BOISE, Feb. 18 (AP)—W. H. Wicka, director of the bureau of plant industry in the Idaho department of agriculture, has issued an order condemning unsprayed and neglected fruit trees infested with San Jose scale, codling moth and peach twig borer.

Unsprayed and neglected fruit trees in Idaho, from one tree to as many as are infested with San Jose scale, codling moth and peach twig borer are under sentence of death February 15 by order of the state department of agriculture by authority of the pest abatement law of the state, Wicka announced.

The condemned trees may be saved, however, if the owners agree to spray them specifically for the control of these pests and meet terms of the horticultural law, he said.

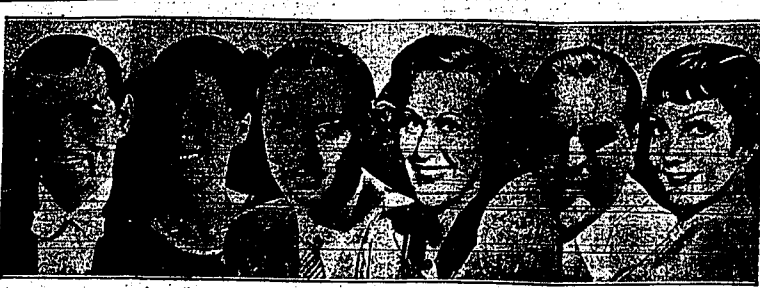

COMMISSIONERS STOP CASSIA FAIR PLANS

BURLEY, Feb. 18.—Eliminating \$4850 originally set up in the tentative budget for the Cassia County Fair, the Cassia board of county commissioners, in fixing the final county budget for 1936 during the past week, provided \$1800 for upkeep, insurance and caretaker at the fair grounds.

This includes the holding of a fair this year. A committee from the Burley Chamber of Commerce appeared at the January meeting asking the exhibits appropriation. Frank Schodde, Burley, was appointed temporary deputy and inspector by William Gunnell, county inspector, and the appointment was confirmed by the board. Schodde takes the place of Jarvis Lowe, who is ill in a local hospital.

Later Saturday night the board recessed until next Wednesday when it will meet again to allow the county printing contracts and transact other unfinished business.

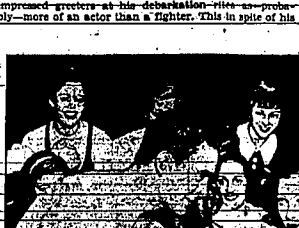

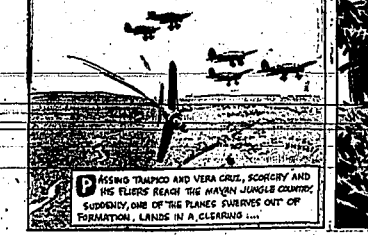
