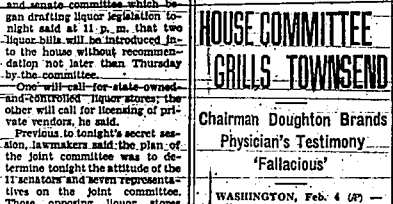

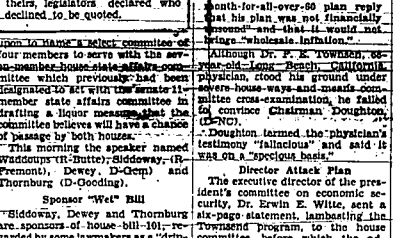
DR. F. E. TOWNSEND, 68-year-old Long Beach, California, physician, defends his old age pension plan against severe congressional cross-examination.

**SUIT WITHIN SUIT  
BROUGHT TO TRIAL**

Both of Eleventh District's Judges Holding Sessions Here

A lawsuit within a lawsuit was brought to trial before District Judge T. Bailey Lee of Burley, sitting in the probate court room here yesterday, while in the district court room, District Judge Adam B. Barclay and jury began trial of another civil action.

Neither trial was completed yesterday, and both are to be resumed today.

In the trial at which Judge Lee is presiding E. H. Johnson of Twin Falls, receiver in charge of a 20-acre orchard tract involved in the dispute, was on the witness stand throughout the day. Dispute was between G. H. Kinney, defendant plaintiff, and J. J. Hollander, Hardin, additional party plaintiff in a suit that the Venerable Products company brought against Kinney on January 1, 1932. Records in the original case show that Kinney bought the orchard tract in question at sheriff's sale under an attachment and that the receiver rented the property to Hardin. The additional party plaintiff, Kinney, alleges he will be damaged to the extent of \$3000 if he is required to accept less than three-fourths of the 1934 apple crop while Hollander has asked the court to approve a lease agreement under which he would receive one third, and the landowner two thirds of the crop. J. R. Bothwell and Harry Povey are attorneys for Kinney and Frank L. Stephen and J. H. Blandford for Hardin.

**Deal For Car**

A dispute over an automobile deal was brought before Judge Barclay and the jury in the district court room. Reynolds Motor company, defendant, in this action, recovered from a probate court award of \$175 judgment and costs to Charlie Roberts, according to the records. Roberts contracted to purchase a car from the Reynolds company on October 9, 1934, and drove it 1600 miles before the company received notice of the following November 2. Monday is to be Scouts' school day, and on Tuesday scout troops will observe the anniversary with father-and-son banquets and other similar affairs.

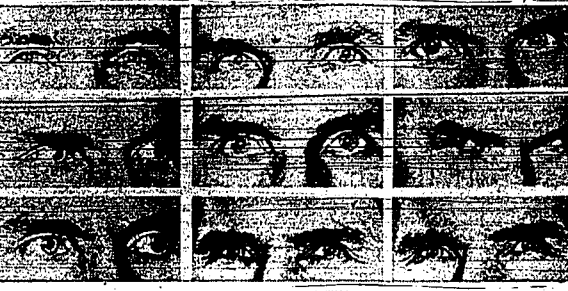

Each of the cars involved in the crash was damaged to an estimated extent of \$200.

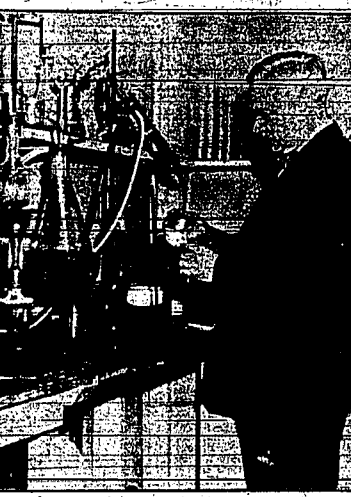

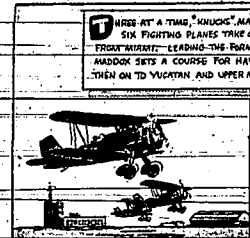

**CHARGES AGAINST DRIVER DISMISSED**

We favor the establishment of a state agency which will provide health, accident, fire or other insurance to the citizens of the state as cost. We believe that private insurance and companies should not be permitted to profit from the misfortune of human beings as has been the case with insurance companies during the depression.

We are opposed to permitting private companies to monopolize the development and sale of electric power. We favor the municipal ownership and operation of power and light plants. If private companies are permitted to continue in business they should be required to do so without franchise or favor, and to compete with one another as do all other private business enterprises.

We favor government ownership of all public utilities, and that the government shall have control over all natural resources. We believe that the past development of natural resources by private corporations for profit have been wasteful and destructive, and that eventually the government must assume control over such resources. The oil discussion represents a break down of present day capitalism and assumption of government control of many of our basic industries and resources is becoming recognized as a step toward national registry.

**Prosecutor Asks Release Because of Absence of Witnesses**

Charges against Cleo Calico of Kimberly, convicted of involuntary manslaughter in connection with a girl's death in an automobile collision and sentenced to serve a 10-10-year term in the state prison, were dismissed by Judge Adam B. Barclay on motion by Edward Babcock, prosecuting attorney in the district court here yesterday.
