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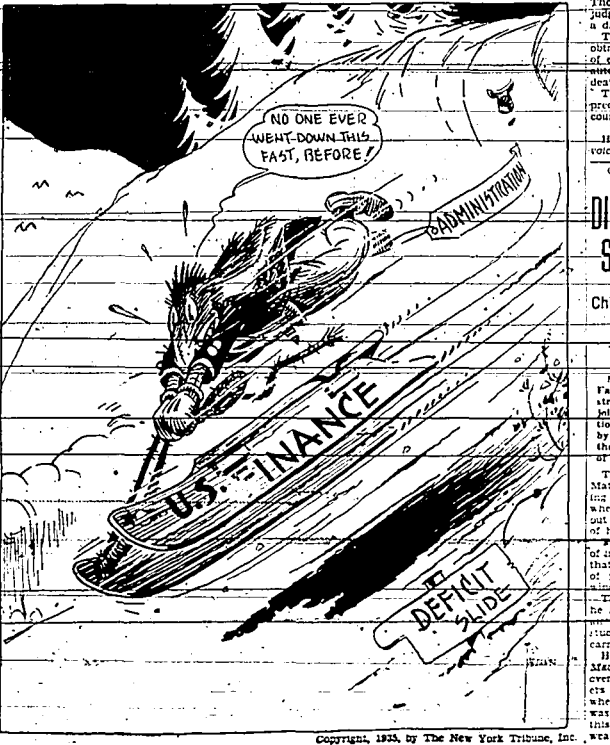

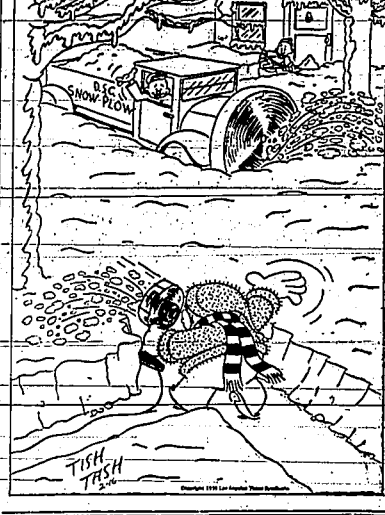

BURLEY PHYSICIAN ANSWERS SUMMONS

Dr. Leland Frazier, 65, Dies Following Short Illness

BURLEY, Feb. 15.—Dr. Leland Frazier, 65, a Burley physician who built both the Rupert general hospital and the College hospital here, died here this afternoon following a short illness from pneumonia.

Dr. Frazier was a practicing physician at Rupert from 1920 to 1922 when he came to Burley. Previous to this time he served as an army doctor and was discharged just before he opened his office at Rupert with the rank of major.

Dr. Frazier was born June 8, 1870, in Randolph county, Missouri, the son of Dr. Leland Frazier and Mrs. Mary Frazier. His early education was received in Randolph county and he spent his freshman year at colleges at Leland, Missouri, and the University of California, Berkeley. He was graduated from the University of Missouri and later received his "M.D." from the University of Kansas.

His first three years in the practice of medicine were spent at Marceline, Missouri. He was married there to Miss Claudia Rutledge and to this union was born a son, Joseph Rutledge Frazier. Following his wife's death at Marceline he moved to Coarse, Texas, where he practiced for two years.

This past year he was employed as attending physician for a Hawaiian pineapple company on its plantation on the island of Hawaii. He returned to Coarse and was married to Miss Troy Gibson Leland, March 29, 1915. To this union Leland Frazier was born.

In Military Service
In 1917 Dr. Frazier entered the military service and was assigned to the medical corps. He was first detailed to Fort Sam Houston, Texas, and later to the base hospital at Riverside, Texas. After three years service he resigned and moved to Rupert.

He survived by his wife, Mrs. Troy Frazier; two sons, Joseph, a mechanic with the United Air Lines at Portland, and Leland, Jr., student at the University of Idaho; two brothers, Dr. W. J. Frazier, Boise, and Aubrey Frazier, Coos Bay, Ore.; and four sisters, Mrs. Mary Frazier, College Grove, Idaho; Mrs. Theresia Frazier, Hildreth, Missouri; Mrs. Anna Frazier, Missouri; and Mrs. Lona King, St. Louis.

Mrs. Frazier and the two sons were at his bedside when death came. The body rests at the Goodman Mortuary at Rupert pending funeral arrangements.

NEW TYPE OF CHEESE DISCOVERED IN IOWA
AMES, Iowa, Feb. 15.—After two years of research the Iowa State college dairy industry department announced the discovery of a new type of cheddar cheese.

It is said to possess a soft, smooth texture and a buttery flavor different than the old cheddar. The cheese is the development of Dr. C. B. Dyer of the department. From 20 different strains of milk organisms he found two which would improve the quality.

These organisms possess the power to ripen cheese in one-third the time ordinarily required. Dr. Lane says he hopes his discovery will lead to the saving of thousands of dollars for manufacturers who previously have been forced to wait from three to four months for cheese to ripen.

Soldier's Medals For Heroism Mark Pathetic Romance

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 15 (AP)—A red-eyed woman sat beside an empty cot in the United States veterans' administration hospital here, her face a mask of grief.

"It was best though," mumbled the woman. "Most people didn't know Albert. And no one had tended him for five years."

VALUE OF STOCK ON FARMS RISES
Price Increase Accompanies Dwindling Numbers of Domestic Animals

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—Livestock on the farms of the country numbered 10,500,000 last year, according to the department of agriculture to be valued at \$1,310,135,000, compared with \$2,870,844,000 a year ago, and \$1,781,000,000 two years ago.

Horses and colts numbered 11,827,000, compared with 11,903,000 a year ago, and were valued at \$601,048,000, compared with \$223,133,000 a year ago. Mules and mullets numbered 4,780,000, compared with 4,820,000, and were valued at \$1,470,800,000 compared with \$401,500,000.

Cattle and calves numbered 99,577,000, compared with 92,200,000, and were valued at \$1,278,227,000, compared with \$1,247,601,000. Sheep and lambs numbered 47,760,000, compared with 52,112,000, and were valued at \$214,813,000, compared with \$187,740,000.

Swine and pigs numbered 37,007,000, compared with 37,177,000, and were valued at \$237,288,000, compared with \$236,862,000. Poultry, including turkeys, geese and ducks, numbered 47,760,000, compared with 47,760,000, and were valued at \$709,500,000, compared with \$709,500,000.

Heifers, 1 to 2 years old, kept for milk and beef, numbered 11,400,000, compared with 11,400,000, and were valued at \$228,000,000, compared with \$228,000,000.

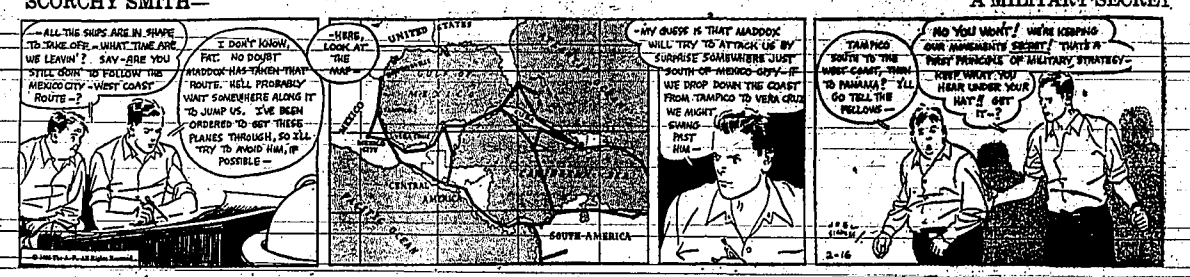

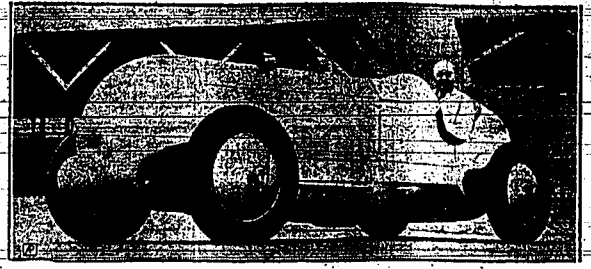
