

There is a bite in the Supreme Court's deinclation of certain phases of Thomas J Mooney's trial, It accepts evidence made public long ago showing a legal conspiracy to railroad Mooney to execution. It condemns "the deliberate deception of court and jury by the presentation of testimony known to be perjured."

Such evidence, never treated seriously in California courts, has long Times persuaded millions of law-observing Americans, and now has persuaded our highest court. Per-haps the California Supreme Court will act upon it now.

Our federal, state and local governments are battling today as they never did before against a great crime wave, and against perjury used in court for the defense of criminals. It is especially desirable now that the law itself should keep its skirts clear. Perjury is even less excusable in the prose-cution than it is in the defense,






