



He often told her that she "would be satounded at the rapidity with which new inventions would come along," and she has naturally found great interest in watching

them come.

The prophecies in which the public is most interested today, however, are the social and economic inventions forecast in "Looking Backward" and "Equality." Wom-an suffrage, shorter working hours, opera-tion of idle factories by the unemployed in "production for use only," social security provisions of many kinds, have come or are

Bellamy, his wife explains, was not a rev olutionist but an evolutionist.

"He loved the United States with all

his heart, and he firmly believed that-his plan of economic equality was in thorough keeping with the principles outlined in the Declaration of Independence and the Preamble of the Constitution. Above all, he believed in American

democracy."
Today we would probably call him
Socialist. He bore no resemblance, though to the violent brands of that faith we see in some parts of the world. He merely told what he thought would work out under our system, in an orderly way, as the natural and penceful result of forces already operating in his lifetime. In another decade or two it may be possible to say he was as success ful in his social and economic prophecy as in his scientific prophecy. He expected his dream to be realized by 1950.

A WAY OUT
The bill introduced in the lower house of the Idaho Legislature by Dan J. 




