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### NEW BILL AIMED AT BIRTH CONTROL

#### Idaho Legislature Now Has Exactly 500 Measures Proposed

BOISE, Feb. 26 (AP)—Among 10 house bills tossed into the Idaho legislative mill today was one which a lawmaker who declined to be quoted, described as a measure, "designed to strike a blow at birth control."

Today's bills brought the number introduced in the house and senate during the first 51 days of the 90-day session to exactly 500.

The bill assertedly involving birth control was presented by the medical and surgery committee and would regulate the sale, distribution and advertising of prophylactics and contraceptives.

It would prohibit the sale or distribution of prophylactics or contraceptives by means of any machine, vending machine or mechanical device or by peddling, canvassing, or soliciting from house to house.

It further provided that the possession of machines used in vending contraceptives shall be unlawful, and it would prohibit the advertising of such goods.

#### Law Deadline Faxed

The time for introduction of any but appropriation measures, except by unanimous consent, passed in the senate at the end of the 42nd day. Only 24 hours remain for introduction of committee-sponsored bills in the house. The deadline was fixed yesterday by the hour machine.

Other bills introduced in the house today were: One to provide that bonds for which the credit of the United States government is pledged, may be accepted by county auditors exclusively for real estate.

Another bill would amend the law classifying automobiles and trucks for the purpose of further fixing license fees; one defining provisions under which alien's licenses may be revoked in Idaho; one appropriating \$100 to pay general claims against the state insurance fund; one appropriating \$400 for the relief of John Bigley; and one amending the law imposing in the state penitentiary, one providing that casual employees of a company or firm engaged in Idaho must have at least \$25,000 in surplus assets; one providing that the department of public works shall have the power to fix regulations governing aircraft—in Idaho; one amending the Lewiston city charter so as to provide that any election voting at the general election shall not be again required to register for a general or special election; and one revising state-owned liquor bill.

The criticism of the highway department came after introduction of senate bill by Burtenshaw (D-Ada) and Brockman (D-Idaho). It was described by lawmakers as one to "take all the teeth out of the contractors' license laws passed in 1933. It finally was defeated, 18-23.

The authors charged the highway bureau with discrimination against smaller contractors in an attempt to give all the work to a few favored larger companies. Administration men sprang to the defense of the highway bureau. In the midst of the discussion Senator Wilson (D-Idaho) charged: "There has been a highway bureau lobbyist hanging around behind the curtains for days."

#### Makes "Crab" Issue

Another senate bill came up immediately to give permission to the commissioner of public works to drop certain roads from the state highway system.

After considerable debate, Senator Wilson called for a call of the senate and mailing senators were brought in so that he in his words, "could see how many wanted to vote in favor of a crab". This bill was defeated, 11-23.

The senate parliamentary tangle developed during consideration of a power resolution to define "indefiniteness" and "vagueness" as used in present statutes dealing with purchase of municipal power plants.

It was a companion measure to one defeated yesterday. Senator Newport (D-Canyon) rose and said the measure would undoubtedly cover the ground gone over yesterday's debate and successfully moved the previous question.

Senator Wilson gazed around; saw several empty seats, and asked a second time, for a call of the senate. Two members had been excused. He then attempted to gain unanimous consent for the bill to remain on the calendar. The chair ruled him out of order because of the motion for the previous question, which calls for an immediate ballot. Wilson brought that motion to adjourn, and saved the day for himself.

#### Grist in House

The house passed three house measures and a senate bill. They were a house bill to set up the Torrens system of registering titles to real property, 36-17; a house bill appropriating \$100,000 to the commissioner of public welfare to be used in cooperating with counties during the biennium in the hospitalization of relief patients, 30-27; a house bill permitting custodians of state funds to deposit them in their local banks and remit them at given periods to the state treasurer, 47-3; and a senate

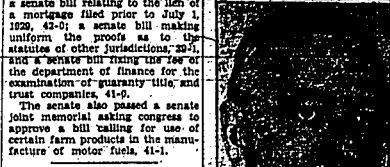
A bill further to regulate death benefit associations was called. Bills defeated were: A house bill providing for depositing cash of United States government bonds for

security bonds in criminal cases, 6-37; a house bill giving city councils the power to designate city clerks as ex officio treasurers, and eliminate the latter office, 0-49; a senate bill requiring the letting of highway contracts in smaller units than at present, 18-23, and a senate bill prescribing the power of the commissioner of public works to designate the state highway system, 11-23.

#### Passed by Senate

Twelve bills were passed by the senate. They were: A house bill to license barbers and nurses, 42-0; a house bill permitting the state board of education to set certain standards for the University of Idaho Southern Branch, 41-0; a senate bill fixing attorneys' fees in foreclosure cases at the amount agreed on in advance between attorney and client, 40-2; a house bill extending to five years the period when amortization of bond issues must begin, 43-0; a house bill defining the amount of deposits permitted in the urban banks of Idaho banking system, 43-0; a house bill defining what shall constitute a newspaper, 36-8; a house bill defining veterans under the veterans welfare act, 42-0; a senate bill providing for transfer of cases from justice and probate courts to the district court, 41-3.

### DEATH CLOSES CAREER OF WORLD WAR FIGURE

HOUSTON, Texas, Feb. 26 (AP)—Death today ended the career of Dr. Stockton Axson, brother-in-law of the late President Woodrow Wilson and probably one of the closest intimates of the war time chief executive.

Dr. Axson, professor of English at Rice Institute since he was relieved of Red Cross work soon after the World War, died in a hospital from a stroke he suffered yesterday. He was 67 years old.

The noted educator came to Rice Institute as a Shakespearean authority in 1914 and remained until 1917, when he took the stump for Liberty Bond drives. Later that year the Red Cross drafted him as secretary-general. The work which he performed without pay occupied his time until 1920, when he returned to Rice.

Dr. Axson went to Rice in 1914 from Princeton where for 15 years he held the title of professor of English.

He was graduated with bachelor's and master's degrees from Wesleyan university, Middletown, Connecticut, having transferred to that school from Davidson college, Davidson, North Carolina, when persuaded to do so by Mr. Wilson, then an instructor at Wesleyan.

He was born in Rome, Georgia, on June 6, 1847, the son of a Presbyterian minister and grandson of two such ministers.

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 26 (AP)—Sale of the Poshay Tower, 35-story office building, was effected at the auction block today when the bid of the Tower company, a new Minnesota corporation, was accepted. The successful bid involves approximately \$1,600,000, including a \$100,000 down payment.

The tower company, headed by Lewis H. Watson, Chicago, already owns 93 per cent and outstanding and unpaid taxes, mortgages, liens claims and liabilities of the receiver.

Part of the three million-dollar structure came today after the building had been put up for auction 28 times.

THE TEACHERS' STRIKE: Most strikes occasion little surprise, occurring as they do from time to time in many lines of industry.

Workers are coming to recognize more clearly that the income per month or year is more important than the wage rate per hour or day. Wide enough acceptance of this principle would rapidly increase work, improve business, and thereby lead to higher wages.

A WOMAN PRESIDENT: "The brain that solves the economic problems of the human race," says William D. Rock, "is certainly keen enough to play a part in politics."

NEW YORK, Feb. 26—Babe Ruth today cast his baseball future with the Boston Braves.

Given his free and unconditional release by the New York Yankees, as the climax of a swift, dramatic series of negotiations, the 41-year-old slugger quickly came to terms on a three-year contract as player, assistant manager and second vice-president of the Boston Braves club.

Ruth's shift to the National league, where he will return to the town that first made him a great southwest pitcher 21 years ago, came as a startling blow to American leaguers to whom Ruth has been an idol during his glorious smashing career as a slugger.

#### Two Owners Reluctant

It was revealed that two American league club owners were reluctant to give Colonel Ruppert their consent to let the Babe go, even though the big fellow was entitled to his unconditional release after a ten year man. They yielded only when it was made clear that no other club was willing to take the Yankees, had any proposition to offer him this season.

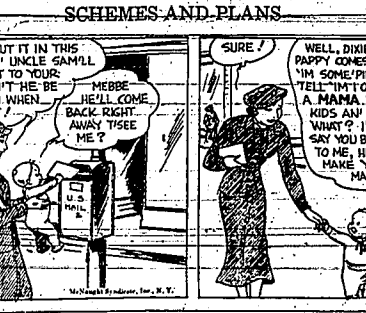
