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ROSS' RULES FOR ADMINISTRATION OF RELIEF APPROVED

Governor Builds New Organization Plans Around Citizens' Committee Instead of Social-Service-Group - (By The Associated Press) - BOISE, Feb. 6 - The Idaho emergency relief administration advisory board today approved Governor Ross' rules and regulations to govern the reorganization and operation of the IERA.

The governor has built his reorganization plan around the citizens' committee instead of the social service division which previously has had to pass on all persons applying for relief. It shall be the responsibility of each city, village or county committee as herein provided, to pass upon the eligibility of persons applying for direct work relief, and no persons shall receive relief by such means until approved by the committee having jurisdiction, the rules provide.

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Tie Vote Averts Dole Substitution For Work Relief

Vote Needed. Administration Leaders Maneuver To Gain Vote - (By The Associated Press) - WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 - Stirred by an insurgent uprising that almost changed the \$4,860,000,000 work-relief bill into a \$2,880,000,000 dollar measure, administration chiefs tonight resorted to parliamentary maneuvering to avert a tie vote in the Senate.

With virtually nothing to do tomorrow, the senate, nevertheless, was called to meet for the special session of the House. Speaker McCallister (D-Tenn.) is a member of the closely divided administration ranks and his vote is needed to get the president's program out intact.

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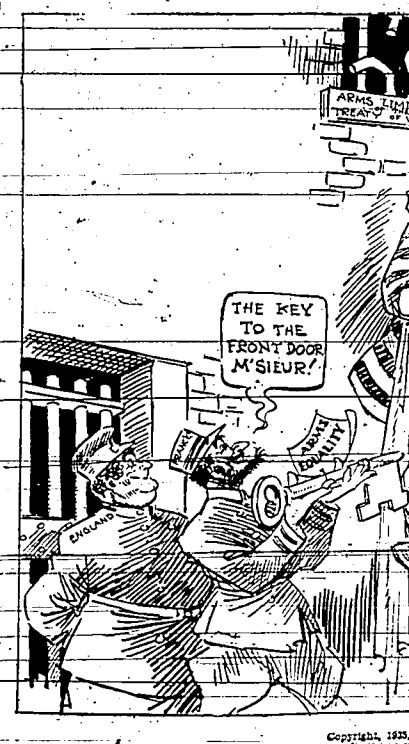
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### SENATORS DISCUSS 'DONKEY' MEASURE

#### Bill to Be Debated Again When Lawmaker Calls for Reconsideration

BOISE, Feb. 6 (AP)—The "donkey bill," indefinitely postponed when it came up for debate on the Idaho senate floor today, will be discussed again tomorrow morning, Senator Gardner (R-Chicago) announced tonight when he said he will circulate his right to bring the matter up for reconsideration.

He served such notice of his intentions today.

The motion for indefinite postponement was made by Senator Hamilton (D-Ore.) today, in a reversal of senate form—the state affairs committee had reported the bill out with a recommendation that it pass.

Senator Whitten (D-Idaho) was the first on the floor today in defense of the measure.

He termed the bill a "matter of public policy."

He appeared to be a questioner for the legislators to decide whether or not past asserted practices of allowing members to be influenced by promises of jobs at the end of the session should continue.

He criticized the legislators who had been given various positions at the conclusion of sessions previously.

Clark Attacks Measure

Senator Clark (D-Bonneville) contended that there is no reason why men who are elected to this legislature should give up their citizenship.

"I don't believe in this kind of legislation," he said. "In all my service in this body I have never known of a senator or representative who has voted for any measure, or against any measure, because of the promises of jobs. I resent the intimation that has been made here. They are in poor taste."

The bill calls for prohibition of legislators whose terms actually are two years long, but whose activities usually are confined to the 60-day biennial session, from accepting terminal session, from accepting terminal session.

The term "donkey" was applied to the measure when it was introduced in a previous session because of the stubbornness of the legislators in attempting to have it passed.

The work relief bill nearly met defeat when senate committee opponents lost by one vote an attempt to stanch the appropriation to \$2,800,000.

An abolition of public utility holding companies was the aim of the administration-favored bill submitted to both houses.

The treasury report showed the deficit for the current fiscal year had passed the two-billion mark.

Republican critics, admitting sympathy with the basic aims of the security bill, questioned the general agreement against its taxing program.

The new banking bill met opposition from two directions, with national bank advocates urging more stringent control and conservatives objecting to any tampering with the Federal Reserve act.

Means to check matters of distressed hotels and other commercial buildings were reported under scrutiny by the Reconstruction and Housing corporations.

A White House conference virtually decided to continue NRA for two more years without basic alterations.

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### Wools Offer Intriguing New Weaves

#### Gay Prints Appear At Lower Price For Spring

PARIS (AP)—Spring fabric prices are down. Many of the new gay prints and wools which a number of designers, including Rodier and Blanche, have fashioned are expected to sell at prices from 10 to 25 per cent lower than those which made winter togs.

Wools are as interesting as prints.

For those early spring costumes and coats, Rodier has designed a line of wools in pebbled, clove, knotted and ribbed weaves. The pebbled effects with very few flat surfaces among them. Peacock hairs and shimmering metallic threads are among the novel effects which he uses to vary surfaces.

Combinations In Wool

Pairs of fabrics which may be combined are another interesting note in wool. A gray granulated wool is paired with a washed, clean, white, beige and red raised striped jersey.

"Flowers splashed" prints in dark or light ground, "lilies," "Big white daisies with red centers" appear on a navy ground, colored by fringed bloom on gray, and bright panes on white.

### LAWMAKERS SEE TAXPAYER REVOLT

#### Social Security Bill Opposed as Expensive 'Hodge-Podge'

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—A two-man Republican attack was projected today against the administration's social security bill on the ground that it was a "loosely drawn hodge-podge" which would stir up taxpayers' rebellion.

But both the G. O. P. commentators cautiously and seriously added that they were in sympathy with the objective of the program.

Despite the criticisms, Democratic leaders still maintained that, whatever they called some "minor amendments," the bill would become a law.

In other capital quarters, meanwhile a suggestion was made that a Senate investigation be made into the money raising efforts behind the Townsend \$200-a-month old age pension plan, and where this money is going. The postoffice department already has looked into this question.

Foreman Reclamation

One of the Republican critics of the Roosevelt security plan today was Senator Hastings (R-Del) before the house ways and means committee. He held out that the area imposed would "not take effect until the next general election," and asserted those laws would not get back what they put in.

"When you get 40,000,000 people to paying tax to the federal government, I care not how little it may be. I think you'll find a resentment against the job by everyone in public life," Hastings declared.

The other critic was Representative Treadway (R-Mass), who predicted that when the committee later this week takes up the bill with its legislative clerk, numerous changes will have to be made.

Before the senate finance committee, meanwhile, Abraham Epstein, secretary of the American Association for a Fairer Taxation, suggested that committee look into both the financing and "propaganda" behind the Townsend plan.

The house committee already had sought legislation to limit the amount of money that the area imposed by Dr. F. E. Townsend, who proposed to submit later a statement about the plan and the funds coming in from the organization.

### Search For Karpis In California Area

AUBURN, Calif., Feb. 6 (AP)—Armed guards were ordered today for the plant of the Virginia Drug Company, six miles northeast of Lincoln, by Sheriff Elmer G. Placer county, after an investigation which indicated Alvin Karpis, desperado, was seen in the vicinity last Saturday.

### WAR PROFITS CURB BATIERS STRENGTH

#### House Committee Reports Out McSwain Bill; Quiz Continues

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6 (AP)—The first reaction to congressional probing into war profits came to house and senate today in measures aimed at limiting the whole country into a battle machine in time with excess profits to none.

The house military affairs committee reported out the measure bill aimed at limiting war profits. It was heralded by statements from its author, Representative McSwain (D-SO) and from Frank N. Boyers, national commander of the American Legion, as having the full endorsement of that veterans organization.

Meanwhile the munitions investigation hearing, pushing along with the investigation looking into charges that warship prices had risen although labor and material costs had dropped, was informed that "wines and liquors are just as necessary to be searched in many cases of ship construction. This opinion came from N. R. Parker, treasurer of the New York Shipbuilding corporation.

The liquor testimony cropped up during the committee's examination of post-war contracts during which it was shown that the company had sought during war times to collect for the cost of a launching party for a ship built on a cost-plus basis.

NATIONALISM: Just what is "nationalism" as applied to a policy of government?

The ideas of most of us are rather vague. In a general way we accept the word as indicating a form of development under government which shall stress the national rather than the international, which will somehow emphasize the idea of America for the Americans with foreign connections and entanglements reduced to secondary importance.

Whether we agree with them or not the views of Henry Wallace, secretary of agriculture, should be of interest. In offering his definition of nationalism in his book "America Must Choose," Mr. Wallace says:

"I would hate to live in a country where individual thought is punished and stifled, and where speech is no longer free if we follow the strictly national course of planned land and quotas for every farmer for every product for each month in the year. We may have to have a far greater degree of public ownership than we have now. It may be necessary to make a public utility out of agriculture—every plowed field would have its people stoking up on the spot—as yet, we have applied in this country only the barest beginnings of the sort of social discipline which a completely determined nationalism requires—our own managements of social discipline to date have been mildly persuasive and democratic."

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It will be noted that the quotation begins with the words: "If we finally go all the way towards nationalism..."

MURDER PICTURES

A leading Pacific coast newspaper is endeavoring, by means of gruesome and realistic murder pictures published in its columns, to awaken public concern over the frequency of crime.

While the pictures are well calculated to cause a shudder they should serve the purpose of bringing home to every law-abiding citizen the enormity of American crime. No attempt is made to portray murders of sheer passion in these displays, the emphasis being placed on cold-blooded, plotted atrocities undertaken for financial gain or for other selfish motives.

CANADIAN RECIPROcity

Another trade reciprocity treaty with Canada may be accomplished this year. Canada at last reports turning down the reciprocity offered her by the Taft administration in nineteen hundred eleven and recalls the wholesome effects to both countries of the treaty in force from eighteen hundred fifty-five to eighteen hundred sixty-six.

Millions in both countries hope to see a trade revival spring from this movement. In the period quoted, three-quarters of a century ago, Canadian-American trade tripled in volume. Trade did very well, too, during the recent boom period; in nineteen hundred twenty-eight and nineteen hundred twenty-nine Canada was our best foreign customer.

It is believed by friends of reciprocity that mutual trade can be increased with much benefit and little harm to either, by each country exporting products which are needed by the other and importing products it needs, with a minimum of competition.

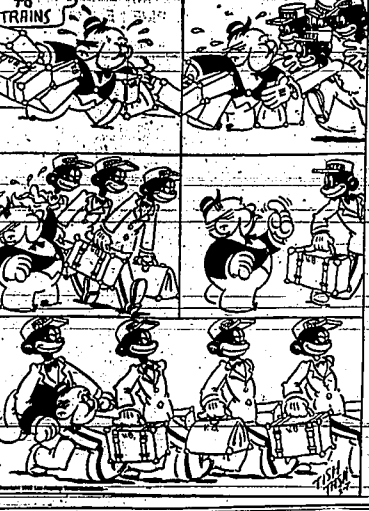

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### IDAHO TAX EXPERT AGAIN ON PAYROLL

#### House Votes in Surprise Move to Finance Dodge Salary

BOISE, Feb. 6.—P. T. Dodge of Boise, tax expert, was back on the state payroll tonight, under the general title of an attaché of the Idaho house of representatives which passed a resolution, 48 to 9, today to finance Dodge's salary for drafting, reviewing and tax measures. It was approved by the house, by a vote of 48 to 9, today in the house of representatives.

It came as a surprise move, and there were lawmakers who said they saw the hand of Governor Ross back of the actual move.

Under a resolution presented a few days ago the house appropriated \$10,000 to the state board of equalization for the hiring of an expert to draft tax bills. This action followed a recommendation of the house revenue and taxation committee that Dodge be hired by the board, and not to work drafting bills based on information furnished by the board. The board hired Dodge on a motion of Mrs. Myrtle P. Enking, state treasurer, Harry P. Calkins, state auditor, Francis G. O'Connell, secretary of state, approved, but Governor Ross and Attorney General Bert H. Miller objected. The board is now in the matter of money. Proponents collected \$12,000 of Idaho emergency relief administration funds had been spent. It would be partially lost effort unless an expert were employed to "write in" into legislative bills.

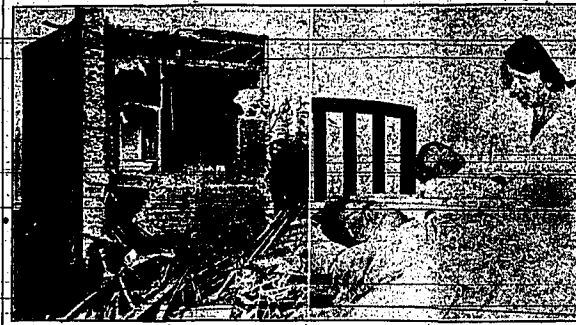

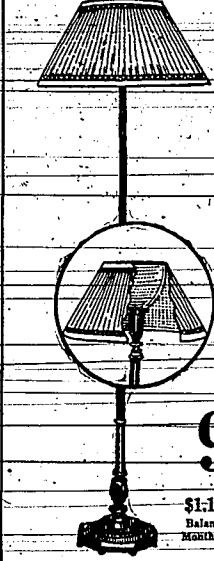
