The commerce secretary disclosed plans now being worked out whereby citizens would participate in the civil arm of the government. The reserve corps brings them into the military arm.

Several Objectives "I make this proposal," said Roper, "with two objects in mind. First, we should provide an intellectual reservoir for the government-use-in-emergency."

CLOUDS OF DUST LEAVE ONE VICTIM

KANSAN, Caught in Storm, Dies of Hemorrhage of Lungs

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 22 (AP)—A blinding dust storm which swept southward across Nebraska, Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado and into the Texas panhandle left one man dead and extensive damage to crops.

Herman Enrichs, 59, died near Wakeeney, Kansas, of a hemorrhage of the lungs. His motor car stalled in the swirling storm yesterday and he attempted to walk home, but he slipped and struck his head on the car.

The full extent of the crop damage, chiefly affecting the wheat and corn, will not be known for several days.

Cloud Settles in Texas Rolling before a 56-mile wind, the storm moved out of the north yesterday and settled today in Texas.

In its path the sun was obscured and the day turned into semi-darkness. Traffic was halted and communication lines were broken down in many communities. Street lights were turned on.

PARAGUAYANS PLOT WITHDRAWAL FROM LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Press, Public and Political Circles Aroused by Move at Geneva as Armies Advance Toward Bolivia

(By The Associated Press) BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 22.—Here victorious armies knocking at Bolivia's very doors, Paraguay tonight apparently made ready to follow Japan and Germany out of the League of Nations.

With the time limit for Asuncion's acceptance of the league's Chaco peace plan scheduled to expire tomorrow, Paraguay's demand for withdrawal from Geneva was insisted, and Buenos Aires diplomats saw little likelihood that President Encabado Ayala could resist.

The Paraguayan press, public and political circles were especially aroused by the league's action in lifting its arms embargo against Bolivia, which has accepted the plan without reservation, while maintaining its attitude against Paraguay, which thus far has returned answers tantamount to rejection.

Advance Unchecked Because General Jose Belandier, Paraguayan veteran, swept unchecked through the disputed Chaco area to the outer defenses of the Bolivian army base at Villa Fontes, observers here were confident the Geneva peace conference would be a failure.

WILEY POST LANDS PLANE IN DESERT

Sub-Stratosphere Dash Ends When Leaky Oil Line Forces Flier Down

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 22 (AP)—A leaky oil line thwarted Wiley Post, one-eyed globe traveler, today in his attempt to dash through the sub-stratosphere from Los Angeles to New York in less than eight hours but he got a taste of sky-high speed that made him eager and confident for his next attempt soon.

Taking off from Burbank at 6:07 A. M. P. S. T. Post climbed nearly five miles and leveled off. An oil line sprung a leak and he came down without landing gear on the desert.

"I hope to get going again very soon possibly in a few days. I'll make it next time, too," he said.

Panama Seeking Gold, Will Return Treasury's Check

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—Maintaining the recent supreme court gold decision strengthened its position that gold obligations under the 1904 treaty cannot be paid-off in devalued dollars, the Government of Panama last week sent a note to accept a treasury check for \$250,000 if it is tendered for the 1935 rental on the Panama Canal Zone.

It was learned on good authority that the Panama government intends to return the check to the treasury as it did last year, and ask for gold coin instead as specified under the 31-year-old treaty.

Panama contends this treaty cannot be altered or modified by any action or group pressure.

JAPANESE RELEASE 'S. BOAT' AFTER SPY SCARE INQUIRY

Army and Navy Officials Suspicious When Tanker Goes Aground in View of Defenses of Tokyo Bay

(By The Associated Press) TOKYO, Feb. 23 (Saturday)—Army officers after an investigation today cleared the American tanker Elizabeth Kellough of suspicion of espionage, the newspaper Asahi said in a dispatch from its Yokosuka correspondent.

Officers from headquarters of the fortress commanding the bay gave an American a clean bill after the inquiry.

The vessel, under charter to a Japanese firm, will be free to proceed to Osaka as soon as it is retowed, probably in a few days.

Suspicion of arms and naval officials were aroused when the ship became grounded yesterday in the military zone at the entrance to Tokyo bay on a spot which contained a splendid view of the defenses.

Naval authorities ordered the vessel to be towed to a safe anchorage. Inspectors checked the possibility the ship's commander engaged an espionage.

Although chartered by the Japanese Mitsui company, the ship was owned by the New York and Philadelphia Steamship Corporation of New York, carries an American crew.

It was an outfit from Yokohama to Kobe, had loaded with oil when it grounded near the mouth of the bay.

For Thee I Pine

What's good enough for a king ought to be good enough for you. I happen to be talking about pineapples, and not the variety thrown in Chicago, either. It was the excellent taste of Charles the Second that probably did the trick in popularizing the fruit among residents of the world, who did not happen to be planted on tropical islands.

Charles served pineapples from Barbados at his parties. My authority is John Evelyn, who kept a mighty fine diary in his day. And shortly thereafter pineapples appeared as a motif for the decoration of bedposts. Maybe Charles was responsible for this too. I wouldn't put it past him. Anyhow, he thought they were a good fruit, and right he was.

Fresh pineapple has just about had its season hereabout, but you can buy their delicious juice—or the whole fruit, in slices the year round, and very good it is if you watch your brands.

Here's how a healthy sweet can be concocted without too much damage to the stomach:—to which cake are so unkind. Allow one large navel orange to each sugar. Peel them with a sharp knife, slice thin, pile with fruit sugar between layers in a glass dish, put plenty of pineapple and syrup over the oranges and sprinkle the top with almonds finely chopped.

Stuffed pork tenderloin can get in to the "party class" by serving it with pineapple. Roast the meat slowly and turn on the upper heat of the oven before you take the meat out, so that the surface may become nicely browned. Fry slices of pineapple in light golden brown in hot butter. 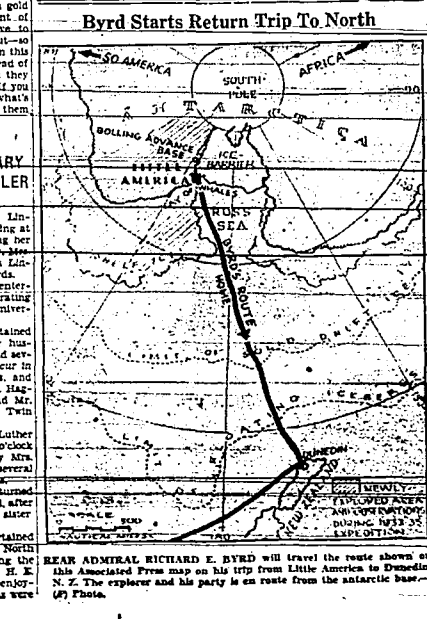

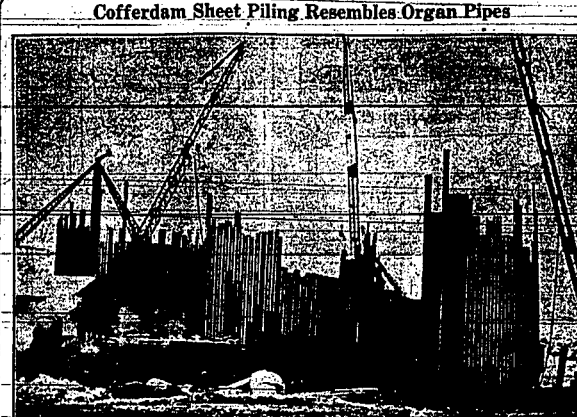

IDAHO LAWMAKERS IN SHORT SESSION

Holiday Brings Recess at Noon; Sifting Committees on Horizon

Bozart Feb. 22 (P)—Despite the latest calendar of the twenty-third session, the Idaho legislature will work shortly before noon today by adjourning in reverence to the memory of George Washington, whose birthday is no legal holiday for the state's lawmakers.

Such committees are appointed by the legislature and are clothed with broad powers to determine which bills shall survive and which are to be defeated.

Revenue Bills Untouched Revenue raising measures and appropriation bills still have been untouched.

Both branches will convene tomorrow at 10 a. m.

The senate quizzed for nearly an hour this morning over a bill to create a state board of pharmacy and then sent it to the committee of the whole for amendment.

A less prolonged row developed among the senators when the "hour" time working day bill introduced by Senator Ryan (D-Shoshone) came up.
