A leading Pacific coast newspaper is en deavoring, by means of gruesome and realis-tic murder pictures published in its columns, to awaken public concern over the frequency

While the pictures are well calculated to ause a shudder they should serve the pur-cess of bringing home to every law abiding citizen the enormity of American crime. No attempt is made to portray murders of sheer passion in these displays, the emphasis being placed on cold-blooded, plotted atrocities unthertaken for financial gain or for other self-ish motives. Most of the views depict gangsen motives, note to the views depice gaing-ster vengeance against rival crooks or asso-clates who have "squealed" to the authori-ties. A tragic part of such cases is that innot bysianders often are slain along with man "on the spot."

Although it is quite generally known that organised crime has increased tremendously in America during the past few years few of us realize the extent to which it has spread. true picture of existing conditions. When grouped together and laid before the eyes in pictorial form one begins to grasp the sig-nificance and value of the government's anti-

Public sentiment is of inestimable value in

this battle against criminal violence. The imoperation in putting dangerous characters hehind the bars for the good of society should never be underestimated.

in nineteen hundred eleven and recalls the

For our own govern-ment, Secretary of State Hull issues a call for a hearing at Washington on March eight-centh. Millions in both countries hope to see a

trade revival spring from this movement. In the period quoted, three-quarters of a century ago, Canadian-American trade trippled in volume Trade did very well, too, during the recent boom period; in nineteen hundred twenty-eight and nineteen hundred twentynine Canada was our best foreign customer But depression worked havoc with it. On exports to Canada have dropped to about one

fifth of the pre-depression level, and our im-ports from Canada to about one-third. It is believed by friends of reciprocity that mutual-trada_can_be increased with much. benefit and little harm to either, by each country exporting products which are needed by the other and importing products it needs with-a-minimum-of-competition. We would get from Canada mostly raw materials, and Canada would get from us mostly manufactured_and_semi-manufactured_goods, with present high duties lowered on both sides.
