LIQUOR STORE BILL PASSED BY SENATE; GOES TO GOVERNOR

Upper House Approves Measure, 28 to 16, Following Brief Debate; Tax Discount Encounters Veto

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, Feb. 19 — In less than an hour and a half the Idaho senate today sustained yesterday's action of the house of representatives and approved a state-owned liquor store bill, 28 to 16. The house vote was 28 to 12.

It will be signed—some time next Monday," Representative C. P. Adair, sponsor of the measure, announced today.

Governor Ross declined to substitute the legislature's prediction. He did say: "I want four or five days to study some of the provisions of the bill. I do not state right now what I intend to do. I might find something wrong with the bill."

Through Senate Channels THE MEASURE MUST be returned to the house, where it will be enrolled and signed by Speaker Troy D. Smith (D-Clatsop) and then sent back to the senate to be signed by Lieutenant Governor O. F. Mirk (D-Latah), senate president.

It is an emergency measure and the senate probably will act in the next 48 hours it will sent to the governor's desk.

The sharp bill came up in the senate today for first reading and Senator Charles H. White (D-Boise) offered a motion to suspend the rules to permit immediate action on the measure.

The motion precipitated an uprising of the left wing and after several minutes discussion during which Senator E. W. White (Boise) and Senator George Donart (Washington) exchanged some caustic remarks, Clark (D-Bonneville) moved, and Senator Chase (D-Bonanza) seconded.

Hope For Insanity Cure Rests On Vitamin B Diet

ELGIN, Ill., Feb. 19 (AP)—Eighty patients lined up at the state hospital today to receive doses of vitamin B in such containers as yeast, liver and iron.

The 85 subjects suffer from dementia praecox, a type of derangement for which it is difficult to obtain a cause. Yet, some 25 percent of the inmates who are hospitalized are victims of the malady. All of them are young.

It was reported that their illness might be traced to malnutrition. Lack of proper nourishment since youth may have had its effect on their constitutions.

It was decided to give them ladies of vitamin B three times a day in an effort to correct their condition.

In order that progress could be noted, 85 other inmates were included in the experiment but the latter group died only on the regulation fare.

Idaho House Receives \$2,300,000 Tax Bills

Caucus With Governor Precedes Introduction of Slot Machine, Tobacco, Inheritance and Sales Levies

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, Feb. 19 — Measures providing for slot machine, tobacco, inheritance and sales taxes annually to raise an amount estimated by Governor Ross at \$2,300,000 were introduced today in the Idaho house of representatives.

The bills were presented late in the day after the chief executive had met with Democratic members of the legislature in a caucus to explain the proposals.

Sales Tax for Distillate The sales tax bill would impose a 2 percent tax on the gross receipts from every retail sale of any person receiving any payment upon sale of intangible personal property or service to be responsible for the collection of the tax.

Receipts, estimated by Governor Ross at \$1,715,000, annually would go into a fund for relief of the state's destitute. This is in line with a demand of the federal government that the state after March 1 share in the cost of caring for the needy within its borders.

The inheritance tax would raise an estimated \$400,000 annually and would increase the inheritance tax rate from 10 to 15 percent.

Administration Scans New Gold Legislation

Attorneys See Desirability of Bolstering Decision

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 — Legislation to nail down the new deal's gold case victory and end continuing doubts on the status of federal bonds was studied tonight by administration officials.

"The contingency of further action against the government is removed," said Attorney General Cummings, "but it may be well, after study, to end all talk and ring down the curtain."

Approaching was an opportunity for federal security holders to test out whether under yesterday's ruling they are entitled to damages if they can show an actual loss resulting from congressional nullification of the government's promise to repay them in gold.

ITALY THREATENS STERN MEASURES AGAINST ETHIOPIA

Departure of 500 Workers Emphasizes Government's Warning; Negotiations Continue at Addis Ababa

(By The Associated Press) ROME, Feb. 19 — Because Italy's precautionary measures "do not seem to have had any effect on the Ethiopians," it was officially indicated today, stronger measures may be necessary.

A government spokesman, announcing negotiations will be going on at Addis Ababa for preliminary settlement of the Italo-Ethiopian border controversy, accused Ethiopians of trying to impose unacceptable conditions on the agreement.

If those conditions are not withdrawn, he said, "precautionary measures of a stronger nature" may become necessary.

400 Workers Entrain To emphasize his warning, 400 workers, mechanics, carpenters and other skilled laborers among them, embarked for Naples in rail for Italy.

Neutral Zone Sought ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia, Feb. 19 (AP)—An Italian spokesman said today Italian troop movements in the Italo-Ethiopian dispute indicate an Italian desire to bring pressure to bear for the establishment of a neutral zone along the disputed frontier.

The government spokesman criticized Italy for sending "soldiers and Italian Somaliland and Eritrea."

It was previously announced an agreement for the creation of a buffer zone between Italian and Ethiopian troops had been reached. The government announcement said a joint delegation would be sent to the border to map out the neutral zone.

Witness to Execution Says Benita von Falkenhayn and Renate von Natzer Went To Doom With Heads Erect

(Copyright, 1935, by Associated Press) Berlin, Feb. 20 (Wednesday)—Two men, one a former naval technician, caught in the ever tightening reichwehr espionage net, are marked to follow the two women spies who lost their heads yesterday on the gallows.

Now knowing definitely the fate awaiting them, the two men were spending their last hours before dawn in cells near those occupied by Benita von Falkenhayn and Renate von Natzer, who died in a dignified and without a show of emotion.

Their only inkling of what is to happen is to them from a death cell in grim old Plötzensee prison which was learned today.

The identity of the second man could not be learned. Their names were expected to be announced later.

Both went to their death with outward calm but they had their heads erect, their heads held high.

The execution of the two, charged with betraying Germany's military secrets, lasted six minutes, the informant said.

Frau von Falkenhayn was the first to die. "She walked first to the improvised stand for the day was waiting the coffin. Her hands were clasped on her back. She stood there and heard once more the verdict of death read aloud by the court."

Senate's Administration Leaders Gird For Struggle

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 — Senate administration leaders, concededly uneasy over apparently increasing opposition, tonight sought to rally their followers with word that the defeat of the McCarran bill would mean a \$4,800,000 relief bill.

Some backers of the organized labor asked for the amendment, contending that it would be closed.

They pointed to the addition to their strength today when Senator Wagner (D-N.Y.) urged adoption of the proposal which would call for payment of prevailing local wages to the men hired from the huge fund.

World Relief Purpose. In brief senate debate, administration spokesmen said the McCarran bill would mean a \$4,800,000 relief bill.

Wagner, ordinarily a White House follower, told the senate, however, that he was not going to be paid on a relief basis, "every objective of public works will be destroyed."

Senator Logan (D-Ky) took issue with Wagner's statement that payment of 800 a month to relief workers would mean "the wage policy of the new deal in reverse."

"Labor is going more to wreck the program than any other people," Logan asserted, "instead of saving they will accept the present conditions for the benefit of all, they are going to wreck the program all over the nation."

BIG BUDGET FOR DEFENSE LOOMS

War Department Bill Carries \$318,131,482 for Military Activities

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 (AP)—By far the largest budget for national defense since 1914, \$318,131,482 for military activity looms for the fiscal year 1936.

The navy supply bill is yet to be reported to the measure but members of the appropriations committee have estimated that the military service would exceed by approximately \$100,000,000 any defense fund since the Washington naval conference.

Every Branch Shares The measure dealt liberally with virtually every branch of the regular army, including the military guard and auxiliary units such as the "reserve officers corps."

It was to committee's answer to a warning from General Douglas MacArthur, chief of staff, that "the whole framework of the national defense is so tenuous that if you put your finger at any one spot it will break and is subject to marked criticism."

The committee wrote into the bill specific authorization for President Roosevelt to increase the fleet through a 10 percent increase in the number of the navy's aircraft from 118,750 to 150,000, and the national guard by 5000 men.

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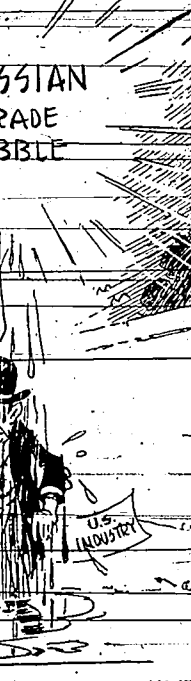
