





### A SOUND LESSON

A jury of eight men and four women, afte one of the longest and most spectacular trials in the annals of American criminal courts, has found Bruno Richard Hauptmann guilty of murder in the Lindbergh kidnaping case.

The importance of the verdict lies not so much in the severity of the sentence as in the effect of it among the criminal element the effect of it among the criminal element of the country. The verdict serves as an an-nouncement that the law after all is to be feared and obeyed. The dispensation of crim-inal justice throughout the country will be immeasurably atrengthened. No less so by the sentence than in the manner of its de livery. The presiding judge did not fix a sentence; Hauptmann was officially delivered over to the electric chair as soon as the verdict was read. The proceeding constitutes is salutatory lesson and one which should go far towards establishing a better basis for the operation of the legal machinery upon

which the country must depend for law, prder and justice. \( \)
Eight men and four women, after sitting for nearly savon weeks reached the unent mous conclusion that Hauptmann was the kidnaper of the Lindbergh baby. There will be an appeal which will serve as a stay of execution and carry the defendant past the date, the week of March eighteenth, fixed by the judge for the carrying out of the sent ence.
