Most strikes occasion little surprise, ocrring as they do from time to time in many lines of industry. But when teachers in the public schools walk out that is news of an nusual fype. It isn't often that such workers take this drastic step.

For the third time in a year instructors at

Scranton, Pennsylvania, recently voiced their ands for payment of back salaries by re fusing to teach in the hope of obtaining what is rightfully coming to them. Their action is illar to that once taken by Chicago teach ers whose salaries were far in arrears and who even went so far as to demonstrate publicly their dissatisfaction by parading through the streets carrying banners of pro-

Whether the Scranton pedagogues will calize anything of definite value from their decision is problematical. Non-payment of taxes is blamed by the school board for fail-ure to meet wage obligations. Naturally if insufficient funds are available for this purse the situation cannot be rectified until ctions improve.

The Scranton teachers are evidently additional suffers from current economic con-ditions and elimination of the difficulty wil come only through general business recovery. Anyhow the students affected by the strike are doubtless enjoying their vacation whether the same can be said about the teachers

MORE WORK AND MORE INCOME

-An-important-principle-involved-in-both public-and-private-wage schedules has been brought to attention by the argument whe-"prevailing" wave rates should be maintained-in-public-relief-work.

It is a question, as Walter Lippmann sug-

gests, whether workmen would rather earn a small income doing a little work at a high rate than a larger income by working more hours at a lower rate.

In some branches of private employment, especially in building, skilled workmen are kept idle and recovery is held back by the effort to maintain prosperity wages in a time of adversity incomes.

No sensible person wants to beat wages

down. But facts have to be recognized.

Workers are coming to recognize more clearly that the income per month or year is more important than the wage rate per hour or day. Wide enough acceptance of this prinwould rapidly increase work; improve business, and thereby lead to higher wages

The same principle applies to the business and of influstry. There are too many employers who apparently would rather sell a few goods at high prices than sell a large volume of goods at lower prices, though the latter process is the way to prosperity for them and everybody else. Prices, like wages, can be d when business becomes a
