Hauptmann Greeted By Inmates At New Jersey Prison

Governor, Judge and Jurors Threatened In Letter

(By The Associated Press)
TRIDENTON, N. J., Feb. 16—Bruno Richard Hauptmann was boded by inmates of the New Jersey state prison today as he entered the death house to await the outcome of efforts by his attorneys to save him from the electric chair.

The German carpenter, who entered the prison Monday, was innocent of any part in the kidnaping and murder of Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., and who made one in a crowd answer "we know you're innocent, Bruno," found the prison atmosphere tense.

Three prisoners saw him as he was being examined in a small room off the center corridor and started to boo. Immediately 400 in the most hall joined in. It was several minutes before guards restored order. The three were taken to their cells and will be held in the most hall.

STORM IMPENDS IN IDAHO LEGISLATURE OVER LIQUOR BILLS

State Stores Versus License Issue on Calendar With Ricks College Measure for Early Decision

(By The Associated Press)
BOISE, Feb. 16—A lull marked the 41st day of the Idaho legislature, and lawmakers tonight wondered if they could avoid a storm over liquor measures and the Ricks college bill that are scheduled for consideration Monday in the house and senate, respectively.

They expressed the belief that the disturbance would be allayed, and a majority of them voted in the belief that the state-owned liquor stores would be approved, possibly with amendments.

The joint committee on liquor bills came up for its second reading today, during a session marked only by serious efforts to dispose of a score of minor measures. In the senate the bills which would permit the state to accept Ricks college, at Rexburg, as a gift from the latter day saints church, came up for the second reading. This puts all three measures on the calendar for passage Monday.

Both branches completed their formal work shortly before 10 p. m., and many of the lawmakers went into committee meetings, all of which went with routine matters.

The joint committee was composed of house and senate state affairs committees, chosen by the respective majorities.

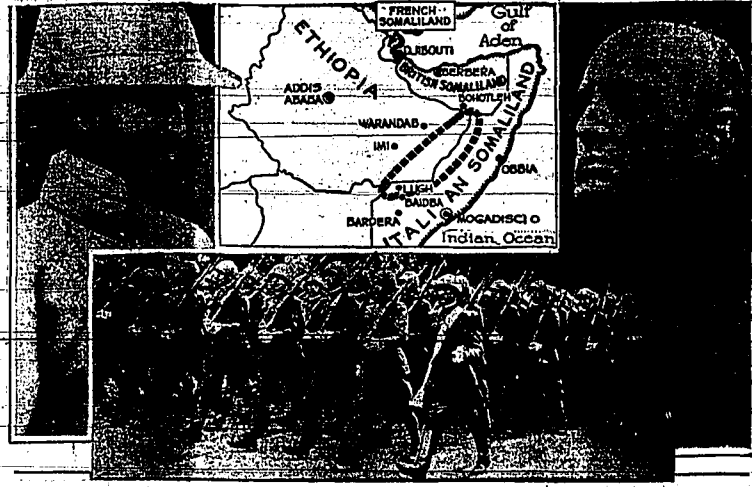
Interest Runs High

DUCE TELLS TROOPS TO BE READY FOR ANY EVENTUALITY

Battalion of Blackshirts Embarks at Naples for African Front; Ethiopians Arm for Combat

(By The Associated Press)
ROME, Feb. 16—Premier Mussolini broke his silence on the Ethiopian controversy tonight by urging all mobilized Italians to "be ready for any eventuality."

In an address to the Fascist grand council in Rome, the first time since he took office that he made a definite reference to a "front." He congratulated the "brilliant" men leaving for the African front.

His statement, to which deep significance was attached, was made several hours after the first detachment of Italian troops sailed for Africa.

Statement Cherished

Mussolini's council in a four-hour session approved his message for the security of peace "in east African possessions and those considered necessary—no control over Italian Africa."

Thunderous cheers greeted the dictator's statement, that 70,000 Blackshirts have volunteered for military discipline and for organization of a permanent force.

Rome was excited and buzzed with talk of Mussolini's characteristics by military officials. Statements from him had been eagerly awaited for days.

Blackshirts Embark

A battalion of blackshirts embarked at Naples this afternoon. It was officially revealed, after being received in Tripoli, Feb. 18, and 12 Duce reviewed two other battalions preparatory to their departure for the Italian front.

BORAH HITS AGAIN AT NRA MONOPOLY

Idahoan on Quiz Board Sees 'Ample Evidence'

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (AP)—An assertion that "ample evidence" already is available that recovery administration efforts have been "promoting monopoly" was thrust by Senator Borah (R-Ida) today during a hearing before the Senate Judiciary sub-committee.

Even as he spoke President Roosevelt worked on a special message to be transmitted on Monday, regarding the extension of the recovery act with authority for extending it another year if necessary.

Borah, one of the original critics of NRA on the ground it tended to intrude monopoly through suspension of the anti-trust laws, made his statement in an interview after a senate judiciary sub-committee, of which he is a member, opened and closed the doors on an official inquiry into charges that codes have oppressed independent business. It was described only as a "preliminary cancellation." The investigation has not been authorized by the senate.

Already Ample Evidence

"Of course, I am glad the investigation is going forward," Borah said. "We cannot have too many facts, but there is already ample evidence at hand that monopoly under NRA is draining the pockets of the average man in the United States through price-fixing."

"If the farmer gets a raise, he also gets an increase in prices for the things he has to buy. If labor gets a raise in wages, he more than pays out on account of the increase in price for the things he has to buy."

"If the retailer is forced to have his prices suspended and the interest of humanity they ought to be restored and enforced."

Supreme Court Adjourns Without Announcement of Delay

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (AP)—The national capitol tonight "light up" to a suspense-filled week-end, firmly convinced that the long-awaited supreme court gold clause decision will be handed down on Monday.

The last two Saturdays had brought announcement that the verdict would not come on the following Monday—option days. Today, the court departed from that newly established precedent. It met, consulted, and left the capitol without authorizing a statement of any kind.

SUNNYVALE, Cal., Feb. 14 (AP)—Doris and her children, Mrs. Edna Daley, sole widow of the Macon disaster, peered today with youthful eyes into an unknown, frightening future. She is an expectant mother.

Not for two long days after the sinking of the navy's mammoth dirigible, with its sequel of joyful news for every wife but her, did she give up hope of ever seeing again the heroic young radio man who stuck to his post to summon aid for others and then plunged to his death in the Pacific.

Somehow she had lived through the black hours of last Tuesday when the women huddled in the wretched building at the airbase here knew only that the Macon had fallen into the sea. Then as last came the department stages which changed agonized suspense into hysterical rejoicing for one after another.

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LABOR CHIEF HITS LOW RELIEF WAGE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (AP)—A plea to the senate today by William Green for adoption of the McCarran prevailing wage amendment evidenced some additional support for the bill.

The proposed bill would give the \$4,800,000 work relief bill its severest test on the senate floor.

Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, would each senator, pleading for the defeat of the administration's compromise plan, which would give the president authority to fix relief rates.

"Before the appropriations committee would direct that the wages prevailing in localities be paid on all work relief projects."

Fight One-Year Limit

Democratic critics laid plans also to test back other efforts to change the bill. They said they would oppose the proposal by Republicans to limit the operations of the bill to one year. This is supported, however, by a number of Democrats.

President Roosevelt asked for the \$4,800,000 to be used over a two-year period to put 3,500,000 now on relief rolls to work. However, some Democrats as well as Republicans are claiming that the vast borrowing necessary to finance the program will imperil the government credit.

The administration's argument for the full amount for a two-year program was set forth in testimony of Corrington Gill, assistant to Harry J. Hopkins, relief administrator.

"The administration's argument is that 'plan' projects and get them under way, you have to know at least for 12 months in advance that you are going to have the money available to pay them."

French Flyers Head Out Over Atlantic on Hop to Buenos Aires

PORT ETIENNE, Rio De Oro, West Africa, Feb. 17 (Sunday)—The airplane "Joseph LeBris," which two Frenchmen are flying to South America for a distance record, passed over Port Etienne at 11:15 a. m. today.

The plane, a biplane, was built and headed out over the open Atlantic.

JUSTES, France, Feb. 16 (AP)—Two French veterans of long distance flight, Paul Codos and Maurice Borel, took off from the South Atlantic today in quest of another non-stop record to better the one they already hold.

Taking off at 8:36 a. m. (1:36 a. m. E. S. T. today), they flew 100 miles an hour, averaging about 105 miles an hour.

6875 Miles to Goal

Their goal was Buenos Aires, 6875 miles away, and officials at Lebourg field believed they might complete the crossing in 65 hours if they continue at their present speed.

With the same lack of confidence that has characterized their previous flights, the two old hands at long distance flying thrust their selves to brief, unadorned reports to radio stations along the route.

If they reach the Argentine capital, they will have set a new distance record of 5655 miles by flying from New York to Syria in 1933, Codos said today, on the basis of their hourly radio bulletins, which are being averaged about 105 miles an hour.

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CONFIDENCE GOAL OF PEACE MOVE

ANGLO-FRENCH ACCORDS SEEK RETURN OF TRADE AND PROSPERITY

LONDON, Feb. 16—Britain, France and Italy have joined forces to keep Europe's peace solid by ending confidence among their people unnecessary, authoritative circles disclosed today.

That it was recalled, was the joint purpose in a copy of a letter drafted at London two weeks ago, to which Adolf Hitler was invited to reply.

As the government studied Hitler's noncommittal reply to the proposal for an exclusive security pact with Europe's major powers, questions simultaneously, these sources pointed to Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald as the man who conceived the scheme, said to Sir John Simon, foreign secretary, as the man who carried it out.

Simon said the scheme was a restoration of confidence on the continent by peaceful or forceful methods in order to restore trade and thus economic prosperity, hoping to make peace permanent.

Judge Decides Two Boys Own \$28,000 Gold Hoard

BALTIMORE, Feb. 16 (AP)—Two boys, members of poor families, today but with all their wealth they could use none of it to buy even the trimmings for tomorrow's dinner.

Judge Eugene O'Dunne decreed that the finders are keepers in ruling the treasure of gold coins belonged to Henry Grob and Theodore Jones, who unearthed it in the cellar of the Jones home.

The actual possession of the gold must await a formal order, "subject to appeal," if either of the disappointed claimants to the rich find should appeal.

The boys, 15-year-old sons of a family on relief rolls, discovered an old copper pot full of gold last August digging in the cellar for a place to hide furs from members of their club.

The coins, dated from 1874 to 1924, were worth \$28,000, but the federal government calculated their potential numismatic value at \$275,000, according to some 421 \$1-pieces on which the dates were reported unreadable. The government indicated it would not interfere if legally established owners of the coins desired to sell them to collectors for more than the numismatic value.

Award at Judge O'Dunne's decision, all the boys could say at first was "we're lucky." Then they told how they found the hoard.

"Henry said he was going to 'get my mother a home of her own,'" Theodore chimed in, "that's the right idea. I'm going to follow Henry." First, though, said Theodore, he was going to help the relief workers to stop calling.

Henry's mother, Mrs. Ruth Grob, said she was "proudly and touched" when she heard about the judge's decision— "but I got very quiet. I feel like I could burst out crying."

She said she hoped to pay the "little home" carrying "the rest of her money" to the boys and see that they got a college education. Similar plans were outlined by Theodore's mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Jones.

In awarding the boys the gold, Judge O'Dunne said he considered the claims of several groups who contended the finders should be divided. He said he was "satisfied" that the owners of the property on which it was found — Mrs. Elizabeth Jones and Miss Mary P. B. Fland.

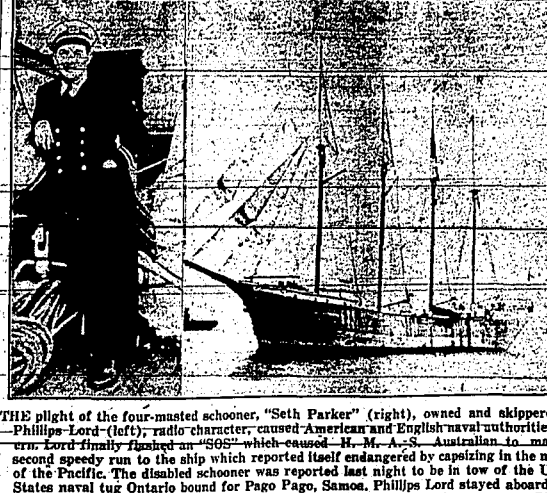

Disposition of Areas Under Taylor Grazing Bill Studied at Denver

Denver, Feb. 16 (AP)—Four tentative proposals for the disposition of land grants owned by four Western railroads were discussed here today by officials of those roads.

- 1. Lease their lands to individuals and the latter then apply for grazing permits on the basis of the extent of the carrying capacity of these lease holdings.

Grant land to stockmen if they will foot the tax bill and buy an stock raised on those areas on the railroads, owning them.

J. M. Hughes, St. Paul, Minn., land commissioner for the Northern Pacific, said this plan is followed with success in the Blain-Pumping grazing area near Miles City, Mont.

Roads also suggested that the roads lease their "checkerboard" lands to grazing district associations in each state, charge the associations 50 per cent of the taxes the latter year and add 10 per cent more each year until the associations have assumed the entire tax charges by the sixth year.

The official said, however, that the problem is so different in each state and with each road that no concerted program could be adopted at this time.

C. B. McConnell of Burns, Ore., representing the Oregon and Western Colonization company and the Eastern Oregon and company, and W. F. Vernon of Lakeview, Ore., also took part in the discussions.

The two Oregon companies control large tract grants by contract to build wagon roads in frontier days under the same plan as land given the railroad.

After the conference, Carpenter predicted some of the railroad roads eventually will be turned back to the government, the roads undoubtedly will try to sell most of their grants, and if they can't, will think he is glad to give them back to the government to ease the paying the state and county taxes on them," he said.

Bonthron, third for the second time in two weeks, trailed Vencko by five yards.

Erratic Pacing
 Vencko was clocked in 4 minutes, 13.9 seconds and Bonthron in 4:15. The times by quarters revealed an usually erratic pacing. In order they were 1:30, 3:04, 3:54 and 4:15. Cunningham in capturing his second Baxter mile within three years gained sweet revenge for the eye lash decision he lost last year in this event to Bonthron. It was Glenn's fourth victory in seven races with Bill. His time equalled the former Baxter mile record of 4:10, set by Vencko in 1932.

Overhaul Wins
 Indiana's Chuck Hornbostel, unbeaten so far during the indoor campaign, added the "Madison" half mile trophy to his collection without difficulty. The Hoosier stayed off the pace until the bell rang and then he burst forward to win by five yards over Bill Ray of Manhattan college in 1:54.

The University of Maryland's crack one mile relay quartet came from behind to whip Princeton and Yale in a three cornered match race, and annual feature of the event. 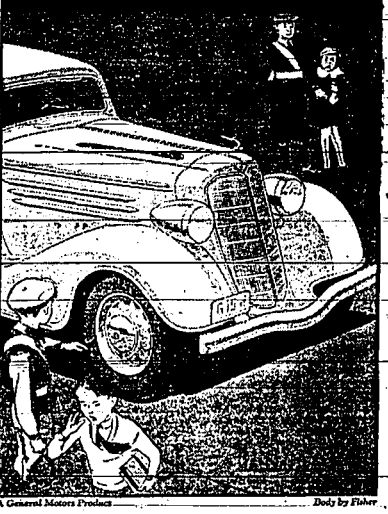

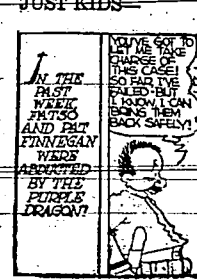
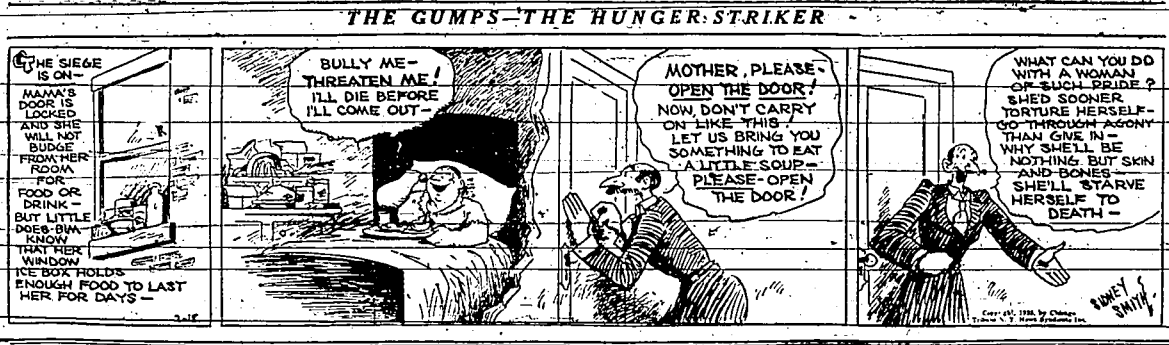
