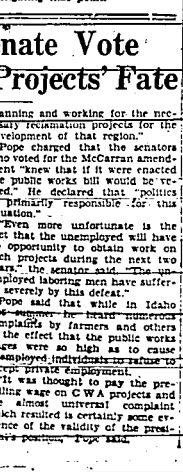

#### Air-Trail-Blazer-Expects To Cross Continent In Seven Hours

### IDAHO LAND-PLACED UNDER GRAZING ACT

#### Stockmen, Sheepmen-Vote Association With Administration

BOISE, Feb. 23 (AP)—A state-wide committee of cattlemen and sheepmen voted this afternoon to join the U. S. Grazing Administration, which is now being set up by the Taylor administration.

The state will be divided into three districts—west, east and central—for administrative purposes. The decision was reached at a meeting of approximately 30 cattlemen and sheepmen appointed at a public meeting here December 17 to investigate the grazing act and recommend the course Idaho livestock interests should pursue in becoming associated with the administration, or remaining out.

Archie D. Ryan of Salt Lake City, president at today's meeting, has an interior department representative from the office in Salt Lake City.

At the meeting it was reported that more than 350 sheepmen and an equal number of cattlemen are involved in Idaho by the committee. Action today was taken after voting to divide the state into three districts—the committee selected representatives from each of the three to appear in behalf of stockmen of their section.

The district representatives will recommend to the larger committee the provisions they feel should be applied in their sections of the state.

The district representatives are: West—Worth B. Lee of Mountain Home; sheepmen, and R. F. Blackman of Boise; cattlemen, and T. C. Bacon, Twin Falls, sheep, and A. O. Pierce of Malma, cattlemen; and R. C. Rich of Soda Springs, sheep.

The Taylor grazing law was passed to provide for conservation of the nation's grazing lands and to avert depletion of the public domain.

# Bearded Generals Balbo and De Bono Spearheads of Italy's Colonial Policy

By A. EDWIN STUNTZ

ROME, Feb. 23 (AP)—A black-bearded marshal in north Africa, a white-bearded general, a Somali administrator, a formula for Italy's rising colonial sun.

The two beards respectively adorn the faces of vivid Italo Balbo, governor-general of Libya, and garbled little General Emilio Duce, the political potentate in the new joint colonies of Eritrea and Italian Somaliland.

In one Roman day these two commanders might easily have been called consuls. Their modern powers and responsibilities are faculty comparable to the colonial missions which Julius Caesar and a succession of Roman emperors entrusted to their dominant fighting men.

Balbo's Shadow Miroslav Balbo went to Libya shortly after his historic mass airplane flight to Chicago. Young and impulsive, he is only 39 years old. He was drafted into the Duce's staff and sent to Tripoli to gain military and administrative experience and, as a radio showman, to keep the Italian shadow from darkening the Piazza Venezia, said palace being the hilt of Mussolini's government.

Wherever the military reasons for Balbo's assignment to Libya, he still occupies one of the key positions in Duce's staff, the chief of staff of Italy's colonial empire.

Balbo has shown an ability to win the respect and confidence of his chiefs in the big combination of mountains and desert given into his care. He has encouraged the growth of roads, hotels, and airlines.

But above all, he has systematically worked to keep the Italian flag in the air, especially the air units, to be of immediate efficient service to the nation in case of necessity.

A government ban against printing news of troop movements in newspapers was lifted today, and the press was able to publish something besides the foretold reactions to the warlike preparations.

Thousands of volunteers continue to flock to Fascist headquarters in each province willing to volunteer for service in Africa, where Ethiopian and native Italians have clashed frequently in recent months with each charging the other as responsible.

### DIVISION OF SUGAR ACREAGE DISCUSSED

#### Growers' Representatives In Conference With AAA Officials

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—Methods to be employed by the farm administration in allocating sugar acreage to individual farmers for the 1935 growing season were discussed today at a meeting of representatives of leading growers' associations and officials of the A. A. A.

The A. A. A. has set the total 1935 sugar acreage at 275,000 acres, the estimated production of which will be about 1,500,000 short tons, the domestic beet sugar quota determined by the Jones-Costigan sugar control act passed by the last congress.

Since the 1935 acreage allotment is about 10 per cent under that of 1934, the peak production year, farmers will be required to make reductions of 10 per cent from the 1934 acreage.

The meeting today was closed by Charles M. Kearney, president of the National Beet Growers' association, said the matter of allocation of the allotment into individual acreages was discussed and that further meetings will be held next week.

**Suggestions Invited**

He explained that crop rotations and other methods of soil improvement are necessary to determine a procedure for re-allotment of the difference. The method of procedure has not been definitely worked out but Kearney said such suggestions as "rotations" could be kept in the same factory district.

John E. Dalton, chief of the sugar section of the A. A. A., invited the representatives to submit suggestions on procedure for acreage allotments and an effort will be made to incorporate them in the farm administration program.

Kearney said the negotiations between the growers and the Great Western Sugar company on the 1935 contract were at a "standstill" and would not be taken up again until the growers' representatives who are now in Washington returned to the west.

#### Oklahoma Youth Sentenced To Serve 25 Years For Murder

PAWNEE, Okla., Feb. 23 (AP)—Twenty five years in state penitentiary is the penalty 15 year old Phil Kennamer must pay for the slaying of John E. Gorell, 16, 23, in Tulsa last Thanksgiving night.

The well-known, dark-skinned son of Federal Judge Franklin E. Kennamer stood up in district court room here today and accepted the long term, levied by Judge Thurman Hunt, without a change of expression. The state had asked 99 years.

The defense immediately announced intention of appeal. The state asked for 99 years.

Bond for the youth, convicted of manslaughter last Thursday night by a jury of filling station operators and farmers, was set at \$25,000.

Young Kennamer said Gorell—also of a socially prominent Tulsa family—was shot with the "widow's own pistol in a struggle started when Phil sought to thwart an alleged extortion plot directed at the oil-well-ranching family by the late, late, late Virginia Whook.

Over his objections, defense attorneys pleaded temporary insanity along with self defense.

### Betty Gow Bitter In Comment On Ordeal

LONDON, Feb. 23 (AP)—After one withering blast at Attorney Edward J. Betty, Betty Gow went into hiding tonight.

A diligent search of London hotels failed to locate the pretty Scot girl who, as baby Charles A. Lindbergh's nurse, was one of the star witnesses in the Hauptmann murder trial at Flemington, N. J.

Gow was believed to be with her mother.

The Lindbergh baby nurse broke her customary alibi to take bitter exception to the way the "trial and unjust" attacks upon her by Hauptmann's defense lawyers.

"I just said, 'went too far. To justify that I knew more about the tragedy than I made known to the courts was most unjust. I am sure he would not have been allowed to do that in Britain. He should not be allowed to do it in America.'"

Experts said she became engaged to be married while in the United States or that she intends to go on the stage as "an untried" Miss Gow said.

"We want to forget that terrible thing," Betty's mother commented. "I probably will send Betty away for a short holiday before deciding what she will do."

### TIDE OF BILLS RISES IN IDAHO LEGISLATURE

BOISE, Feb. 23 (AP)—A total of 47 bills had been introduced into the Idaho legislature when the forty-ninth day came to a close tonight in the chamber of the legislature. There were in the senate and 293 in the house.

Some 150 bills remain still have not been passed upon by both branches.

Governor Ross has signed more than a score. Among those is the emergency appropriation measure; the Lava Hot Springs Foundation measure; the mortgage moratorium bill; and the measure to increase the term of office of county commissioners from two to four years; one clarifying the nonpartisan election law; one to define homicide committed in perpetration or attempted perpetration; one to increase the fine for a misdemeanor, punishable by death in Idaho; and one to permit cooperative credit and savings associations to set up in business in Idaho.

Bills presented in the house today by committee include one to provide that candidates for the office of county superintendent must hold at least a bachelor's degree with two years of training in a normal school; others would fix the method of determining tuition of non-resident pupils; permit school districts to issue bonds with 40-year maturity dates; would permit county commissioners to levy a tax, not to exceed one-fourth of a mill, for subsidizing Boy Scout activities. Another one would authorize school districts to make an annual levy of not more than one mill to create a building fund.

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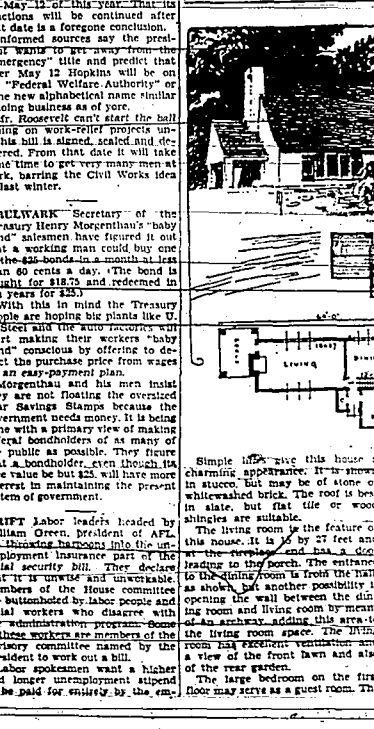

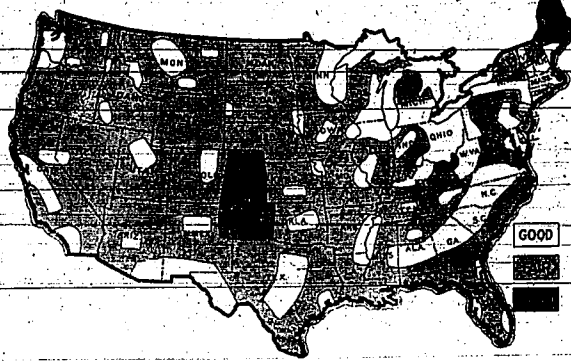

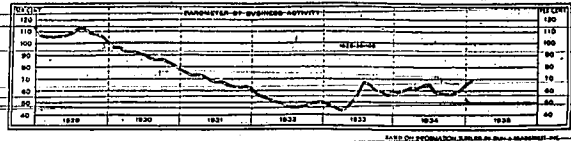

U. S. Chamber of Commerce February Business Map



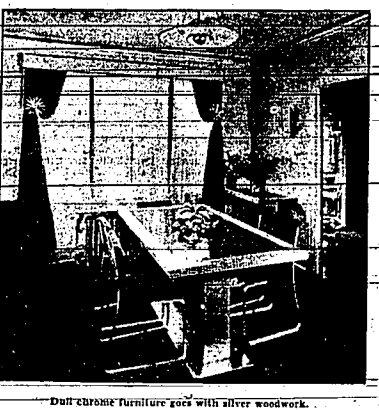
This map represents business conditions in every state of the Union as shown in March, 1935, issue of "Nation's Business," official publication of the United States Chamber of Commerce.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—Repeat or modification of the long and short haul will be "injurious" to the western transcontinental railroads, and be "financially disastrous" to the intermountain country, in the judgment of Judge William E. Lee, a member of the interstate commerce commission.

The commissioner has made a study of the opinions in a letter to Senator James P. Pope of Idaho. In his letter, which Senator Pope made public, he gives three reasons why he believes the long and short haul law should not be changed.

A house bill which was approved by the representative, 28-17, to permit the issuance of driver's licenses to persons who have completed the course in the division of letters and science and grant bachelor's degrees.

For legislative purposes... The measure was passed by a 20-17 vote. approved a measure by Senator Stratton (D-Louis) to create a state legislative bureau which would operate the year round and assemble information and draft bills. Lawmakers asked to be drafted before or during the legislative session.

Senator Stratton argued that it would permit lawmakers to reduce the length of sessions from 60 to 30 days, save the state thereby approximately \$40,000 annually, and materially assist legislators in securing necessary legislation. Further, it already have such bureaus, the speaker said.

The omnibus fish and game senate bill was passed, 29 to 9. It amends the present law in several details. It permits the killing of bear and muskrat.

A senate banking bill which would amend the conditions which branch banks are liable from the payment of checks was approved, 43-2.

Representative Powers (D-Twin Falls) declared that during the first six months of 1934 the automobile accident death toll in Idaho increased 77 per cent whereas during the same period in other states which had a driver's license law the death toll declined.

Representative Gossett (D-Oakton) held passage of the measure essential "now that we have approximately 100,000 licensed drivers in this state."

Amends Motorists... Besides the university and driver's license bill, which amends house bill 2, the senate passed a measure designed to amend the method of handling payments of delinquent taxes easier, and eliminate the necessity of installing new sets of records in county treasurer's offices.

Other bills acted on by the house were: One by James H. Hester, providing for the construction of a highway district shall not extend for more than 40 years; another senate highway committee bill was passed, 29-17, providing that it shall be unlawful for any person to apply for and obtain registration or motor vehicles from any person other than the assessor of the county in which the owner resides, except when certain information as to residence of the owner is given.

The house after that went into a committee of the whole to amend several measures.

Endorse Townsend Bill... The senate acted on several minor measures late in the day. It approved a memorial to congress asking for enactment of the Townsend old age pension plan into law.

Among the measures passed were a senate bill providing that subdivisions of the budget estimates can be made only with the approval of the directors of the state budget, 36-7; a senate bill making the state banking law conform to the law for national banks on the amount of capital required for

branch banks, 32-5; a senate bill providing that second-class county commissioners shall meet monthly instead of quarterly, 37-1; and a senate bill authorizing directors of municipal and quasi-municipal corporations to fix the rate of interest on regulated warrants at not more than 8 per cent.

The senate defeated a senate joint resolution, 18-23, which proposed to amend the constitution of the University of Idaho, now taxed, which have severed their tribal relations and adopted the habits of civilization the right to vote as jurors and hold civil offices.

The senate defeated a house bill, 36-7, requiring only one publication of notice to increase levies over 10 mills for general purposes.

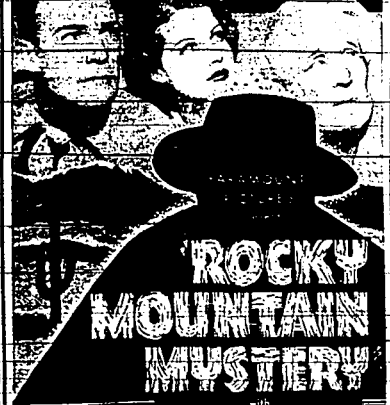

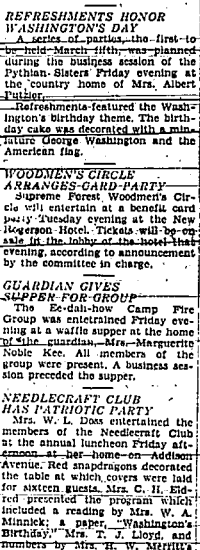

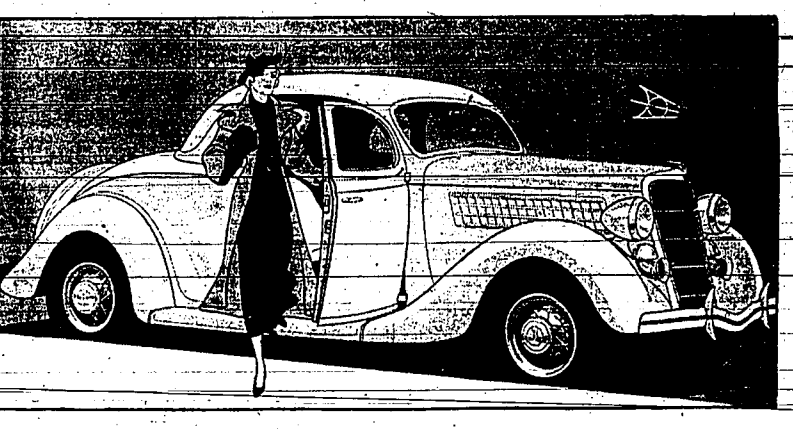

### IDAHO'S PRODUCTS BOUGHT FOR NEEDY

#### IERRA District Official Tells First Week's Operations Under New Set-Up

IERRA went into the market to purchase Idaho products under a program lately announced by Governor C. Ben Ross, and bought last week for distribution among 18,000 persons on relief rolls in the 11-county north central Idaho district. Flour, 20,000 sacks of 48 pounds each. Beans, 1000 bags of 100 pounds each. Potatoes, 3 1/2 carloads of 300 100-pound sacks each. Salt pork, 1 1/2 tons. Dried apples, 2 tons. Dried prunes, 7000 pounds. The figures were given out here yesterday by E. W. Hampton, IERRA district commodities distributor.

On Ration Basis

Distribution of Idaho products, which supplements distribution through another relief agency of rice, corned and cross-bred, and other "plus" commodities, is made on a ration basis similar to that employed by the army. On this basis each person on the relief rolls is to receive daily: Potatoes, 1/2 pound. Beans, 1/2 pound. Apples, 1/2 pound. Prunes, .015 pound. Salt pork, 1/4 pound to each 5 pounds of beans.

Distribution of these commodities is made in Twin Falls every other day. In Twin Falls county, according to IERRA records, there are 6480 persons on relief rolls.

Purchase of Idaho products under the governor's plan being in Twin Falls headquarters for the 11-county district. The commodities distributor said.

Potatoes of the No. 2 grade were purchased during the week for 25 cents per 100 pounds at the cellars of growers or dealers, the relief organization furnishing sacks and transportation.

No. 2 grade of beans also was purchased at the prevailing market price.

### WEED WAR RENEWED BY BOARD'S ORDER

#### County Commissioners List Noxious Plants, Call For Combat

A declaration of war against noxious weeds in Twin Falls county was renewed by county commissioners in session here yesterday with a proclamation calling upon landowners and tenants in infested property to take steps toward destruction of noxious weeds by means of "flooding, applying acids or other substances to kill plant life of growing" and "under no circumstances to allow these weeds to go to seed."

The proclamation called for a five-month campaign from June 1 to November 1, and listed as weeds to be fought:

Canadian thistle, white top, wild morning glory or blind weed, quack grass, Russian knap weed, puncture vine, perennial sow thistle, perennial night shade, horse radish.

The proclamation made reference to the state law's requirements for compliance with the commissioners' order in the weed war.
