken up under a special order of business at 11 a. m. It probably will not come up for a vote. A move to table it or to get it into a committee of the whole for amendment is probably the best chance it has. Since its introduction five other bills have appeared and consideration of them is sought before final action is taken.

The measure introduced in the house today is sponsored by Thornburg (D-Shoshone), Albertson (D-Blaine), Dewey (D-Gen.) Sidorow (D-Fremont), Nelson (D-Bingham), Mann (D-Idaho), and Turk (D-Shoshone).

The philosophy back of this bill is to provide for the licensing of private vendors with consideration for the varying wishes of citizens as to the locality in which they reside.

It creates five districts, Twin Falls, Lewiston, Boise, Pocatello, and Coeur d'Alene. The districts of which these cities would be headquarters are to have different laws.

The legislature is confronted with the big problem of raising revenues for schools. The schools of Idaho are greatly overcrowded at the present time due to an influx from growth areas. The schools of Idaho are to receive from this act will go to the schools and counties.

This would materially reduce the school tax in those areas where the schools are overcrowded.

Package goods stores might be licensed in one district—Idaho might be licensed in another, matter for final determination by the legislature.

The governor's advisory commission liquor bill now in a house committee would license private vendors—selling alcohol and package goods.

WOMAN TESTIFIES IN OFFICER'S TRIAL

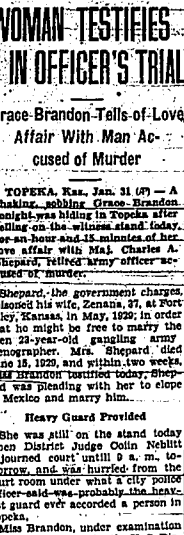
Grace Brandon Tells of Love Affair With Man Accused of Murder

TOPEKA, Kan., Jan. 31 (AP)—A shocking, robbing Grace Brandon tonight was telling in Topeka after telling on the witness stand today, for an hour and 15 minutes of her love affair with Max Charles A. Shepard, killed army officer accused of murder.

Shepard, the government charges, poisoned his wife, Zenana, 37, at Fort Riley, Kansas, in May, 1929, in order that he might be free to marry the then 23-year-old gangling army stenographer, Mrs. Shepard died June 15, 1929, and within two weeks, Miss Brandon testified today, Shepard was pleading with her to elope to Mexico and marry him.

Heavy Guard Provided

She was still on the stand today when District Judge John Nebbett adjourned court until 9 a. m. tomorrow and was hurried from the court room under what a city police officer said was probably the heaviest guard ever accorded a person in Topeka.

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NEGOTIATIONS ON SOVIET DEBT FAIL

Secretary Hull Announces Collapse After Five-Minute Parley

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 (AP)—Soviet-American negotiations for a settlement of 16 year old Russian debts of \$500,000,000 abruptly collapsed today, carrying with them hope for an immediate and greatly expanded trade with the Soviet Union.

Secretary Hull, after a brief conference with Alexander Troianovsky, the Soviet ambassador, issued a formal statement announcing the failure.

In view of the present attitude of the Soviet government, he declared, the secretary of state "feels that we cannot encourage the hope that any agreement is now possible."

"I say this frankly because I am in sympathy with the desire of American manufacturers and agricultural producers to find markets for their goods in the Soviet Union, and the American citizens whose property has been confiscated."

Troianovsky reported the negotiations with Hull at 3 o'clock this afternoon, following his special trip to Moscow to view the entire question with high Soviet officials.

Five minutes later he returned to the secretary of state's office, obviously frowning, and declining to make any statement to waiting newspaper men.

"There seems to be scarcely any reason to doubt," said Hull tonight, "that the negotiations which seemed so promising at an early hour, now are regarded as having come to an end."

He added that it would be for the better of Russia if the export-import bank, which was organized specifically to extend credits to assist in expanding American trade with Russia, to determine whether or not there is any good reason for continuing the bank's existence.

GATES TO FALL ON MIGHTY COLORADO

Boulder Dam, Now Complete, Opens Way to Water and Power for Millions

BOULDER CITY, Nevada, Jan. 31.—The hand of man fell with conquering power tonight on the mighty Colorado river...

But the Colorado was unruly. Torrential floods swept into the valley, causing \$100,000,000 damage in 1907. This catastrophe prompted President Theodore Roosevelt to act...

Twenty-five years ago the project was completed on paper and the greatest engineering work ever undertaken by man was set in motion...

For a year men dug four great holes through the hard rock of the mountains with the Colorado river, gorges, at Black Canyon, near here. These were each fifty feet in diameter...

It was the hand of man falling on the Colorado river, and the stream turned through a hole in its canyon...

Two Tunnels Fledged

Two of the four diversion tunnels have been fledged. Their first usefulness is over. From now on they will be used in connection with power-house developments...

Tomorrow at seven o'clock the water will be turned into the inlet of the fourth, one of the two on the Arizona side. The flow of the water will be used for bypassing such as needed for irrigation below.

The reservoir to be created by the dam extends 115 miles up the river, and is 100 feet deep. It is a tributary in Nevada. When filled to capacity it will hold sufficient water to provide 6,000 gallons for every person on earth. It will be 227 square miles in area.

Meanwhile work on the Atlantic power house goes on. They will generate power sufficient to furnish the needs of more than one-third the homes in America.

TNT Blast Injures Two Men in Boat

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 31.—Two men were seriously injured today as a glass boat containing TNT exploded in a small bay on the coast of the United States...

Ralph Beign, 30, electrician, was burned and severely cut by flying glass. Charles Henry, 26, also was cut by glass.

The men, both of Long Beach, were preparing to set off a depth bomb. The tube of TNT was believed to have been overheated by the sun and to have touched something as the boat rolled on a high wave.

There were five men in the boat, but no others were injured.

PRISON TERM PENALTY FOR PASSING COUNTERFEIT SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31.—Fred Little, 29, formerly of Boise, Idaho, was sentenced to five years in prison by federal Judge A. F. S. Egan today after he had pleaded guilty to passing four counterfeit bills on a Market street beer parlor.

Supreme Court Justices Approach Gold Decision With Ancient Formality

Tribunal Strives For Wide Majority Opinion

By FRANK I. WELLES
WASHINGTON, Jan. 31 (AP)—Within a short time, possibly by February 4, nine black-robed men deliberating in solemn dignity will decide whether congress had the right to end the payment of debts in gold or its equivalent.

They will do so in the name of the United States—Justices Brandeis, Stone, Roberts, Butler, Van Devanter, McReynolds, Sutherland, Clegg, and Chief Justice Hughes, chief justice of the United States.

These men, living in a world-apart atmosphere in the midst of the American citizen and by the constant for-
warding of the constitutionality of the court. Presidents and congresses may come and go, great national policies may rise and fall, but the supreme court stands as a symbol of the constitution and active in defining the rights and restrictions which limit the American government laid down for a free people.

The court strives for as wide a majority opinion as possible. Important as an early decision in the gold clause case may be, the court's duty is to give the financial community a clear and far more important to the conditions of government by law. That the court does not leave moot in the minds of the public its decision on some great national issue.

Liberals and Conservatives
It is traditional that so long as there exists any possibility of winning by logical argument a larger majority for the controlling view, the conference table remains in session. The final vote has been placed with a 4-3 decision, allowing the question to rest on the majority of the conference.

Background of Hughes
Should there be a close division of opinion on the gold clause case, the background of Charles Evans Hughes might come prominently into the picture. As chief justice of the United States, he fits well the dignity and honor of the court, and his whole career seems in tune with his station.

Appointed Associate Justice
It was in May of 1910, during the last part of his busy second term as governor of New York, that President Taft appointed him an associate justice of the supreme court. As a result of his decisions, he came to be called a "team-work judge." He was not much of a dissenter. His opinions for the most part falling in with the majority of the court.

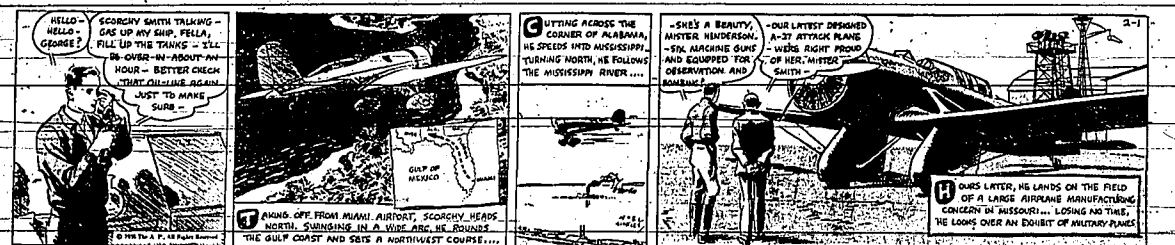
Secretary of State Under President Hoover
Mr. Hughes was appointed secretary of state under President Hoover in 1921. He was the first of two or three predecessors for that reason.

SOURCE OF POISON ALCOHOL TRACED

Deliverers of Illegal Cargo Identified, Chief of Police Asserts

By EDWARD D. FALES, Jr., (Associated Press Staff Writer)
 CLOVERVILLE, N. V., Jan. 31 — Officers today picked up the trail which they believe will lead to the source of poison alcohol that killed 21 persons in Cloverville and Ulica since last Thursday.

Chief of Police James Long at Little Falls said Joseph and Thomas Derrico of Cloverville identified John de Pedro and Angelo di Dominick as the deliverers of the alleged alcohol cargo to the rooming house of their mother, Mrs. Mary Derrico. Several of the Cloverville poison victims said they had obtained drinks at the rooming house, chemists said.

The Little Falls man will be taken to Ulica for questioning.

As Colonel L. G. Nutt of Syracuse said the revenue agents backed along the trail of death, chemists here worked to determine what specific poison in the alcohol killed the drinkers. They believed it was an ingredient of rubbing alcohol.

Chief Long, who enlisted two federal agents in the Little Falls angle of the case, said he believed the investigation would reveal the one source furnished all the deadly beverage. Di Pedro and di Dominick have police records, he said.

Until the analysis has shown what ingredient made the alcohol so deadly, bodies of 15 persons, who died here were buried and Coroner H. E. Shillington withheld a verdict.

Awful Reports
 Sixteen persons died in Ulica from poison alcohol. Authorities in Cloverville also withheld the issuance of warrants for suspected dealers until the chemists had finished their work.

A sudden death at Herkimer today gave rise to the fear that another outbreak of alcohol deaths was imminent.

John Poytak, discharged from a hospital, also died today. Twelve persons in the isolation ward were said to be in "fair" condition.

Undertaker Submits Free Bid To County

ASTORIA, Ore., Jan. 31 (AP) — An undertaker who had been buying papers for the county for nine tenths of a cent each got a surprise here today as a rival offered to do the job without charge.

The morticians had been engaged in a bit of shuffling war and the bid of the fight came when bids were opened by the county on the burial job for the coming year.

The price shuffling started three years ago when one firm was engaged at \$35 a burial. Next year, the other firm cut the bid to \$15. Last year after considerable discussion, the first mentioned undertaker finished his price at one-tenth of a cent and got the contract. This year the other one bid "no fee."

Now the county clerk is seeking advice. It doesn't know whether it can legally accept the lowest bid.

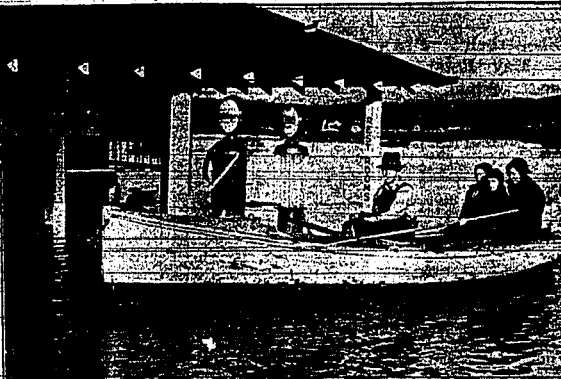

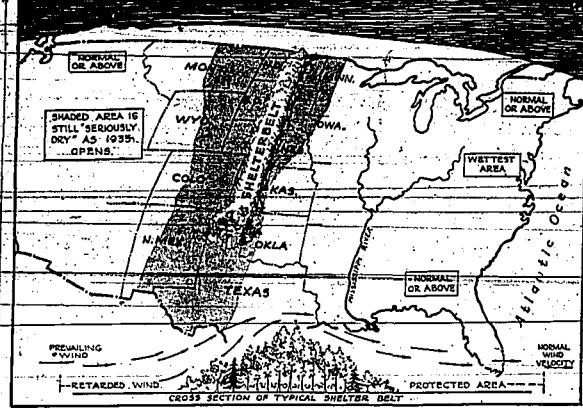

Drought Legacy Of 1934 Threatens States In Great Plains

Large Area Puts Hope In Ample Spring Rain

By F. B. COLTON (Associated Press Columnist)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Blistering parched 1934, the year that brought the most disastrous weather to this country since the records have been kept, is history, but it has left a legacy of drought to start off 1935.



The map's shaded area shows the wide belt extending from Canada's border to Texas, which the weather bureau says will be "relatively dry" for the most part as 1935 opens. Within this shaded region, U. S. foresters plan to construct a \$150,000,000 shelterbelt to retard the wind, fill the soil to the earth and help retain moisture. The diagram below depicts a cross-section of the projected shelterbelt as seen by Idaho agricultural college researchers.

The late but not lamented 1934 piled up a record for unfavorable weather in a large part of the country that bids fair to stand for some time to come.

Averaging the rainfall record for the entire year, even counting the rains that came before and after the great summer drought, shows that only one-third of the 48 states had as much as normal rainfall during 1934. One-fourth of the 48 had either the least or recorded less than their rainfall approximated the

previous record for scarcity.

States that had the least annual rainfall on record in 1934 were Colorado, Indiana, North Dakota, Ohio and South Dakota; six states went over the entire United States except for the New England states and northern New York. A large area in the northwest had the highest year-on-record, averaging nearly six degrees above normal daily throughout the year.

Abnormally Hot in 1934
All sections of the country, except along the Atlantic coast and Gulf cars and the Pacific Northwest, had less than normal rainfall. The state with the least was North Dakota, with 54 per cent of normal. The wettest region was the Maryland-Delaware area with 113 per cent of normal.

J. D. Kluener, chief climatologist of the weather bureau, describes the situation as it exists at present.

Precipitation Light
A large north-south area, extending in width from the continental divide eastward to the continental divide and in length from Canada to the Rio Grande, still is very dry with little or no improvement.

"At the same time in much of this area precipitation after the season normally is light and substantial relief naturally is not expected until the beginning of the spring rains to begin.

"The area still seriously dry includes principally western Minnesota, North Dakota the eastern half of Montana, the eastern portions of Wyoming and Colorado, most of South Dakota and Nebraska, the western portions of Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas, and most of New Mexico.

"Much of this area is subarid or land where agriculture normally is

"Shelterbelt" Plan May Retard Winds

By IRVING PERLMETER LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 28 (AP)—The federal government plans to spend \$75,000,000 to retard winds—with a view to lessening wind erosion of midwest soil and reducing evaporation of moisture.

The forest service has inaugurated the planting of shelterbelts in a zone 1,000 miles long and 100 miles wide—across the plains states—from Canada to Texas.

"Miniature forests" will be planted in strips, one mile long and 422 to 465 feet wide. Drought-resistant types of species now growing in the area will be planted, and seedlings will be carefully tended and protected according to the plan.

This fiscal year, only \$1,000,000 is available for the project. The plan is to plant 10 million trees in the largest forestry experiment in world history.

Directors of shelterbelt headquarters here say the principal idea of the shelterbelts is to raise barriers to strong winds, such as those which blow from the west across the Midwest last.

Plans for the federal shelterbelts contemplate use of cottonwoods and other trees that grow to heights of 35 to 50 feet. The Idaho experiments, in addition to indicate a wind-retarding effect, indicates shelterbelts retard winds on the job side for a distance about "times" the height of the shelterbelts.

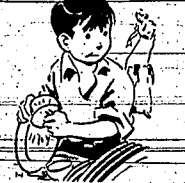

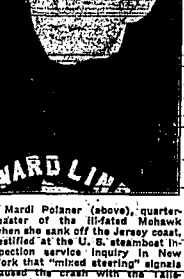

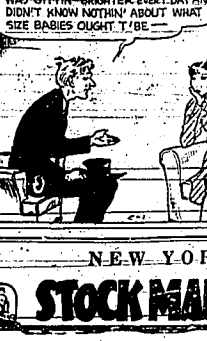

**ADULT EDUCATION
PROJECT PRAISED**

Benefits derived from the adult education classes have been both material and spiritual, according to reports of the adult education teachers, presented at a committee meeting yesterday afternoon in the office of Mrs. Maude Klinktop, Twin Falls county superintendent of schools. Interest in the classes has been maintained in such high degree that classes will continue until the first of June. All adults interested are urged to enroll at any time, it was announced.

Twin Falls Council of Parents and Teachers, in cooperation with the P. E. A., is sponsoring the classes, many of which are held at night. Frank H. Laird, Boise, state director of adult education, present at the meeting, spoke in appreciation of the cooperation of Parent-Teacher associations throughout Idaho, and of the benefits derived from this type of schooling. The local project is one of 80 in the state of Idaho, and the total enrollment is 2500 persons.

One of the greatest factors in the material education work is the "soft developing" qualities, according to Mrs. J. L. Hodges, who has been conducting group music classes.

Many of the students who have been studying chemistry and other sciences under the direction of H. L. Walker are those who are completing educations they began but were unable to complete in the past.

The classes in china painting and home beautification are progressing in proportion to the others. W. B. Smith, superintendent of schools, gave an inspirational talk on the accomplishments of the classes, which was attended by the meeting in addition to the teachers and Mrs. Klinktop were Mrs. W. E. Hauer and Mrs. G. W. Eshland, representatives of the Twin Falls Council of Parents and Teachers.
