SIMPLE PANACEAS

This country is so full of plans that the planners and their adherents are stepping on each other's feet. It is confusing and sometimes distressing.

Nevertheless all-of the plans with jarge followings are effective to some extent. They influence-public-opinion and thereby influroment and business. But they lose their identity.

Any simple remedy for economic and political ills is sure to be crude. The simpler it is, the more it is to be suspected. Govern ment and business are vastly complex pro-cesses. No single prophet can be accepted as all-wise, no single medicine can cure all that ails us. If our economic society could have been placed on a secure road of prosperity by anything so simple as some of the schemes now urged, it would have been thought of and applied long ago and we would all be rich and happy now.

What we need is practical common se What we need is practical common actual to saft out, as we go along, the parts of the various plans proposed that will help to tide us over immediate crises, and to back them up with carefully devised long-range policies.

We are accomplishing a good deal along these lines nationally, regionally and locally

LIBERALS FOILED

The most interesting political situation on this continent just now is probably in Canada. Many of our own statesmen have done some notable shifting, in theas times that try men's loyalities, but the flip-flop done by Premier Bennett, leader of the Conservative Party in power at Ottawa, leaves our politicians dizzy.

There will be a national election in Canad this year. Administrations there as in Eng-land, have no set term like ours, but there is a time limit to any "ministry" holding office without another election, and that limit is approaching.

In starting his campaign for continuance wer, the Premier, a strong Conservative a past, goes liberal and springs a Canradian New Deal which in some ways goes farther than ours. Thereby he bewilders his own party and makes the Liberals very mad.

The indignation of the Liberals is natural. but has humorous elements. They have gained control, in recent provincial elections, of virtually all the provinces. They natural ly expected to win the national government this year. Now their veteran leader, Mac-Kenzie King, chokes with rage as he tells how Bennett has stolen the Liberals' thunde What can they do, when the Tory le to leave them on the right. Apparently, if Bennett carries the bulk of his party with him, the Liberals must either become Con-servative or else to Communist, swinging to a new left. It will be a fine spectacle, what
