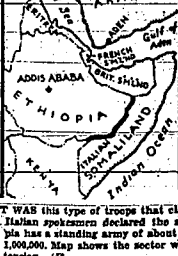

### GOVERNMENT AND STOCKMEN AGREE

#### Western Grazing Interests Would Range on Whole Public Domain

DENVER, Feb. 14. (AP)—Western cattlemen and sheepmen indicated here yesterday they want grazing districts for their herds and flocks extended to include the entire public domain in the western states. They learned at a hearing that the Department of the Interior with them in that desire. The Taylor grazing act, which hearings are being held to prevent all this week, provided that 30 million acres of public domain shall be set aside districts in which cattlemen and sheepmen might graze animals for a fee. F. R. Carpenter, director of grazing and a member of Colorado cattlemen, told an assembly of cattlemen and sheep operators that this limitation be raised so that the public domain includes about 100 million acres, of which about 40 million are not fit for grazing, leaving 60 million acres of possible range lands. Proposed Amendments Soon after he made this statement,

Ruben C. Pease, assistant solicitor of the Interior, read three proposed amendments which the department is seeking to amend to the Taylor bill. One of these calls for elimination of the 30-million-acre clause. Meanwhile, at another meeting, Utah and Idaho commissioners of public domain states were attempting to draft a policy in which they might insure protection of game birds and animals on public lands and still not interfere with stock raising. Several Idaho game commissioners in response to a question from Idaho Commissioner Pinta, Colo, director of game, said the wild life observations were making no attempt to fence out the stockmen from grazing on wild game game lands that the present population of each state can support. The commissioners asked that the Idaho Wildlife director of the biological survey report with respect to game of federal and state lands and game commissions and domestic stockmen be kept out an equitable plan for solving the problems resulting from game and livestock feeding on the same pasture. ### COMMITTEE OKENS POTATO REGULATION

#### Bill to Make Spuds Basic Commodity Receives Approval

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14. (AP)—A committee representing potato growers in 21 states late yesterday approved the tentative draft of a bill to make potatoes a basic commodity and "set up production and sales quotas for the crop. Production quotas, which would be made by states, would be based on the yield of any three years from 1927 and 1933 while sales quotas, which would be made to individual growers, would be based on their sales records from 1920 to 1933. The secretary of agriculture would be empowered to impose a tax of 75 cents on every hundred pounds of potatoes sold in excess of sales allotments. Eleven of the 21 states represented at the meeting were recorded in favor of the bill as amended during the session, while four were voted present, three against the measure, two absent, and one was recorded not voting. States voted for the bill were Ala-

abama, Idaho, Illinois, Kansas, Maine, Michigan, New Jersey, North Carolina, Ohio, Virginia and West Virginia. Florida, Michigan, New York and Oklahoma were voted present; California and Maryland absent; Connecticut, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania were voted against the plan, while the Louisiana delegate did not vote. The proposed bill was sent to the legal staff of the farm administration for incorporation of the changes recommended at the meeting. Hope of Early Passage As soon as it is finally passed upon, Representative Warren (D-NY) is to introduce the proposal, Warren was hopeful of early introduction and passage, in order to make the control plan effective as soon as possible this year. The bill would become law 30 days after being signed by the president. The proposed bill would provide a quota control plan with neither a processing tax nor benefit payments. The cost of its administration would be borne by the treasury. States to have sales quotas as well as production quotas was reached in view of the fact a large portion of the crop is grown for home consumption and as feed for livestock. Under the plan, a farmer may have a production allotment of 1,000 pounds of potatoes and a sales allotment of only 500 pounds and would pay the 75 cent tax on the hundred pounds tax only on that quantity he sold in

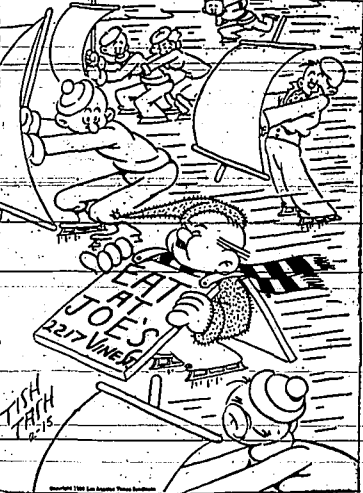

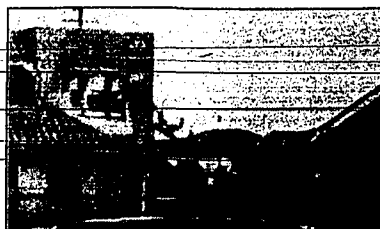

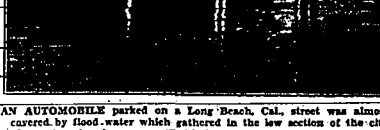

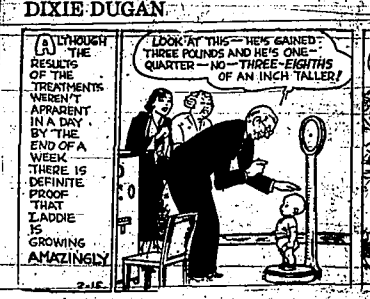

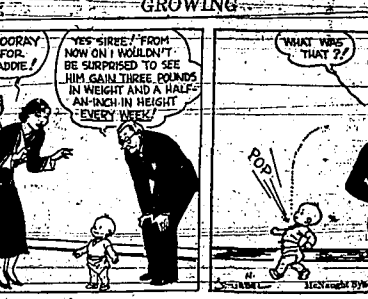

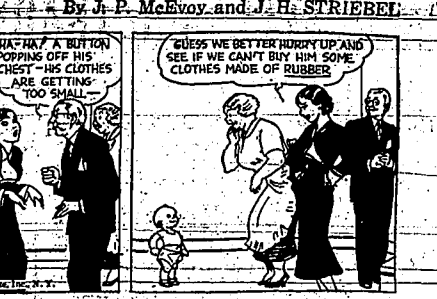
