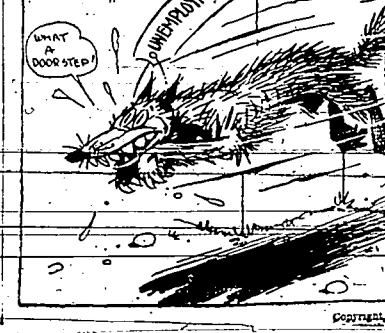

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### POTATO CONTROL BILL COMPLETED

#### North Carolina Congress Man to Introduce Measure

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Drafting of proposed potato control legislation was completed today and the bill will be introduced in the House by Representative Warren D. Wood.

The measure, which would make potato control permanent, provides a tax of 7 cents on each hundred pounds of potatoes sold in excess of sales allotments. The agricultural secretary would be empowered, however, to reduce the tax to as low as 50 cents.

Under the plan, state allotments would be made, based upon records of past yields and sales in potato growing states. Individual allotments would be based upon a percentage of annual sales for any two or three years from 1922 to 1934.

Five-year agreements to be based upon annual acreage for the three best years from 1927 to 1932, the average yield per acre for the three best years and the average yield per acre of the crop sold from 1929 to 1933.

#### Effective This Year

Producers cooperating would receive tax exempt certificates to the amount of their allotments. The measure would be applied to potatoes to be sold in closed and marked containers to facilitate enforcement of the tax provisions.

Special provision is made for the transfer of tax exempt stamps between individual producers and for the amount of stamps to be sold, making two per cent of the total sales allotments to adjust and inequalities.

Crop years would be defined as 1934-35, 1935-36, and 1936-37. Proposed legislation would become effective this year, 10 days after becoming law after 1937, a referendum would be required to make tax exempt certificates effective to establish parity prices for potatoes, the bill was drafted by the farm administration after several meetings with growers and members of congress here.

Mrs. Sewell went over and lay down beside him," Mrs. Emerson declared. "Mr. Sewell and I went to bed in an adjoining room in the house. He and I were talking to each other through the open door."

Mrs. Emerson said she passed through the room occupied by her husband and Mrs. Sewell before they were awake.

### INFLATION MOVE ON TRAIL OF DECISION

#### Congressional Factions Arrayed for Grim Struggle

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Discussions following in the wake of the supreme court's gold decision yesterday afternoon uncovered a grim struggle between opposing congressional factions which threatened to bring into open conflict.

"At least three issues to be settled in the near future indicated that the days would be filling pages of the Congressional Record," administration officials, meanwhile, were studying methods of strengthening the one spot which the court's verdict left in their monetary blueprint—court of claims suits by federal bond holders.

No action will be taken, President Roosevelt emphasized today, until the whole subject has been given thorough investigation by legal and monetary experts.

#### Two Bills Offered

Of more immediate promise in bringing the controversy to congressional floors were amendments concerning the matter recently offered by Senators Thomas (D-Okl.) and Wheeler (D-Mont) to the pending relief bill.

The amendments to instruct the treasury to purchase \$50,000,000 of silver monthly until the amount of silver held by the treasury of the gold reserves or the price of silver reached \$1.29 an ounce.

The amendments would be offered to issue currency against all its silver holdings.

Wheeler, planning to vote for the new proposal, said today he would submit an amendment to make the cost of the proposed \$4.5 billion proposal, which would be able to non-interest bearing treasury certificates which would be available as currency.

### Elevator Operators Shelve Strike Plans

NEW YORK, Feb. 20 (AP)—Their plans for a city-wide elevator operators' strike against union leaders today to organization of service employes in individual buildings, including the city's most famous skyscrapers.

The union is banking to make the closed shop 100 per cent effective throughout New York and to obtain higher wages in many structures.

Mayor La Guardia led negotiations which resulted yesterday in a six-month truce covering buildings managed in a previous arbitration agreement.

Strikers persisted at a number of other structures today, however. Union officials counted more than 50 such walkouts in mid-Manhattan and Harlem.

### YOUTH DESCRIBED AS BRUTAL KILLER

#### Slayer Gallant Defender of Womanhood, Counsel for Kennamer Asserts

FAWKNER, Okla., Feb. 20 (AP)—The state painted Phil Kennamer as a cold blooded killer and the defense as a gallant defender of womanhood during a day of arguments which brought to a close his trial for the murder of John Gorrell.

The 19-year-old defendant, son of Federal Judge Franklin E. Kennamer, sat stoically through the longest day of the trial, pale-faced and silent.

The case is expected to reach the jury tomorrow.

Kennamer heard the prosecution demand his incarceration, and pointed out that the instructions of Judge Thurman Hurst permit the assessment of the death penalty for his crime.

"You may order Phil Kennamer's death," the prosecution said, "and veteran Tom Wallace, assistant Tulsa county attorney."

#### State Not Asking Death

A moment later Wallace qualified his argument by asserting the state does not insist on a death verdict.

J. Berry King, former Oklahoma attorney general who delivered a caustic argument as a special prosecutor, likewise pointed out that the state does not necessarily want to see young Kennamer, the son of Federal Judge Franklin E. Kennamer, sent to the chair.

"It is just as well," the defendant's own attorneys said, "if the defendant is sent away from society, to be confined and prevented from doing any harm."

The defense plea of temporary insanity, along with self-defense, was made over the protests of the defendant. He insisted it was a pure case of self-defense and a mad desire to protect Miss Wilcox.

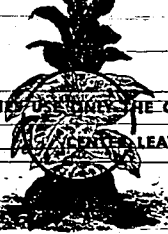

JOB INSURANCE TAX PROPOSAL CHANGED

Additional Alterations Loom As Committee Considers Social Security Bill

By CLARENCE W. WRIGHT (Associated Press Staff Writer)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—Sixth annual changes which some members said were to offset claims of unconstitutionality were written today by the house ways and means committee into the unemployment insurance section of the social security bill.

Still other changes were in sight. Those agreed upon today were accepted only after nearly two hours of discussion, although committee members said they carried at least partial amendment approval.

The major alteration placed in the bill flat stipulates that regardless of business conditions, the tax to supply funds for unemployment insurance should be one percent for the 1934 calendar year, rising to two percent in 1937 and 3 per cent in 1938.

Variable Levy

As first drafted by the cabinet committee, the bill would have made possible a maximum 3 per cent federal tax on total payroll, the money to be levied on a variable basis. It would have been 3 per cent, rising automatically to 2 per cent in the third year.

Witnesses before the committee had testified that such a variable levy might have harmful effects.

In its present form, the bill would let employers have a 90 per cent credit against their federal tax on any money they had paid to a state unemployment insurance fund. Manufacturers agreed that the credit showed the federal tax was designed primarily to force the establishment of state insurance systems.

In effect, the committee today approved the 90 per cent credit, although it deferred final action.

Apple Growers Ask Tariff On Bananas

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 20 (AP)—To provide a bigger market for Washington apples, a memorial to congress was laid before the Washington legislature today, demanding a two-cent a pound tariff on bananas shipped into the United States.

EMERGENCY RATE FOR NORTHWEST WHEAT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20 (AP)—An emergency freight rate reduction of 25 per cent became effective today to facilitate movement of surplus wheat in the Pacific northwest to the drought areas in four northeastern states for use as stock feed.

The rates are applicable only on carload shipments of cracked soft wheat which in sacks, or on whole soft wheat which in sacks, is packed in transit, moving from Idaho, Oregon and Washington, to officially designated drought counties in Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Wyoming.

New York, Feb. 20 (AP)—The New York Times in a special dispatch from Washington today said Roosevelt was ready for an adverse supreme court decision on the gold clause and prepared to deliver that might-outlining steps taken to protect the treasury and asking public support for the program.

War Preparations Continue In Italy

ROME, Feb. 20 (AP)—Italy's supreme defense council tonight promised the nation the wells of war supplies will not run dry as 4,000 Italian troops streamed across the Mediterranean to Africa in consequence of Italo-Ethiopian tension. Many more 4,000 soldiers are ready to embark at Naples and Sicilian ports.

The council, over which Benito Mussolini presided, considered its fifth session in recent days with this statement: "Italy can rest assured that the country has done its duty in preparing in time those indispensable measures so that an eventual warlike effort can be carried out in conditions which will assure victory."

Official Silence Cloaks Chaco War

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### PRESIDENT SIGNS SEED LOAN BILL

#### Executive Would Take Funds From \$4,890,000,000—Relief Measure

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The president today afforded the opportunity to sign the \$4,890,000,000 seed loan bill, but in signing the measure he asked that the funds be taken from the \$4,890,000,000 relief measure.

Mr. Roosevelt signed a seed loan bill last year and expressed the hope it would be the last. Congress, however, sent another "seed" bill this session, and there was speculation that the president might veto it. He said that expenditures outside the budget should be paid through new taxes.

In approving the bill, the chief executive made public his opinion on the budget. He suggested that since the funds were primarily for drought relief they "should therefore be drawn from the general appropriation for relief purposes." This, he added, would "not have the effect of increasing the budget estimate of expenditures."

The president's suggestion coincided with action last May when a fund of \$40,000,000 for seed and feed loans was included in the \$25,000,000 appropriation for relief in drought-stricken areas.

Under the new law, the farm credit administration, through local boards or committees which must pass on applications, will loan up to \$500 to any farmer who swears that he is unable to procure funds from other sources.

However, in counties certified by the administration, the AAA and the bureau of agricultural economics as "primary" or "emergency" drought areas—the designations dropped last summer—such a fund—no limit will be placed on the amount of loans. Interest will be charged at the rate of 5% per cent. Any applicant for a loan must swear that he is cooperating in production control programs of the AAA or is not proposing to increase his 1935 production of basic agricultural commodities in a manner detrimental to the success of such program.

### Mackey Ignored His Father's Protests; Now He Heads Coffee-Sugar Exchange

By DONALD JOSEPH  
NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—A man for whom his father, proscribed father has just taken office as president of the New York Coffee and Sugar Exchange.

Chandler A. Mackey's election has justified the course of action he decided on 20 years ago. His father, William D. Mackey, a charter member of the exchange, died, however, before he could witness his son's climb to greater heights than the elder Mackey occupied in the same field.

Left Father's Testimony  
The importance of the exchange, over whose policies Mackey is to exert his deciding influence for the next year, is implied by these facts: More sugar comes into New York than any other port in the world; coffee and sugar handled on the exchange exceed the transactions of any other like organization; the sugar traded since 1914, when the exchange began to trade in this commodity, has amounted to 125,000,000 tons, valued at about \$500,000,000. Its coffee trading amounts to nearly 2,000,000,000 pounds a year.

Starting in business with his father, Mackey left his tutelage, to his parents' severe disapproval, and went to work as a cotton buyer for another concern. In 1914, in return for himself, with greater parental apprehensions. Today his associates consider him an outstanding member of the trade.

Keeps Coffee Price Down

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### Prohibitionists Rally Forces For New Fight

By WILLIAM E. WHITE  
WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The prohibitionists are organizing another fight—an echo in an old and bitter campaign.

At their head stands a slight and lonely figure, Morley Sheppard, father of the 18th amendment, field marshal of a cause that won and lost—as determined now to make the country dry by law as he was when a green member of congress 30 years ago.

This slim, gray senator from Missouri and Texas, dean of both houses in point of continuous service, is marshaling his forces for an early hearing on his two resolutions proposing reacceptance of prohibition, dead and gone since December, 1933.

Nearly 30 dry organizations, including the Anti-Saloon league and the Women's Christian Temperance union, are consolidating their positions to offer the greatest show of strength possible in hearings on the measure.

For the first time in more than a year, the tread of organized prohibitionists resounds again in the corridors of the capitol. They feel the necessary period of trial and waiting has ended, and they are eager to strike again.

Sheppard concedes that the battle—if one is permitted by the leadership to take their stand before a bitter one, but he insists it will not be nearly so long as the first dry campaign and says, he has

no doubt as to the ultimate result. The country, he claims, will return to prohibition because of what he describes as the "reversion of the propaganda" of the anti-prohibitionists.

Several points will be used by the dry in seeking to convince the voters of this. Chief among them is the claim—already agreed upon as a central argument in consultations among the dry forces—that repeal has brought back the saloons in numbers greater than in the old days, although anti-prohibitionists almost unanimously opposed it back in the pre-repeal era.

Not "Co-Author"  
Like a solitary prophet hurling firebrands, Sheppard is selling every opportunity these days to denounce what he calls the evils of liquor and foray to bring the whole issue before the country again.

The question is the one major issue that for three decades has occupied the Texas. His father, who also served in congress, was a prohibitionist, and when the son first came here in 1902 he set out almost immediately to try to make the country dry. He was one of the first men to advocate nationwide prohibition in a political campaign.

Incidentally, she was the author, and not the co-author, of the 18th amendment.

"There wasn't any co-author," he says. "That gentleman is a fictional figure—a forgotten man—who never really existed."

Legislation, Not Conventions  
One fact developing as the drys prepare to take their stand before congress again, is that strategy, as worked out quietly by Sheppard and prohibition leaders, is not going

to be materially different from what it was before. Sheppard wants the question, when and if it is submitted again, to go to legislators rather than popular conventions.

The latter, the principal agency under which prohibition was repealed, aren't necessarily representative, he claims.

The senator, a small, quiet man in colorful dress, never forgets. Religiously he has arisen upon the senate floor on each anniversary of the 18th amendment to extol it and blast away at his critics.

Ignores Political Effects  
He claims if he fears the possible political consequences of his effort to bring back the old days—his own state went heavily for repeal and he must stand for re-election next year—and he replies solemnly, "In all my life, I never consid-

ered the popularity or lack of popularity of this issue."

### MOVIES INTERPRET BOOKS IN NAZI SCHOOL SCHEMES

BERLIN (AP)—A five-year plan for reform of German schools, aiming at supplementing book learning by educational films, has been put in operation by Bernhard Rust, Nazi minister of education.

The scheme is being put over full blast. Some 2,000 schools already have been equipped with reproduction apparatus and Rust intends to have all 50,000 schools throughout Germany equipped in the same way by 1940.

Already 10 educational films have been shot and 2,500 copies made. Eighty more such reels are planned for production this year.

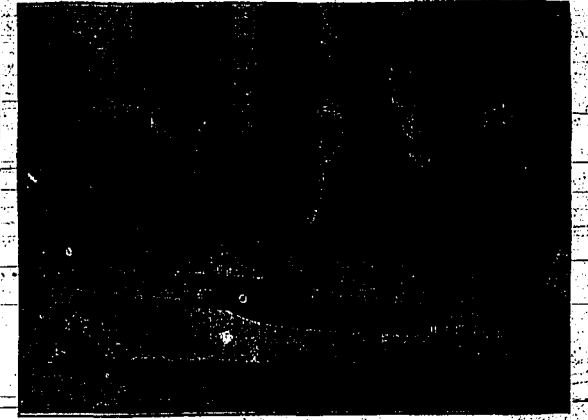

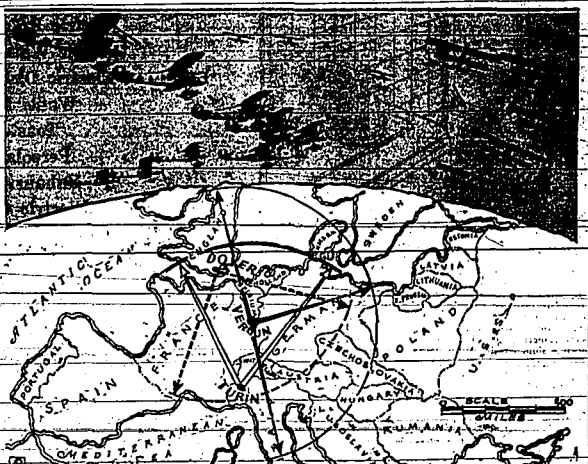

### NEW APPROPRIATION BILLS GIVEN HOUSE

Weslton's 45th Day Brings Introduced Measures. Total to 437

BOISE, Feb. 20 (AP)—Four hundred thirty-seven bills had been introduced in the 23rd session of the Idaho legislature when the end of the 45th day came tonight. Fifteen legislative days remain.

Twenty-five more bills were introduced this afternoon in the Idaho house, bringing the total in that branch to 244.

None was presented today in the senate which already has received 181. The period of their introduction in that branch has virtually passed, with appropriation bills alone being accepted under the rules. Most of these are sent to the legislature through house committees, differing rules applying in that law-making branch.

#### Gasoline Tax Fund

Most of today's measures covered biennial appropriations for various departments of government and institutions.

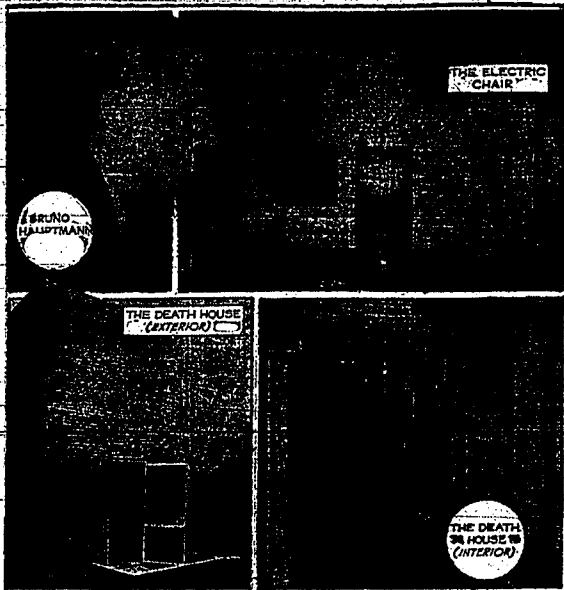
Those presented were: One to set aside 10 per cent of the gasoline tax in a state highway, bridge and ferry fund; others providing for the creation of county hospital boards to supervise county or city hospitals;

Requiring minimum capitalization of \$40,000 in towns of less than 6,000 population; changing the date for the beginning of the fiscal year of school districts to July 1; amending Idaho banking laws to permit securing of bank deposits as provided for by the federal deposit insurance; administrative, biennial, appropriation for state printing and annual appropriation to the bureau of animal industry for contagious eradication; biennial appropriation for the state sheep commission; appropriating \$2,000 to pay charges or assessments on state lands under contract which have been forfeited; biennial appropriation for the state industrial accident board; biennial appropriation for the administration of the department of public works and the bureau of highways; allocating \$2,500 for payment of charges or assessments on state lands acquired by sheriff's deed; biennial appropriation to the bureau of animal industry for tuberculosis eradication; biennial appropriation for the bureau of public accounts.

Appropriating \$2,000 for biennial maintenance of the "Redeemer" to this state of their residence.

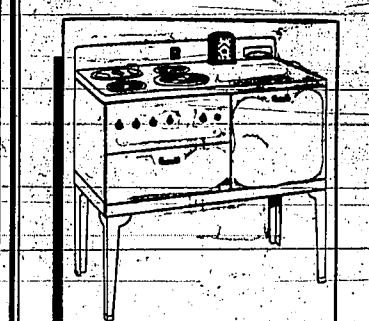

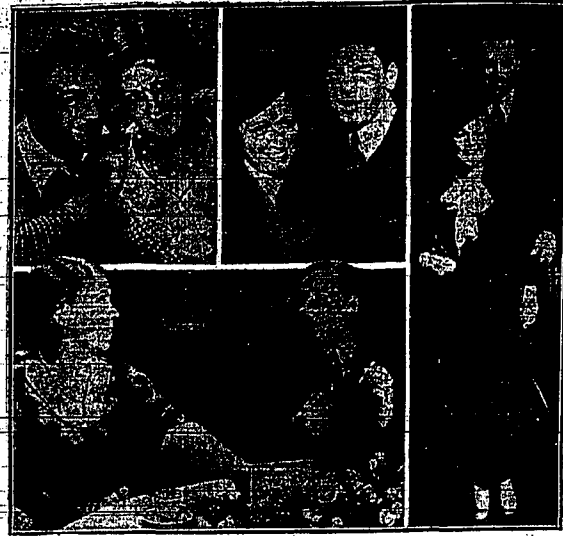

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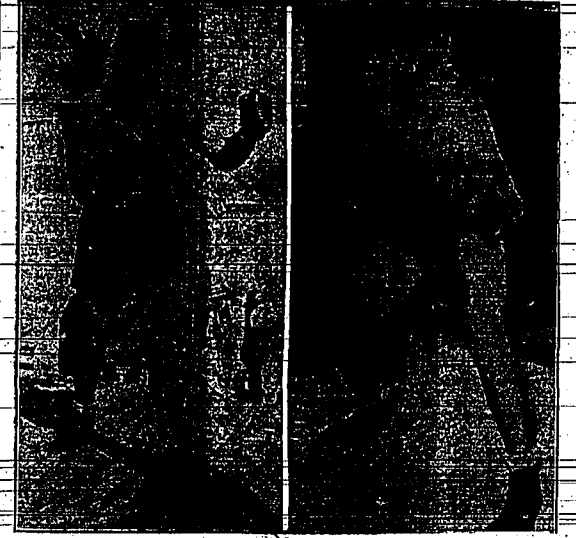

Woods is manager of Idaho Egg producers; Hale is county agent and secretary of Twin Falls County Livestock Marketing association, and Twin Falls manager of the Jerome Cooperative creamery. Represented in the new organization are Twin Falls County Egg Producers, Southern Idaho Beet Growers' association, Twin Falls Beet Growers' association, Twin Falls County Livestock Marketing association, Southern Idaho Producers' association, Twin Falls Cooperative Oil association, Federal Farm Loan association, wheat, sugar and corn-belt production control association and Twin Falls County Grazing association.
